WEEK TWO AND BEYOND -- POSSIBLE EVENTS

WHITE HOUSE:

- I. Swearing in of Sessions -- opportunity to talk about crime.
- II. 450 Event with police officers and victims of crime. Speaking would be heads of a few police organizations of their problems with lenient judges. Then, a few victims of crime would tell their sad stories. Then Culvahouse would talk about why this nominee is tough on crime and then the President. The President would refer in his remarks to the victim's stories and the victims would be on the dais. The legislation should also be mentioned to raise the issues of the exclusionary rule and the death penalty. One of the reasons we were unable to make crime an issue last time is because everyone was for being "tough on crime", and we did not raise specific issues.
- III. If Former Attorney's Generals/ABA presidents are supportive, possible lunch or breakfast with them.
 - IV. Assuming we are more successful with the crime issue, we might be able to bring in older Americans who are very concerned about crime, in favor of the new judge.
 - V. Efforts will be made from the start to meet with the black organizations. However, it may be useful to have a 450 event later on which includes only minorities, Blacks, Hispanics, Asians, etc...
- VI. The day before the hearings are scheduled to begin, a White House Room 450 briefing with sincere activists are called to Washington and then go up to pre-arranged meetings on the Hill. Will also work with the groups for some outside media generating event. Presidential involvement is a must if we are to get the people necessary out of town.

IGA PLAN FOR SUPREME COURT NOMINEE

Following two lengthy sessions with the entire staff of the Office of Intergovernmental Affairs, I have compiled the following list of actions our office will take to insure a maximum effort toward securing the confirmation of the President's next nominee.

There was general agreement, however, that our effectiveness was severely hindered in the early months of Judge Bork's process because the necessary fact sheets, issue briefs, and information packets were not available to put into the hands of those who wanted to help us and needed to know something about the nominee. This became clear to Kae and me when we attended the NCSL Annual meeting in Indianapolis this summer. A resolution of disapproval of the Judge was underway when Kae arrived at the conference. Though we found several friends willing to help defeat the resolution, we had virtually nothing to hand them or share with them so they could carry our message to others at the conference. We ended up giving them copies of our White House Talking Points (a no-no of the highest order) and shamelessly collaring people in the halls.

The steps we are all prepared to take presuppose the availability of printed information about the nominee which we will be at liberty to hand out and mail out early on, and which will be updated periodically for our activists' use, as well as our own.
