

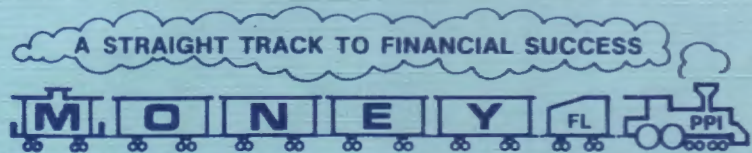

Princess Expecting Baby

LONDON — From the village pub to the House of Commons, Britons rejoiced yesterday over news that Princess Diana is expecting a baby next June — a prince or princess who will be second in line to the British throne.

The announcement by Buckingham Palace came little more than three months after the 20-year-old daughter of an earl married Prince Charles in a spectacle watched by millions around the world.

Queen Elizabeth II and members of both families were delighted, said the palace. "The queen was personally informed of the news by the prince and princess some days ago," said the palace, adding that Diana was "in excellent health."

Bookmakers William Hill Ltd. began taking bets on whether it will be a boy or girl. Odds were narrowly in favor of a male heir with a 50-1 chance of twins.

Man Leaves Reagan \$100,000

NEW YORK — Just because he's president, Ronald Reagan has inherited \$100,000 from a man he never met.

Norman Tyler Sobel, an 85-year-old New York City bachelor and retired insurance broker, left virtually all of his money to whoever was president at the time of his death, "for scientific research to improve mankind's lot."

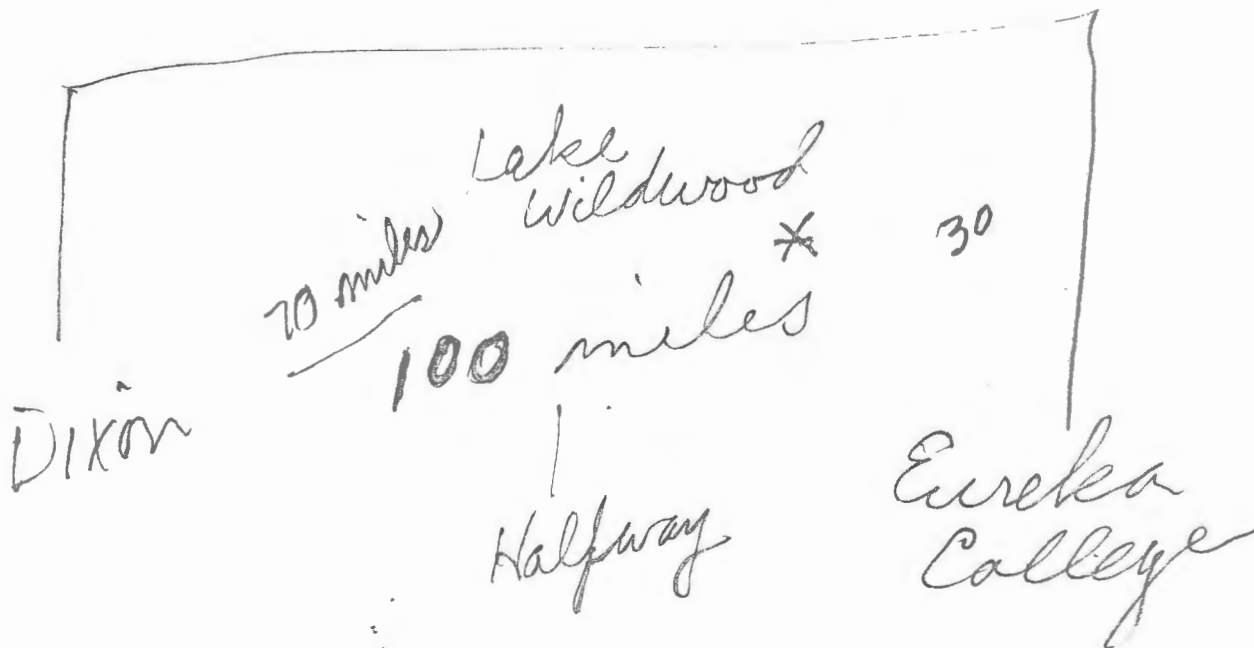
Sobel's lawyer, Matt Meyer, said he had sent a letter to Reagan last week requesting that he become executor of the will, but has not received a reply.

Although the president is not allowed to accept personal gifts, Meyer said Reagan may be able to accept the money as executor of an estate and spend it for public good. Sobel died Aug. 26 in Erie, Pa.

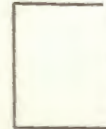



The Scott Auction Galleries, Inc., recently had the honor of conducting the auction of President Gerald R. Ford's collection of memorabilia for the benefit of the Gerald R. Ford Commemorative Committee.

The collection consisted of numerous postage stamp presentation folders, autographs and other small items presented to Gerald R. Ford and Mrs. Ford during his official years. Absent the connection with the Fords, this material was of very little value; however, when sold, it provided a substantial sum for the Ford Museum. Mrs. Ford's portion of the collection was sold for the benefit of the Eisenhower Medical Center. I have enclosed a copy of the sale catalogue and the commemorative postal cover we produced as part of the fund-raising program associated with the opening of the Gerald R. Ford Museum in Grand Rapids.

It has occurred to me that you may well wish to eventually sell material you collect while in office for a similar purpose, and that the effectiveness of such a sale could be maximized if it were planned in advance. For example, the Ford collection did not realize nearly its potential because, unlike the Roosevelt collection, the documentation of the circumstances of the acquisition of the material was weak.

I would be happy to meet with the appropriate people on your staff to discuss this matter at their convenience.

✓ When you select the site for your Presidential Library I hope it will be in San Luis Obispo.

From your perspective I'm certain that you recall your visit to this University when you served as Governor of California.

Cal Poly is midway between San Francisco and Los Angeles and it is on the coast. This will take on added significance by the year 2000 and beyond as this State continues to expand.

The campus has turned away large numbers of qualified applicants the past several years. Next Fall, some 6000 students were referred to other campuses in the system. There is no doubt in my mind that this campus will soon be the best in the State University system.

Lyndon Johnson identified with a Junior College in Texas; John F. Kennedy identified with Harvard (and Boston); other presidents have chosen their home towns or an Elite Insitution. Why not choose a campus that represents the best in the State University system - a system that rests comfortably between the California Community College System and the University of California System?

Finally, the most desirable tourist triangle in the State is the visit to the Carmel-Monterey Peninsula, down the coast to the Hearst Castle, then on to Morro Bay and San Luis Obispo.



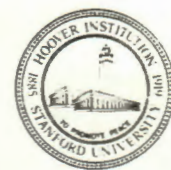

Dear Dr. Drachkovitch:

I understand from Ms. Pruda of your staff that you want me to put in writing the nature of my request for copies of some of the campaign commercials used by President Reagan in the 1980 presidential election.

In brief, we have established an archive of television campaign commercials in the Political Science Department here at Duke University. Our collection includes ads from many campaigns ranging from the most sophisticated (Republican party ads in 1980 attacking the Democratic-controlled Congress), but not neglecting the most abysmal (McGovern in 1972). We are particularly proud of our collection, stretching back to 1960, of commercials from presidential contests.

At this time, we have no ads from President Reagan's 1980 campaign. That is why, through the good offices of Dave Gergen, I requested permission from Michael Deever to obtain copies of a representative sample of these ads from the Hoover collection. I was most gratified to learn from Maxine Walker of Dave Gergen's office (202-456-7113) of Mr. Deever's approval of my request and instruction to contact Molly Tuthill of the Hoover Institution to make arrangements for obtaining the requisite material.

✓ In Ms. Tuthill's unavoidable absence because of sickness, I spoke with Ms. Lood. She was able to inform me of the existence of thirty cassettes but was unfamiliar with their contents or their length. If you can provide me with any of this information, it would certainly help me to formulate my request for particular ads--we are only seeking a representative sample. Alternatively, if necessary, I might be able to arrange for a responsible individual to examine the cassettes on my behalf.

I want to emphasize that the ads are housed at Duke and are used solely for pedagogical purposes by members of the Political Science Department who teach American government and politics. No extra copies are made and no copies are released to any individual or organization or entity whatsoever for any purposes. We are certainly willing to sign a release to that effect.

I deeply appreciate the invitation which you have extended on behalf of the Hoover Institution and Stanford University to locate my Presidential Library on the Stanford campus in close proximity to the Hoover Institution.

The designation of the Hoover Institution at Stanford University as the site to house my Presidential materials would be a natural extension of my long association as an Honorary Fellow of the Hoover Institution and would make possible the unification of my Presidential papers with my gubernatorial papers and the 1976 and 1980 campaign and transition files, totalling some 2,600 cubic feet, that have already been donated to the Hoover Institution. The location of the library on the campus of Stanford University would make the historical record of my Administration widely accessible to the academic community and the public.

With my Administration, the Presidential Records Act of 1978 will be applied to Presidential papers for the first time. Under this Act, the Archivist of the United States will assume custody of such materials upon conclusion of my term of office and deposit them in a Presidential Archival Depository, operated by the United States government. The Presidential Libraries Act, as amended, authorizes the Administrator of GSA to utilize a library constructed with private funds to house Presidential records and other historical materials. Before entering into any agreement to utilize the library as the Presidential Archival Depository, the Administrator must submit the details of any such agreement to Congress so that it will have an opportunity to review any conditions and consider the future maintenance costs to the United States.

Because of the numerous requirements of law, as well as important policy issues that must be addressed, I believe we should begin now to make plans for a library and for the preservation of the fullest possible record of this Administration.
