TALKING POINTS FOR THE PRESIDENT
TO BRIEF THE BIPARTISAN CONGRESSIONAL LEADERSHIP
ON THE VERSAILLES SUMMIT

-- THIS SUMMIT MEETING TOOK PLACE IN THE MOST DIFFICULT ECONOMIC SETTING OF ANY OF THE SUMMITS. RECESSION, UNEMPLOYMENT, CONTINUING INFLATIONARY PRESSURES AND WEAK PRIVATE INVESTMENT ACTIVITY AFFLICTED MANY OF THE PARTICIPANTS.

-- WE DID NOT IGNORE THE SERIOUS DIFFICULTIES FACING OUR ECONOMIES AND WE DID NOT AGREE ON EVERY DETAIL. IN FACT, DISCUSSIONS WERE CANDID AND TOUGH. HOWEVER, THE BOTTOM LINE IS THAT THE LEADERS ONCE AGAIN CHOSE COOPERATION OVER GOING-IT-ALONE TO SOLVE ECONOMIC PROBLEMS.

-- OUR SUMMIT PARTNERS AGREED THAT BEATING INFLATION IS THE KEY TO A STRONG RECOVERY OF GROWTH AND EMPLOYMENT.

-- WE COMMITTED OURSELVES TO TAKE CONCRETE STEPS AT THE NOVEMBER GATT MINISTERIAL TO OPEN MARKETS, DEVELOP MUTUAL TRADING OPPORTUNITIES WITH THE DEVELOPING COUNTRIES AND ADDRESS THE TRADE PROBLEMS OF THE 80s.

-- WE DISCUSSED AT LENGTH THE ISSUES INVOLVED IN EAST-WEST ECONOMIC RELATIONS AND MADE AN UNEQUIVOCAL STATEMENT THAT THESE RELATIONS MUST BE BASED ON PRUDENCE AND MUST BE CONSISTENT WITH THE WEST'S POLITICAL AND SECURITY INTERESTS.

-- WE ALSO TARGETED THE ISSUE OF CREDITS TO THE USSR, AND OTHER EASTERN EUROPEAN COUNTRIES, FOR SPECIAL ATTENTION. THE AGREEMENT, IN PRINCIPLE, ON THE NEED FOR COMMERCIAL PRUDENCE IN LIMITING EXPORT CREDITS IS A VALUABLE FIRST STEP IN ASSURING THAT THE WEST NOT OVER-EXTEND CREDIT OR ENGAGE IN SELF-DEFEATING AND COSTLY SUBSIDIZATION OF CREDIT TO THE USSR.

-- WE ALSO AGREED TO WORK TOGETHER TO DEVELOP THE CONSIDERABLE ENERGY POTENTIAL IN THE WEST, AS ANOTHER STEP IN ASSURING A STRONG, SUSTAINED ECONOMIC RECOVERY, LESS VULNERABLE TO ENERGY DISRUPTIONS.

-- IN OUR INFORMAL POLITICAL DISCUSSIONS, WE ADDRESSED OUR SHARED CONCERNS OVER THE CONTINUING BUILDUP OF SOVIET MILITARY POWER AND SOVIET ACTIONS IN POLAND, AFGHANISTAN, AND SOUTH-EAST ASIA. AT THE SAME TIME, WE AGREED THAT THE SERIOUS ECONOMIC PROBLEMS AND IMPENDING SUCCESSION IN THE SOVIET UNION PROVIDE US WITH MAJOR OPPORTUNITIES TO WORK OUT A MORE CONSTRUCTIVE EAST-WEST DIALOGUE.

-- MY COLLEAGUES ENDORSED OUR INITIATIVES FOR ARMS CONTROL, PARTICULARLY THE NEGOTIATIONS ON REDUCING STRATEGIC ARMS WHICH WILL BEGIN ON JUNE 29.

-- WE AGREED TO IMPROVE OUR COORDINATED FIGHT AGAINST

INTERNATIONAL TERRORISM.

-- NEXT YEAR, I WILL HAVE THE HONOR AND RESPONSIBILITY OF HOSTING MY COLLEAGUES HERE IN THE UNITED STATES. WORKING TOGETHER, YOU AND I, WE WILL BE ABLE TO WELCOME THEM TO A REINVIGORATED AND DYNAMIC AMERICAN ECONOMY -- WELL ON ITS WAY TO VIGOROUS, NON-INFLATIONARY GROWTH WITH A GROWING NUMBER OF JOBS FOR ALL OUR PEOPLE.

TALKING POINTS FOR PRESIDENT'S TRIP TO EUROPE --
EXCLUDING VERSAILLES SUMMIT

-- I AM VERY SATISFIED THAT MY TRIP HAS PUT THE U.S. -- AND ESPECIALLY ALLIED LEADERS -- IN A STRONGER POSITION TO TAKE NEEDED STEPS TO SOLIDIFY WESTERN SECURITY.

-- MY ADMINISTRATION HAS WORKED TO BRING CONSENSUS ON A NEW FRAMEWORK FOR PROMOTING WESTERN SECURITY.

-- I FIND THAT EUROPE IS EAGER FOR AMERICAN LEADERSHIP, SUPPORTS OUR AIMS, AND WANTS TO WORK CLOSELY WITH US.

-- THE NEW FIGHTING IN THE MIDDLE EAST AND THE WAR IN THE SOUTH ATLANTIC DID NOT UNDERMINE THE TRIP, AND IF ANYTHING, REINFORCED THE NEED FOR WESTERN COOPERATION TO PRESERVE PEACE.

-- I FOUND MY EUROPEAN COLLEAGUES, AND EUROPEAN PUBLICS IN GENERAL, VERY RECEPTIVE TO THE THEMES I WANTED TO EMPHASIZE.

-- FIRST, I WANTED TO BRING OUT THE UNDERLYING UNITY AND CONTINUING VITALITY AND RELEVANCE OF NATO. I FOUND UNIVERSAL SUPPORT FOR NATO; AND SPANISH ENTRY INTO THE ALLIANCE VIVIDLY DEMONSTRATED THE FUNDAMENTAL HEALTH OF NATO.

-- SECOND, EUROPEAN LEADERS CLEARLY UNDERSTAND THE NEED TO IMPROVE WESTERN DEFENSES IN ORDER TO STRENGTHEN DETERRENCE.

-- THIRD, THEY SHARE OUR CONCERN THAT THE WEST MUST MORE ACTIVELY PROMOTE DEMOCRATIC VALUES.

-- FOURTH, THEY SUPPORT US FULLY ON THE CRITERIA FOR A MORE CONSTRUCTIVE RELATIONSHIP WITH THE SOVIETS. THEY DEEPLY WELCOME U.S. INITIATIVES ON ARMS CONTROL. WITH OUR INF AND START PROPOSALS, AND THE NEW NATO CALL FOR TROOP REDUCTIONS IN EUROPE, WE HAVE COVERED ALL MAJOR CATEGORIES OF ARMS CONTROL.

-- IN BOTH PARIS AND ROME, WE REAFFIRMED OUR CLOSE AND PRODUCTIVE BILATERAL RELATIONSHIPS WITH FRANCE AND ITALY. I HAD A VERY VALUABLE EXCHANGE WITH THE POPE ON POLAND, THE FALKLANDS CRISIS, AND OTHER MATTERS.

-- IN LONDON, I STRESSED THE NEED FOR THE WEST TO GO ON THE OFFENSIVE IN PROMOTING VALUES AND DEVELOPING DEMOCRATIC INFRASTRUCTURE IN THIRD WORLD AND EVEN THE EAST. THE BRITISH PEOPLE ARE VERY APPRECIATIVE OF OUR STAND WITH THEM ON THE FALKLANDS CRISIS.

-- I FOUND THE GERMANS DEEPLY COMMITTED TO THE ALLIANCE AND THE CLOSEST POSSIBLE TIES TO AMERICA. WE MUST NOT ALLOW DEMONSTRATORS TO OBSCURE THIS.

-- THE NATO SUMMIT PRODUCED STRONG ALLIED COMMITMENT TO REBUILDING WESTERN DEFENSES, ESPECIALLY IN CONVENTIONAL FORCES.

-- FINALLY, I WOULD LIKE TO NOTE THAT EUROPEAN ADMIRATION AND EVEN AFFECTION FOR THE U.S. ARE STILL STRONG. OBVIOUSLY, WE DIFFER ON ISSUES OF THE DAY, AND EUROPEANS SOMETIMES WORRY ABOUT AMERICAN SENSITIVITY TO THEIR PARTICULAR PROBLEMS AND PERSPECTIVES.

-- BUT EVERYWHERE I WENT THERE WAS A CLEAR RECOGNITION THAT EUROPE'S FATE IS BOUND TO OUR OWN, THAT THEIR SECURITY DEPENDS ON A STRONG AND PROSPEROUS AMERICA. DESPITE OUR DIFFERENCES, MY TRIP HAS GIVEN GOOD CAUSE FOR OPTIMISM ABOUT OUR ABILITY TO PULL TOGETHER, IMPROVE OUR SECURITY AND PROMOTE OUR VALUES.

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The General Assembly

Having considered the item entitled "launching of the Global Negotiations on international economic cooperation for development",

In accordance with resolution 34/138,

1. Decides to convene a United Nations Conference for Global Negotiations on international economic cooperation for development from 3 May 1982. Such negotiations should be action-oriented and proceed in a simultaneous manner in order to ensure a coherent and integrated approach to the issues under negotiations;

2. Decides that the Conference will function throughout and reach agreement on the basis of consensus ;

3. Decides that the Conference will in a preliminary phase establish the procedures agenda and timeframe for the Global Negotiations ;

4. Decides that the Conference will exercise the central role in the Global Negotiations. The jurisdiction, competence, functions and powers of the specialized fora within the United Nations system will be respected ;

5. Decides that due attention shall be given in the preliminary phase to the inter-relationship between the central role of the Conference and the specialized fora which, together with the ad hoc groups it may create, will be entrusted with specific agenda items or parts thereof. Both the specialized fora and the ad hoc groups will proceed with their work on the basis of the relevant and appropriate objectives and guidance established by the Conference ;

6. Decides to accord high priority to the Conference in relation to other United Nations activities except those of the principal organs established by the Charter of the United Nations in respect of facilities and services and requests the Secretary-General to provide the necessary documentation to the Conference ;

7. Decides that the Conference will report to the General Assembly at its thirty-seventh session.
