SUBJECT: My Week in Japan

Following are highlights of my week in Japan which encompassed the Shimoda Conference and visits with various Japanese officials.

- The Shimoda Conference dealt with the defense issue, energy, US-Japan economic ties, and Japan's role in Asia. The discussions were marked by very frank responses from the Japanese. No breakthroughs were scored, but I believe most participants emerged with the belief that the Japan-US relationship, while strong, needs working at. Improved technology transfer, more sale of US goods into Japan, and a possible trade of Alaskan oil to Japan in return for Mideast oil where all specifics that were mentioned. Ambassador Brock was a strong participant.
- Met with three bureau chiefs from the Japanese foreign ministry, all of whom were concerned about ROK demands for aid. All also expressed real resentment toward Foreign Minister Sonoda, and stated their hope and expectation that he would be removed in the autumn cabinet reshuffle.
- Lunched with Cabinet Research Office Director Fukuda and alerted him to our perceptions of the current ROK leadership. At the Shimoda Conference, Chief Cabinet Secretary Miyazawa came up to me and thanked me for my report to Fukuda which he had gotten quickly and verbatim (I had met Miyazawa in Korea in 1974 at the end of a previous ROK-Japan imbroglio erupting from the Kim Dae Jung case).

All in all an extremely useful week. I now am in touch with all the key players at the Foreign Ministry, the Cabinet Research Office and the US Embassy. Many old contacts were restored at the Conference, and I also made many new friends.

MOFA HAS INFORMED EMBASSY THAT TENSIONS HAVE EASED CONSIDERABLY CONCERNING ISSUE OF DRILLING BY TAIWAN CONTROLLED VESSEL ON CONTINENTAL SHELF IN EAST CHINA SEA AREA CLAIMED BY JAPAN. A RECENT TYPHOON CAUSED THE EVACUATION FROM THE AREA OF THE DRILLING RIG. THE TAIWAN NAVAL VESSEL, AND JAPAN'S MARITIME SAFETY AGENCY PATROL RUAT. MOFA IS AVUIDING A DEBATE ON THE LEGAL ISSUES INVULVED AND IS FOCUSING INSTEAD ON SIMPLY GETTING THE DRILLING SHIP REMOVED FROM THE AREA. THESE JAPANESE SPONSORS HAVE, MADE IT A CONDITION OF THEIR SUPPORT FOR REVEREND WILLIAMS THAT PRESIDENT REAGAN WHITE DIRECTLY TO PRIME MINISTER SUZUKI REQUESTING SUPPORT FOR THE VISIT. SUBJECT: Japanese Outrage at Their Treatment in

Connection with the Project of a Trilateral

Trade Meeting

The afternoon of September 24, I met in Mike Rashish's office with the Japanese Deputy Minister of Foreign Affairs (Kikuchi) and two officials of the Japanese Embassy (including Minister Hatano). Marshall Casse of Rashish's office was also present and took notes, which I attach (Tab I).

Deputy Minister Kikuchi expressed in an unusually forceful manner the outrage of the Japanese Ministry of Foreign Affairs over the whole process used by USTR in attempting to call a trilateral meeting on trade at the margin of GATT and the other established mechanisms. Most of the details are in the Memcon -- I will highlight only the following points:

- l. The original invitation was extended to the EC and to MITI Minister Tanaka in a letter from Brock but signed on his behalf by Macdonald. The Minister of Foreign Affairs was not notified of this attempt to set up a meeting at the Ministerial level. As you know, there was also no prior consultation with any other agency of our government.
- 2. After protest, the invitation was reissued in the proper form and Macdonald invited his subcabinet counterparts (Denman and Kurihara of MITI) for a preliminary meeting 9/24 in Chicago.
- 3. When Macdonald was forced to cancel the meeting due to the Canadian flap, he invited Denman and the Japanese (Sonoda had insisted Kikuchi go since he outranks Kurihara) to dinner Wednesday evening. Following dinner, a meeting was held to discuss timing, place and agenda over Kikuchi's protests. In other words, exactly what would have been discussed at the cancelled Thursday meeting.

- 4. Apparently, the meeting was held in a very tense atmosphere. At one point, Macdonald is alleged to have said to Kikuchi, "Don't come if you don't want to come." Macdonald and Denman wanted a non-paper prepared, but Kikuchi refused, as he put it, to "allow this non-meeting to produce a non-paper." He then told Macdonald to do nothing further until hearing officially from the Japanese government and left. He told us this would not take place until the end of November, after an expected Cabinet shakeup in Tokyo -- it is Kikuchi's belief that Tanaka will be out.
- After the Japanese left, Mike told me he had spoken to Brock and that Brock intends to issue shortly a formal invitation to MITI and the EC to meet formally "in four to six weeks," thus ignoring the Japanese request. Apparently, he is resigned to Canadian participation if this is the only way he can get the meeting.

Mike will urge Haig, and I urge you, to have a meeting with Brock as soon as possible to resolve this matter. The best solution would be to cancel the meeting in some face-saving way for Brock. Barring that, hold the meeting at the subcabinet level including the Canadians, with one agenda item -- fighting protectionist pressures.

Kikuchi opened the conversation by stating that he arrived in Chicago at 1:00 p.m. on the day before (9/23), after an 8,000 mile journey and was told at 3:00 p.m. that the meeting he had come to participate in had been cancelled. He indicated that he was shocked and surprised, but, in fact, was somewhat relieved by the prospect that it presaged cancellation of the Ministerial-level Trilateral meeting. In the course of the dinner, however, Macdonald proceeded as if the meeting had not been cancelled.

Kikuchi objected, but first said to Macdonald that he had to have some explanation to give to his authorities as to why they had spent money to send him to a meeting only to have it cancelled. Macdonald replied that a problem had arisen concerning an invitation to Canada, that it had not been possible to invite Canada in time to be at the meeting, and because of a misunderstanding in the NSC staff, it had been decided to cancel the meeting. Hatano asked whether we could clarify the "misunderstanding on the part of the NSC staff." Bailey replied that there had been, in fact, many misunderstandings on the whole issue of a Trilateral Trade Meeting but that on this point there was no misunderstanding. NSC staff was opposed to the Chicago meeting and that opposition resulted in its cancellation. The Canada angle was simply the fuse which provoked the action. The proposed dinner was not revealed to the NSC staff until all of the participants were already on airplanes, at which point it would have seemed discourteous to insist that the dinner be cancelled. He stated that the NSC staff opposes the Trilateral meeting and that the Canadian angle is only one of several considerations. He noted in passing that Canada is

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after all the single largest trading partner with the U.S. (Kikuchi requested, and received, permission to transmit verbally Bailey's position to Foreign Minister Sonoda and Prime Minister Suzuki.)

Kikuchi stated that he took a fundamental position throughout the dinner, namely that the question is still open as to whether there should be a Trilateral Trade Meeting at Ministerial level. He cited his 9/16 conversation with Ambassador Brock as support for that position. The decision to hold such a meeting would depend on the development of an "appropriate" agenda, that is, one acceptable to the three parties involved, to the non-participant developed countries, such as Canada, Australia, even to the OECD and to the LDCs. He felt that such an agenda would be impossible to develop and, therefore, felt that an attempt to do so would effectively kill the meeting. It was with that purpose that he came to the Chicago meeting on the orders of Foreign Minister Sonoda. He stated that all the other relevant Japanese ministries, except for MITI, insisted that he attend the Chicago meeting for that purpose.

He indicated that this issue was creating a serious political problem within Japan. MITI Minister Tanaka is simply "grandstanding" to enhance his political future and wants the Trilateral meeting to take place before the Cabinet reshuffle in November. Kikuchi said Prime Minister Suzuki is in a difficult spot since he has already delivered two damaging blows to Tanaka: first, he was not permitted to attend the Ottawa Summit and, second, he was prevented from visiting the USSR. Suzuki is highly embarrassed by Tanaka running around the world acting like the Foreign Minister or even the Prime Minister. Tanaka has visited everywhere and wanted badly to go to the Soviet Union, but Suzuki forbade that since the Japanese Government, after Afghanistan, has had a policy of prohibiting high-level exchanges with the Soviet Union. Suzuki may be forced to allow Tanaka to attend a Trilateral meeting, as a consolation prize for being excluded from Cancun. Kikuchi indicated that MITI officials would also like for the concept of a trilateral meeting to go away.

Kikuchi noted that he had taken a very negative position throughout the dinner which resulted in Macdonald, at one point, saying that if the Japanese don't want to come, then they shouldn't come. Kikuchi protested this approach as an insult to Japan.

Kikuchi then went on to the discussion of a possible agenda for the Ministerial as discussed at the dinner. Macdonald suggested a number of topics, such as trade trends, the overall outlook for trade in the '80s, trade problems among the three participants, multilateral trade problems, a review of trade in critical sectors, such as high-technology and steel and finally efforts to uphold free trade. He reported that Kurihara quickly agreed with Macdonald's request but added structural adjustment, industrial cooperation among the three participants and research and development. Kurihara wanted to exclude any discussion of GATT matters, MFA, agriculture or services. Kikuchi noted that such a list would confine the meeting to matters of direct authority in MITI. While reserving his position on the meeting, Kikuchi suggested a one sentence agenda "how to maintain the free multilateral trade and investment system and resist protectionist pressures." Macdonald and Denman liked that suggestion and Macdonald suggested that he would develop a non-paper on the agenda based on that suggestion with some sub-headings.

Mr. Rashish noted that apart from disagreement on whether or not to have a Trilateral Ministerial meeting there seemed to be a major Japanese internal problem which it would be difficult for the U.S. to address. Kikuchi replied that there was indeed an internal problem and that the best way to avoid exacerbating the problem would be for the U.S. to delay any invitation until after the Cabinet reshuffle. In fact, when Macdonald was discussing next steps, Kikuchi insisted that the U.S. take no further action until it receives a formal reply from the GOJ on Brock's original invitation.

Two closing notes: First, asked what Denman's role was at the dinner, Kikuchi reported that Denman was fully supportive, even enthusiastic about a Trilateral meeting and wanted to link it directly to the Ottawa communique. Discussion on this point noted that a power play was occurring both in Japan and in Europe where the EC was attempting to gain ground on the major member countries by participating in a Trilateral meeting. Second, Hatano said that USTR has told him that USTR has the right to act on trade matters and is not required to coordinate within the government, and to call a meeting such as the one Brock envisaged. Bailey replied that, indeed, USTR has authority in trade matters, but any discussion of a meeting at Ministerial level requires the concurrence of the other affected departments or a White House decision.

In the event you talk with Brock and/or Haig about the proposed trilateral or quadrilateral meeting of trade ministers, the attached paper, distributed by Macdonald at the end of his dinner session with the vice ministers in Chicago September 24, will be useful background. Note that it does give the Japanese continuing freedom to scrap the whole idea, if Suzuki wants to side with Foreign Affairs over MITI, or to stall a decision until after the Cabinet reshuffle in late November.

I told Macdonald you want no invitation sent, proposing a date, or other US pressure put on the Japanese while they are sorting out their internal disagreement. I said the larger question of whether such an elite group meeting should ever be held was still open for decision, and if Brock wants to pursue it he should initiate a decision session with you and Haig. He is on notice that if the meeting does occur, you will insist that Canada be invited.

I enclose the U.S. Non-Paper, which came out of the dinner at my home on Wednesday. As you can see, the first two points were specifically added in order to meet the sensitivities of the Japanese MOFA. We are now waiting for a Japanese response. No pressure is being placed by us on the Japanese to transmit a response, although MITI will undoubtedly press for an early response. This, of course, is an internal Japanese matter.

- 1) The question of whether a meeting will be held is still open.
- The parties discussed on a hypothetical basis what subjects would be discussed if a meeting were thought to be desirable, and the U.S. suggested the following AGENDA:

Primary Objective: To defend free trade principles and consider approaches for resisting protectionist pressures.

- 1. Recent international trade and related economic developments, especially among EC, Japan and U.S.
- 2. Longer term prospects for our trade relations, including projections on trade. Patterns and composition of trade among three areas would be considered.
- 3. Longer term developments in industry structure (e.g., productivity, marketing, R&D) leading to review of critical sectors (e.g., high technology) in which we share interest in maintaining or extending open trading system.
- 4. Approaches among the three governments to achieve the primary objective.

Several subjects were mentioned as inappropriate for discussion, including:

- --GATT matters
- --Agricultural problems ·
- --Services problems
- --Export restraints
- --"Hot issues" currently being negotiated elsewhere
