for Japan

This matter came up in the discussion you had with Secretary Shultz and Foreign Minister Abe on the evening of January 19 and, I understand, was considered favorably by you.

I have certain reservations about setting up a group of this kind, basically for two reasons: 1) The Japanese may try to use this group to postpone or evade actions they should take on immediate issues facing our two countries; and, 2) the American members may have ties to certain interest groups in this country which will not serve our purposes too well.

It was because of these reservations, as well as for financial reasons, that this Administration allowed the first so-called "Wisemen's Group," set up by former President Carter and the late Prime Minister Ohira, to go out of existence in late 1981.

However, the arguments for re-establishing a US-Japan Advisory Group are made effectively by State in their memorandum to you. They also say that this new group will concern itself with constructing a realistic vision of the potential for US-Japan cooperation by the end of the 1980's. This could be a useful exercise if the people who are engaging in this work from our side are our people. The choice of the Americans is key and State has rightly said that the "President's staff in consultation with the Secretary" will recommend persons to the President.

Bremer has included a list of names for consideration. Paul Wolfowitz discussed these earlier with me. I don't think that we should move too speedily to accept any particular individuals at this time. One name I would add to the list to think about would be Bill Timmons. We can come up with some others later.

I don't believe that we should be rushed by State into precipitate action on this whole issue, other than to try and get the President to agree, in principle, to the establishment of a US-Japan Advisory

Group. We don't have any budget for the administrative costs of this undertaking at the present time. Full commitment to the project should not be conveyed to the Japanese side until this is determined. Also, the Americans to be appointed need to be fully checked out. Secretary Shultz need not do other than express to Foreign Minister Abe in Tokyo the President's agreement, in principle.

I have prepared a memorandum from you to the President which recommends that he agree, in principle, to the establishment of a US-Japan Advisory Group, composed of distinguished citizens of the two countries, who would consider our relationship for the remainder of the decade, and make recommendations to both governments.

RECOMMENDATION:

That you sign the attached memorandum to the President (Tab I) asking that he approve, in principle, the establishment of a US-Japan Advisory Group.

BORN : November 12, 1924, Los Angeles, California

EDUCATION : Attended Local Schools
University of Southern California

MILITARY SERVICE: U.S. Navy with rank of Lt. J.G.

Daryl Arnold was born into a Southern California farming family. During his adult life he has had extensive experience as a grower, a shipper and a manager for a large publicly owned corporation. He has been an executive and a chief operating officer. Accompanying these career positions has been a vigorous and active participation in civic, political and industry organizations.

FARMING CAREER

From 1946 to 1951 farmed in West Los Angeles, growing celery, tomatoes and other vegetables.

In 1951 moved his farming operation to Ventura County and formed his own organization under the name of Cee Dee Ranch Co. In 1960 he incorporated Ocean View Farms, a packing and shipping company whose labels included Ocho, 8 Farms, and Ocean View. This company with operations in Ventura, Monterey and Imperial Counties in California, had annual fresh vegetable sales of approximately \$5 million per year. In addition to this shipping and sales company, he also owned and controlled eight additional corporations, including Arnold Harvesting Company and Arnold Farms.

Arnold Farms grew 1,000 acres of cannery tomatoes. It was in connection with this venture that he developed a central sorting system for the extraction of seeds and the mechanical sorting of cannery tomatoes. This was done in cooperation with Kern Foods Company and the Peto Seed Company. The Arnold Farms production represented nearly one-third of the Kern Foods tomato supply.

In 1969 he negotiated the merger of Ocean View Farms and his other agricultural corporations with Freshpict Foods Inc. a wholly owned subsidiary of the Purex Corporation. In 1970 he became one of two Division Managers of Freshpict Foods Inc. This corporation, employing some 3,000 people, grew, packed and shipped approximately \$50 million worth of fresh fruit and vegetables annually. Arnold was personally in charge of the product division of Freshpict Foods, Inc., along with the growing, harvesting and selling of the Northern Division fresh products activities in Oxnard, Salinas, Castroville and Tracy.

His separation from Freshpict Foods Inc., was based on principle, but was without animosity on either side. Purex directors proposed the negotiation of a labor contract with the United Farm Workers union to protect the company's non-farm product line from a threatened secondary boycott by the UFW. Arnold told the company that he did not believe such an action was in the best interest of agriculture or the company. He informed the directors that, if a contract were signed, and if it did not meet his standards for the company and all agriculture, he would resign. The contract subsequently negotiated failed to meet his criteria and his resignation was accepted with regret although his five year non-competitive contract was continued.

NON-FARM CAREER

After his resignation from Freshpict Foods, he was asked to accept the presidency of the Free Marketing Council. This non-profit membership organization was formed by the lettuce shippers in California and Arizona to inform receivers in the United States, Canada and Europe of the facts concerning the United Farm Workers Union effort to impose a secondary boycott on lettuce. In this position he travelled throughout the United States and Canada, meeting with all receivers, the press and the public explaining the shipper position.

This position was taken with the understanding that, after a year of travel on behalf of the Free Marketing Council, he would resign to accept the position of President and Chief Operating Officer of Western Growers Association.

CURRENT OCCUPATION

Thus, two years after he served the organization as its Chairman of the Board, he returned to Western Growers Association as the President.

From its organization in 1926 until Arnold's appointment in 1971, Western Growers Association had concentrated its activities in traffic and standardization.

With the advent of the new President a period of growth has started that has continued for the last ten years.

Membership has tripled during this time. Services now include a Transportation Department, Public Relations, Legal Services, Marketing Services, Insurance, Claims Service, Monthly magazine, Weekly newsletter, Membership, Legislative, Political Action Committees, and Data Processing.

Western Growers Association now represents nearly 60 per cent of the fresh vegetable, melon and potato shipments in the United States, with some 400,000 carlots of fresh produce each year. The services which have been added since 1971 have been financed through growth, with no increase in the rate of the per package dues which provide operational funds. Membership continues to be on a very broad base. It includes very small growers and it includes highly diversified corporations such as United Brands, Tenneco West, Sun World, Belridge Farms and Guimarra Vineyards. Perceiving the need for group legal services to meet the challenge of farm labor organization efforts well before the rest of agriculture, WGA under his leadership has assembled a staff of sixteen full time labor attorneys who cover every area with a competence that is the envy of all other similar groups.

Arnold also led the move to assume more of the functions of the health insurance and the pension programs sponsored by WGA. Today the association is its own administrator, it makes claims payments through its own computer network, and it is self-insured. Each of these steps has provided better service, or equal service at reduced cost, to the members who participate in the programs.

Better to facilitate these legal and insurance services, as well as to improve general services to the members, WGA now maintains ten branch offices in addition to the corporate headquarters.

The Association also has seven contract inspectors in the major markets in the United States and Canada.

In 1980 Western Growers Association, through peer pressure, extended it's membership to include all fresh produce. Consequently it now represents a majority of the citrus industry and other fruits in California and Arizona.

OTHER ACTIVITIES

The development in 1972 of the Western Growers Political Action Committee was directed by Arnold. In two years it had grown to the point that it was the largest single contributor to the campaign for governor and it now leads all other agricultural groups in contributions to Senate and Assembly campaigns in California.

Arnold was one of the organizers and principle factors in the Citizens for a Fair Farm Labor Law which produced the devastating defeat of the UFW initiative, Proposition 14.

As a grower-shipper, was Chairman of the Board of Western Growers Association in 1969.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE PRESIDENT

FROM: WILLIAM P. CLARK

SUBJECT: Department of State Recommendation for the
Establishment of a United States-Japan Advisory
Group

Issue:

Secretary Shultz has recommended that you agree, in principle, to the establishment of a US-Japan Advisory Group, composed of distinguished citizens of the two countries, who would consider our relationship for the remainder of the decade and make recommendations to both governments.

Facts:

There was a similar type of group set up by the previous Administration. It dealt primarily with immediate trade concerns, but not entirely. We let this group's tenure expire in late 1981.

Secretary Shultz is now urging that we establish our own US-Japan advisory committee with our own appointees. The Japanese seem anxious to have this done as well.

Discussion:

The problems in our bilateral relations have created an increasingly unpleasant public mood in both countries. By setting up a US-Japan Advisory Group we could help to counter this development, while at the same time keeping up our pressure on Japan to further open its markets and do more in the self-defense area.

MEMORANDUM FOR JUDGE WILLIAM CLARK

I have been asked by your staff for recommendations for appointment to the soon-to-be established U.S.-Japan Wise Men's Group, and I would like to advance the nomination of Leo Cherne.

Mr. Cherne is now Executive Director of the Research Institute of America, possibly the world's largest business advisory service. He has had a long history of involvement in both international and domestic economic matters. Of great significance relative to the responsibilities of the Wise Men's Group, Mr. Cherne served on General MacArthur's staff in Tokyo after World War II, personally drafting the laws and regulations to restructure the "Zaibatsu" system and to revise the Japanese tax code. (Working with him at that time were several young Japanese who are now prominent in Japanese Government affairs, such as Keichi Miyazawa, former head of the Economic Planning Board, and the most recent Chief Cabinet Secretary to Prime Minister Suzuki.)

Mr. Cherne presently serves the Administration in a consultant's capacity as Vice Chairman of the President's Foreign Intelligence Advisory Board (PFIAB). If any would question the advisability of someone on PFIAB also serving in a capacity such as the Wise Men's Group, the following is instructive:

- The PFIAB is not part of the intelligence community; it is a Board of part-time advisors who review the adequacy and relevance of intelligence product.
- Many PFIAB members serve in a wide variety of public and private sector roles, ranging from other Presidential advisory committees to corporate directors; internationally constituted "think-tanks" and publishing organizations; and full-time employees of businesses with substantial government involvement. PFIAB membership is not and should not be dispositive of suitability to serve in any other important advisory capacity.
- During the Ford Administration, Mr. Cherne served as a member of the U.S. Advisory Commission on International Cultural and Educational Affairs,...while he was first a member and later Chairman of President Ford's PFIAB.

Because of the critical nature of the U.S.-Japan economic relationship at this time and the potential that the Wise Men's Group has for helping to identify, articulate and possibly contribute towards resolution of some of our problems, I can't imagine anyone better suited for membership than Leo Cherne.

I don't know whether Mr. Cherne would like to or would be able to accept this appointment if asked.
