Purpose of Meeting

Courtesy call by Dr. Shinto to discuss briefly the U.S.-Japan NTT Agreement. You are scheduled for a "drop by" only.

Background

Dr. Shinto will be in Washington to discuss the operation of what is known as the U.S.-Japan NTT Agreement. Under this three-year Agreement, Japan's Nippon Telegraph and Telephone Corporation has committed itself to open its purchases to U.S. sellers. The types of purchases involved vary from pocket pagers to graphic design systems to magnetic tape for information processing. Last year, NTT purchases totaled \$3.1 billion, \$40 million of which were sales by U.S. firms.

The NTT Agreement is due to expire at the end of the year unless extended. Dr. Shinto is committed to the success and extension of the Agreement, but over the course of the past two plus years the sales to NTT by U.S. firms have been very small. As a result of this, the Agreement has been criticized roundly by our private sector.

Dr. Shinto's objective in visiting the U.S. is to reassure Administration officials and key Congressmen and Senators of NTT's commitment to increase purchases from U.S. firms. The objective by Administration officials should be to support the extension of the NTT Agreement while continuing to seek new and visible U.S. sales of equipment to NTT as a quid pro quo.

IN ADDITION TO ITS OWN IMPORTANT PLACE AMONG JAPAN'S PRINT AND ELECTRONIC MEDIA, FUJI-SANKEI HAS BEEN MOST HELPFUL IN COOPERATING WITH US ON PROJECTS INVOLVING POLAND AND SOVIET MILITARY POWER AMONG OTHERS.
- I FULLY UNDERSTAND THE DEMANDS ON THE PRESIDENT'S SCHEDULE AND THE LIMITED TIME AVAILABLE FOR EXCLUSIVE INTERVIEWS. IF SUCH AN INTERVIEW IS GRANTED TO A JAPANESE COMPANY, FUJI-SANKEI IS MOST DEFINITELY THE APPROPRIATE ORGANIZATION. I HAVE DIRECTED THAT A COPY OF THIS REPLY BE PASSED TO JUDGE CLARK AT THE WHITE HOUSE SO THAT HE TOO WILL BE AWARE OF MY SUPPORT FOR THE FUJI-SANKEI REQUEST.

Dear Bill:

I have just received a cable from Mike Mansfield strongly endorsing a longstanding request from Fuji-Sankei for an exclusive interview with President Reagan (tab A). Ambassador Mansfield writes:

"In terms of editorial significance...I would assign top priority to obtaining White House approval for a Fuji interview."

The Ambassador goes on to say:

"In addition to its own important place among Japan's print and electronic media, Fuji-Sankei has been most helpful in cooperating with us on projects involving Poland and Soviet Military Power, among others."

My initial memo to you in support of Fuji-Sankei's request was in March of 1982 (tab B). Since that time, we have been advised repeatedly that the request remains under active consideration.

A memo of October 29, 1982 from Bud McFarlane regarding our request states:

"...we will want to ensure that the appropriate news organization, preferably the one most highly recommended by the Embassy, is granted the interview" (tab C).

Ambassador Mansfield concludes his cable to me by noting that, if an exclusive interview is granted to a Japanese company,

"Fuji-Sankei is most definitely the appropriate organization."



Fuji Television Request for Interview with President Reagan

Fuji Television, one of Japan's major networks, sees a real need to bring President Reagan and his White House closer to the Japanese people. The network plans to do a ninety minute special oh the President and how the White House works. Fuji wants to make a thirty minute interview with President Reagan the centerpiece of the special program.

The Fuji Network worked with us on our worldwide telecast of "Let Poland be Poland". Substantial resources were committed to the Japanese version of the program to make it a success. Fuji will put a similar effort into this special on the White House. They expect to reach thirty-five million Japanese through the television broadcast and through publication in their affiliated national newspaper, the Sankei Shirbun. They also plan to broadcast the interview on their extensive radio network.

Fuji and its affiliated Sankei Newspaper have, more than any other Japanese media organization, given support over the years to important U.S. policy positions, both those involving the bilateral relationship between Japan and the United States and those with a global dimension. The Sankei Yeuspaper editorials and commentaries on the need for greater Japanese defense cooperation with the United States are only one example of this. The President of the Fuji-Sankei group, Mr. Nobutaka Shikanai, one of Japan's most influential economic leaders, vishes personally to interview the President for the program. Mr. Shikanai shares the President's basic political philosophy and he will make sure that his sympathies are reflected in the program itself.

The program, intended for a wide ranging media audience, will not focus specifically on one issue. The interview with the President will attempt to show the extremely heavy burden Mr. Reagan carries as the leader of the free world. Questions will focus on President Reagan's view of politics, his feelings about U.S.-Japan relations, and the international situation in general. Though it will be timed to coincide with the June Economic Summit in Paris, the focus of the program will not be economics, although economics may come up in the context of U.S.-Japan relations. In essence, the Network is more interested in a positive statement about Mr. Reagan and the White House and somewhat less concerned about specific policy issues.

Because the Fuji-Sankei Group has been so supportive of the President and American foreign policy in the past, we are certain that this special program and the centerpiece interview will gain both respect for the President and understanding for the pressures under which he works. No network in Japan could do a better job than Fuji on a project of this type.

If the interview is granted, the Washington Bureaus of Fuji Welevision and the Sankei Newspaper will be most receptive to any suggestions the White Bouse may have on program content.

A program of this type would have positive public relations value at an important time in the U.S.-Japan relationship. It would reach a large segment of Japanese public opinion, and would be watched closely by key opinion makers. Done as we think it will be, this program could be a factor in Japanese decision making in the time that follows.

I strongly recommend that the President consent to an interview with Fuji Television.

As you suggested in your memorandum of October 18, we have requested the White House Press Office to reconsider the Fuji Television interview request.

As usual, obtaining time for such an interview will be difficult. Should the President's schedule permit an interview with a Japanese news organization, we will want to take into consideration the likelihood that this would be the only one with a Japanese journalist for some time. Thus, we will want to ensure that the appropriate news organization, preferably the one most highly recommended by the Embassy, is granted the interview. At this point, we can make no commitment for any interview, but I can assure you Fuji's request will receive careful attention.
