

Dear Senator Glenn:

We share your concern regarding the state of security and safeguards at domestic nuclear weapon facilities.

I wish to inform you of recent developments in this critical area. Early in June, the National Security Council met to review problems of nuclear weapons security, and the rate of improvement in security. The Department of Energy has made substantial progress in correcting many safeguard and security shortcomings, and has developed an appropriate plan of action for further improvement. The Department has appropriate mechanisms in place for executing this plan but has not yet accelerated progress to the extent we all desire. Accordingly, I have taken a few steps to strengthen the role of the White House in this very important area.

First, I have instructed Judge Clark to place members of the NSC professional staff on the steering group that oversees site security improvement programs for Department of Energy domestic facilities as well as on a similar group that performs this function for military sites. This will allow NSC staff to become intimately acquainted with the operations of upgrade programs, to influence these operations, and to alert promptly the White House to any situation calling for intervention at a senior level.

Second, to reinforce the NSC staff work I have requested that the status of upgrade progress be reported quarterly to the NSC.

Finally, I have requested that in addition to receiving the annual reports on nuclear weapon surety and our domestic safeguards, the National Security Council be given a full briefing once a year: on the state of US nuclear security worldwide.

We believe these steps will improve the operation of the existing management structure and ensure persistent attention to nuclear security at all levels of the government. We appreciate your interest.

Dear Congressman Dingell:

In Judge Clark's June 11 reply to your earlier letters concerning safeguards and security at nuclear facilities, he indicated that the National Security Council was soon to be briefed on the status of DOD and DOE nuclear weapons security, and that you would be informed of any decision for improving White House oversight of nuclear security matters.

The briefing for the National Security Council has now taken place, and I am pleased to share with you the results of our deliberations.

The Department of Energy has over the past few years made substantial progress in correcting a number of known security problems and in identifying the need for further improvements. The Department has appropriate management systems in place, but we have not yet accelerated progress to the extent we all desire. Accordingly, I have taken some additional steps to strengthen the role of the White House in this very important area.

First, I have instructed Judge Clark to place members of the NSC professional staff on the steering group that oversees security improvement programs for Department of Energy domestic facilities and on a similar group that performs this function for military sites. This will allow NSC staff to become intimately acquainted with operations of the upgrade program, to influence these operations, and to alert promptly the White House to any situation calling for intervention at a senior level.

Second, to reinforce the NSC staff work I have requested that the status of upgrade progress be reported quarterly to the NSC.

Your Meeting with Senator Denton on Wednesday, July 13

Based on a conversation with the Senator's defense staffer, I expect the Senator will raise two specific issues with you tomorrow:

-- First, Central America, in particular, the possibility of invoking the Rio Pact and establishing a military quarantine to prevent the shipment of arms to Central America. The thought behind this is that we should invoke a multilateral effort to preserve peace in Central America. The Senator feels that there has to be some middle ground between the limited effort of 55 military advisers on the one end and the use of several U.S. divisions on the other. (The Senator is meeting with Ambassador Stone tomorrow and with the President on Thursday).

-- The second issue the Senator will raise may well be his concern over nuclear weapons security in Europe and the danger of terrorist attempts on nuclear weapons sites.

You should be aware that Senator Baker and others have been interested in this issue and a letter has been drafted by the NSC on this issue (see Tab A).

You should also be aware that Senator Denton feels he has often been ignored by this Administration and that we only speak to him when we need his vote on some particular issue. It would be useful for you to assure the Senator of the President's appreciation for his support on the many issues that have been before the Senate over the past two years.

Proposed talking points on the Rio Pact issue and the nuclear weapons site security issue are attached at Tab B).

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TALKING POINTS ON THE RIO TREATY

- -- To invoke the Rio Treaty there has to be an overt act of aggression. The aggrieved party must ask for help by invoking the Treaty. The States who are party to the Rio Pact will then act automatically. We are looking into this carefully.
- -- With regard to a quarantine or a cordon sanitaire, we have explored the idea. We can do it, but it could be considered an act of war. There is no question that we would be set up and the first aircraft shoot down or ship sinking would take the lives of innocent women and children.
- -- We have in a way multilateralized the conflict. The Hondurans support us very closely; they are allowing the training of Salvadorans at a camp in their country. While our friends recognize the threats to them, however, they are reluctant to get involved militarily. We do have a problem on this and are tyring to change perceptions.

Dear Mr. Clark:

I want to thank you for the kind words contained in your July 8 memorandum to Secretary Hodel relative to our briefing of the National Security Council at its June 10 meeting on nuclear weapons security. We are in complete agreement with the approach suggested in your memorandum as a means for improving upon our capabilities for addressing significant issues associated with the security of U.S. nuclear weapon facilities.

We will welcome the participation of NSC staff in such meetings and functions on this area of concern as will assist them in obtaining first-hand experience vital to their understanding of our programs. We are currently in the process of formulating the terms of reference for DOE's Safeguards and Security Steering Group, the membership of which will be comprised of Headquarters and field office program managers, and we intend to invite participation by FBI, DOD, and NSC staff officials in this endeavor.

Subsequent to the June 10 meeting at the White House, we sponsored a meeting (also on June 10) of senior management representatives of the Departments of Justice and Defense, the FBI, and the Department of the Army to review actions required with respect to expediting the completion of a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between those agencies relative to the provision of military assistance in the event of a domestic terrorist incident. It has been our view that such an agreement is essential to effective interagency response assistance should such an incident occur at a DOE nuclear facility. That MOU has now been staffed and signed by each of the primary agencies (Justice, FBI, and Army) as of August 5, 1983. Also, as the result of our June 10 meeting we have instituted a Working Group, with representation from the above agencies to identify resource shortfalls and to develop implementation plans for assuring that capabilities for prompt and effective civil/military response to a terrorist incident at a DOE facility can be fielded if it becomes necessary.

Regarding the submission of quarterly reports on the status of our Safeguards and Security improvements program, it is our intention to submit the first of such reports in October 1983 inasmuch as our Eighth Annual Report on Domestic Safeguards was only recently submitted (July 11, 1983) to your office and there have been no significant changes to date.

It is our understanding that the Secretary of Defense has suggested that there be semiannual rather than the annual NSC meetings on nuclear weapons security as requested in your memorandum. DOE will be happy to participate in semiannual NSC meetings if in your judgment that arrangement would be preferable to the President.
