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

Briefings in Preparation for Premier Zhao's

Visit, January 10-12

Preparations for Chinese Premier Zhao Ziyang's official state visit are proceeding smoothly. I will forward to you by December 24 a package of preliminary briefing materials for your review over Christmas. During the week immediately following the New Year's holiday we plan to hold interagency meetings aimed at reaching a consensus on strategy for the Zhao visit. Shortly after that we should complete our paper work.

In the past, I have customarily met with you in a single pre-brief session prior to the arrival of foreign leaders. Although that format has worked extremely well in my estimation, I consider that a somewhat different approach to preparing for the Zhao visit could better serve your needs. I have in mind a set of three rather short, well-focused briefing sessions during approximately January 5-9.

My reasoning is this. Whereas the usual ritual for a state visitor programs a one-hour session with you, you will be meeting with Zhao for approximately 3-1/2 hours (including a one-hour private meeting and two expanded meetings with Cabinet members). The relative length of your time with Zhao, the complexity of the bilateral issues (there remain some interagency differences in approach) before us, and the special . . See sensitivity of certain questions all argue for exceptionallymeticulous preparation in order to assure the overall success. of the visit. I would therefore propose for your consideration. a program of three briefings along the following lines:

First Briefing: To discuss particularly sensitive bilateral issues.

Second Briefing: To address the broad range of issues likely in our judgment to arise in the course of your discussions with Zhao.

Third Briefing: To review procedural and protocolary aspects of your various meetings with Zhao.

I recommend that you approve this concept for preparing for the Zhao visit, and that you accordingly instruct the NSC to schedule the three briefings.

Talking Points for Robert C. McFarlane

INTRODUCTION

- The purpose of this meeting is to review the state of U.S.-Chinese relations for the President in preparation for the visit of the Chinese Premier--and to discuss the broad issues which may arise, either at the Chinese initiative or ours, during his stay. We have a number of issues to discuss, with a number of speakers, but only a very short time available (45 minutes) so I'm going to be fairly strict in holding the speakers to the time allotted.
- Let's begin with a broad overview of our relations by Secretary Shultz.

(Introduce Other Speakers as Appropriate)

DISCUSSION - (Agenda Item #10)

(If the following subjects have not been covered by Secretary Shultz or other by this point, we recommend that you raise the following subjects.)

- President's Trip to China. The Chinese Ambassador has conveyed to us the Chinese hope that we can settle, during the Premier's visit, the exact dates of the President's trip to China which, so far, we have only said would be during the last two weeks of April 1984. If we can set these, it would enable us to announce the dates publicly in the President's remarks upon the

departure of Premier Zhao from Washington, which would add to the results of his visit.

- <u>Signing Ceremony</u>. The Chinese have indicated that they would like a "signing ceremony" for two agreements, preferably just before the "Cabinet" breakfast, Thursday morning, January 12, preceding Zhao's departure from Washington for San Francisco.

They would like the renewal of <u>the Science and Technology Agreement</u> to be signed by Jay Keyworth and his Chinese counterpart, in the presence of the President and the Chinese Premier.

The Chinese would like the new Agreement on Industrial

Cooperation, negotiated by the Department of Commerce, to be
signed by the President and the Premier personally. This agreement
will symbolize the importance of our growing trade, and industrial
and commercial cooperation, to which the Chinese Premier is
personally dedicated—and it will provide the framework for
future cooperation in specific industrial sectors. The State
Department has endorsed this Chinese request and we also think it
is a good idea.

- <u>Nuclear Cooperation Agreement</u>. The Chinese hope that, during the Premier's visit, we can resolve our remaining problems standing in the way of a Nuclear Cooperation Agreement. This would enable us to announce, either at the signing ceremony for the other two agreements, or in the President's remarks on the Premier's departure from Washington, that we have reached agreement on this important accord, which we have been negotiating for well over two years.







CONCLUSION

- This concludes our review of the broad issues in the U.S.-Chinese relationship. We will be disseminating to you (before Tuesday) a short NSDD, spelling out the conclusions of this meeting and providing the policy guidance that all of you will need to keep in mind during your own meetings with the Chinese Premier or members of his delegation.
- Mr. President, there will be one more briefing for you--from-9:30 to 10:00 A.M. Tuesday, January 10--just prior to the welcoming ceremony for Premier Zhao. That meeting will be led by Secretary Shultz and will cover the protocol and procedural aspects of dealing with the Premier, and any last minute details you need to hear.
