5. Proposed statement:

That having been said, it is my hope that we can get this campaign back to a high level. For that reason, I would hope that Mr. Carter will disavow Mrs. Harris' recent remarks and ask her to apologize for comparing my candidacy to "the specter of white sheets".



KLAN STATEMENT

Yesterday I observed that President Carter had opened his campaign at the home of the Ku Klux Klan in Alabama. Now I know that President Carter opposes the principles and actions of the Klan and that he would agree completely with my August 22 statement rejecting the support of Klan organizations.

But I confess I was angered when he remained silent while his Secretary of health and Human and wholly unjustified Services, mrs. Harris, made an obvious/public attempt to associate me and the Republican Party with the Klan.

I have instructed my organization and all Republican State organizations to strictly refrain from any attempt, however indirect, to link President Carter with the Klan, and I will insist that those instructions be followed to the letter. I expect President Carter to do the same with his staff, his Cabinet, and the Democratic Party organizations across the country.
