





Dear Mrs. Rathbun:

Thank you for writing and for giving me a chance to respond. First let me say no one regrets the pay freeze more than I do —— and, yes, I know you can say that's easy talk when it's hurting so many others. But, believe me, I know our people in uniform are not being paid what they deserve and we are going to continue trying to raise the scale. The freeze as you know is only for one year.

Faced with a deficit which could delay economic recovery, we proposed a freeze for one year for all government employees and Social Security recipients. At first we intended to exempt the military. However, there is a strong move in the Congress to massively reduce the defense budget. We had to go across the board if Congress was to give us the other savings we had to have.

With regard to the extravagances you mentioned, I can only tell you there is a fresh wind blowing through the Pentagon and billions of dollars of savings have already been realized. But we are all agreed that as fast as we can we want to continue bringing military pay up to a fair level.

I am encouraged by the signs of economic recovery that may ease our deficit situation somewhat but, in the meantime, we are a long way from a balanced budget. And, as you know, many in Congress feel, as they have in the past, that defense should be the first place to cut. I promise I'll battle against that kind of false economy.

Please know a great many of your fellow citizens are very proud and grateful to you who are manning the barricades and defending our freedom.

## Mr. President,

I only hope that by some miracle of justice this letter reaches you. I am deeply concerned over the military pay freeze action you have taken, which will go into effect October 1 of this year.

I am the wife of an active duty military member who as of this month will have 10 years of service to his country. He enlisted during the Viet Nam War, and has received a Joint Service Accommodation Medal for his work with the Viet Nam refugees. He is a dedicated and patriotic man, and your Administration is rewarding his service with a pay freeze.

We have three children, and are currently receiving Food
Stamps. So as you can see even under Federal Guide Lines, my
husband does not earn enough to support his family. I do not
know of a job outside of the military where a man would swear
to lay down his life, for \$11,704.44 a year. My husband works
with munitions of all types every day, is subject to seperation
from his family for months at a time, and because of his job,
in the event of war he would be one of the first deployed. I
feel that he has a very dangerous job, and this is just one man,
what of the 2 million others?

I know things have improved for the military family over the past few years, but there are still things that can, and should be done to improve the way of life.

We do receive medical care, but as you must know there is a severe shortage of medical personell, and as a result care is limited. Dependants are only authorized emergency dental care, and although we can receive eye exams, we must go elsewhere for our eye glasses. We relocate on an average of every three years, with a maximum of 6 months notice. The Government will move our furnishings, and give us transportation to the nearest port if we are stationed over seas, we must provide the funds to reach our next station, it is true however that we will be reimbursed once we reach our next station, but I ask you to consider the cost of 5 one way air line tickets coast to coast, hotels, meals etc. We must have these funds available to us every three years. It is very difficult for many of us in the military to live from pay day to pay day let alone save the money needed for transfer. We do not ask for extravacant salaries, or outrageous benefits.

I know you have been under a great deal of pressure with the budget, but do you honestly feel that freezing military pay is the right answer? I have recently read reports of the USS New Jersey costing \$326 million to refit, and also a report of a computer chip that costs \$0.99 to make and is sold to the Government for \$144.00 apiece. It seems to me that there's waste there somewhere. I strongly believe in what you are trying to do, but feel that there must be other ways to find the funds you need. Please reconsider the steps you are taking, there must be

an alternative somewhere. I am praying that you can find another answer, but if not please include all federal workers. I'm sure the members of the House and Senate could afford it more than we could. We would be more willing to tighten our belts if we felt we were not the only ones who had to face it. This years raise will amount to about \$240.00 for the year, it may not be much but it will put shoes on the kids.

Around Christmas I asked businesses all over America to see if they couldn't take on at least one more employee. Since then I've been flooded with mail from small businesses that did that.



I do not have the background to argue how much is needed for defense but I do support your principle of peace through strength. If a reduction in social spending is necessary to maintain the military, so be it. Without freedom, there are no social issues.

Most Reverend and dear Bishop Hoffman:

Some weeks ago you had publicly requested in the Chronicle a response to the Second Draft of the Bishops' Pastoral on War & Peace.

I have read the Draft with great interest and have been trying to find some avenue of comment without dissecting the entire document - it is so ponderous! I doubt that there is anyone who rejects all of it or anyone who embrasses all of it.

Recently I came across a statement which briefly reflects my personal view of the Second Draft. I share it with you.

"During the Civil War of 1918-20 (in Russia), the communists seeking to have no other contenders for power, set about liquidating all other political parties as well as all neutral cultural, religious, ethnic, and economic organizations. They instituted relentless mass exterminations... Entire social strata were destroyed en masse - the nobility, the officers, the clergy, the merchants - as well as individuals who happened to stand out from the crowd. Immediately thereafter came the annihilation of some 12 to 15 million of the most diligent peasants. What was the point of destroying the best, the hardest working part of the peasantry? We would understand nothing about communism if we tried to comprehend it on the principles of normal human reason. The driving force of communism as it was devised by Marx, is political power, power at any cost and without regard to human losses or a people's physical deterioration." (Aleksandr Solzhenitsyn)

It is my firm conviction that any statement by the Bishops which does not face the above reality will not have the support of American Catholics. There is genuine danger of separation of people from their bishops over this issue. The "sensus fidelium" is strong in this area.
