
I understand that Chancellor Bruno Kreisky of Austria will meet with President Reagan in Washington, D.C., on February 3rd next year at the White House.

# Best china, heaviest security for the queen

Sir Francis Drake, Queen Elizabeth I's dashing plunderer, claimed California for the Crown in 1579. Four hundred years later, a reigning monarch of England is about to set foot for the first time on one of the richest bits of real estate the empire ever lost.

Various members of the British royal family have been here before — her husband, son, sister and cousin, for instance — but, as vulgar Americans might say, this is the big enchilada.

Queen Elizabeth II, the 42nd sovereign of England since William the Conqueror forced the uncouth Anglo-Saxons to accept his French brand of civilization, embodies all that is mystifying and fascinating about British monarchy.

Because the queen is not visiting Washington, D.C., her tour of California — which begins Feb. 28 in San Diego — is being called an official visit, but it will have all the trappings of a state visit.

With President and Mrs. Reagan hosting an official dinner for her in San Francisco and, in turn, being entertained aboard the royal yacht for their 31st wedding anniversary, the pomp and security here for the two heads of state will be greater than at

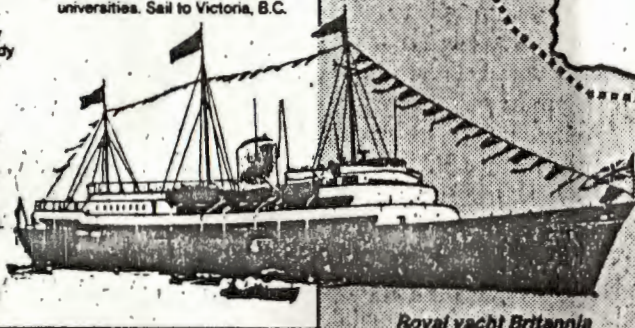

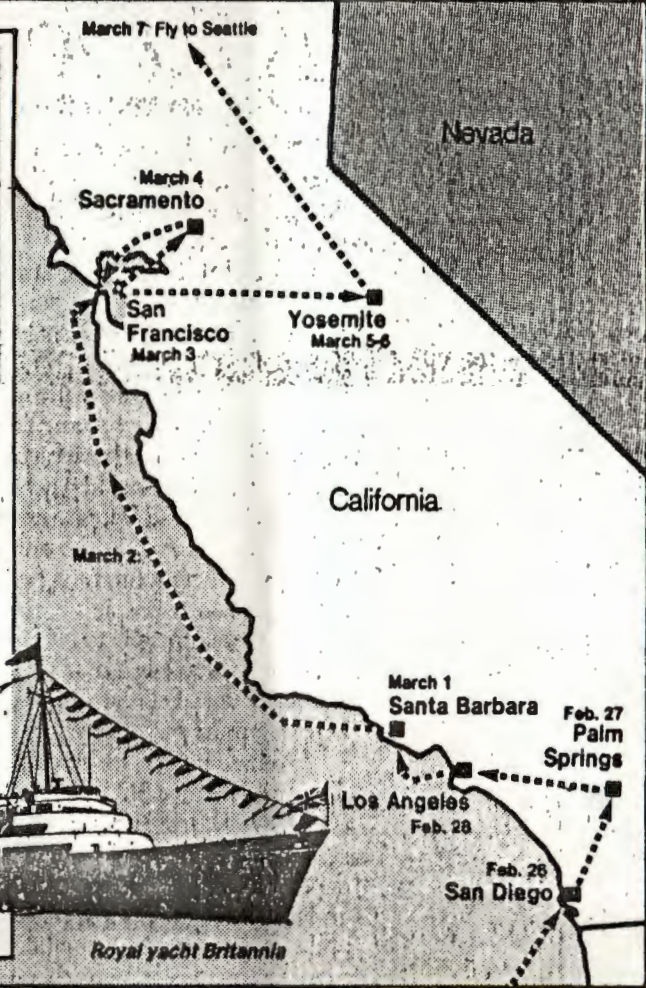

any time since the United Nations was founded in 1945.

Says the head of the San Francisco Police Department's intelligence division, Capt. Daniel Murphy, noting that members of the local Irish community

are promising massive demonstrations: "It's going to be an extraordinary effort."

White House aide William Sittman, who was involved in the security for Prince Charles' visit here in 1977 when

Irish sympathizers laid out black coffins on the streets, said:

"The security for Prince Charles was massive. For the queen's visit, multiply that by 10. The security ar-

rangements will be gigantic."

But the Secret Service's protective zeal is known to be disturbing Buckingham Palace officials. Britain's most-traveled monarch likes a friendly chat with citizens during her royal tours, creating obvious security headaches.

Palace officials call these informal street contacts "walkabouts." The blushing Prince Charles, following his mother's example, managed to be kissed quite a few times by ardent American admirers during his walkabouts here.

The queen will be riding in a bulletproof limousine between official stops here, but Sittman said the White House had promised the palace that if the Secret Service considers the crowd danger slight she will be permitted to mingle with ordinary folk.

"Walkabouts will be very spontaneous. No one will know they are going to happen until the last minute," Sittman said.

Since a brief itinerary of her West Coast tour was released late last month, British officials and White House staff have held back further details — saying arrangements were incomplete.

But The Examiner has learned that the queen and the Duke of Edinburgh will use a presidential 707 jetliner, used as a backup on President Reagan's trips to Europe and South America, during brief flights to Palm Springs and Sacramento.

The highlights of their visit to Southern California are likely to be horse riding on Reagan's hilltop ranch near Santa Barbara (the queen, who dotes on horses and corgi dogs, went riding with the president when he stayed at Windsor Castle during a European trip last June) and a gala dinner at 20th Century-Fox's studios.

Frank Sinatra, overseeing the entertainment on a transformed "M\*A\*S\*H" set, has lined up George Burns, Perry Como, Dionne Warwick and Les Brown and His Band of Renown with Ed McMahon as emcee.

The president will not accompany Mrs. Reagan when she sails with the queen aboard Britannia from Santa Barbara to San Francisco — a brief voyage that the palace hopes will not encounter stormy weather because the 57-year-old British monarch is a notoriously poor sailor.

The Britannia, virtually a regal mini-liner manned by a Royal Navy crew of 22 officers and 254 sailors commanded by a rear admiral, is scheduled to sail under the Golden Gate Bridge early on March 3 and dock at an as-yet-undecided San Francisco pier.

The queen's first event of that day is an 11 a.m. civic reception at either City Hall or the Opera House.

"The rotunda of City Hall would be ideal," says Charlotte

Mailliard, The City's deputy chief of protocol. "That is Mayor Feinstein's choice, too."

But the security problems presented by a City Hall open for normal business are considered insurmountable. There is a possibility, however, that City Hall will be closed for several hours in the morning for the first time in its 87-year history.

Mailliard said coveted invitations for the reception will be limited to between 1,500 and 2,000. She is also studying offers of entertainment during the reception from such groups as the Symphony, the Boys Chorus, the Ballet and the Beach Blanket Babylon cast.

"There's something special for Americans in the queen of England coming here," Mailliard said. "This is going to be a grand test for the city that knows how. I would love her to say later that she had the greatest welcome in San Francisco."

Mailliard said she is hoping for a "creative outpouring of hospitality."

Following the reception, Queen Elizabeth and Prince

Philip will drive down to Stanford for lunch with university president Donald Kennedy and his wife.

Stanford spokesman Donald Stokes, a former British consular official who helped to arrange previous royal visits to the Bay Area, says there is great competition among students to be among the 80 luncheon guests.

"They are becoming quite ingenious in their scramble for invitations," he said.

After lunch, the royal couple will visit the Cupertino plant of electronics giant Hewlett-Packard, touring a research laboratory and computer manufacturing area guided by company co-founder David Packard. The visit, including talks with workers, is scheduled to last about an hour.

The evening's official dinner, hosted by President and Mrs. Reagan, will be in the Hearst Court of the M.H. de Young Memorial Museum in Golden Gate Park.

Sheila Tate, Mrs. Reagan's press secretary, said the affair will be catered by the St. Francis Hotel.

"The dinner will be larger than usual. Most state dinners

at the White House are limited to 120 guests. But we expect to invite 280 or 280 to this one. Guests will be coming from all over the country, and will include political, entertainment, business and sports leaders," she said.

The following day the queen will fly to Sacramento aboard the presidential jet for lunch with Gov. Deukmejian and about 150 guests in the newly renovated rotunda of the State Capitol, after a brief visit to historical Sutter's Fort near the Capitol and to the legislative chambers.

Bob Wolfe, an aide to the governor, said Buckingham Palace had requested a simple meal but the menu was still undecided. He promised, however, the fare would be richer than the famous bean-sprout sandwich Prince Charles received from Gov. Jerry Brown.

Back in San Francisco, the queen will attend a reception for local members of the British community in British Consul-General John Beaven's Pacific Heights home.

Then the Queen and Prince Philip will entertain President and Mrs. Reagan at the Reagans' 31st wedding anniversary dinner in the 45-foot-long dining room aboard the Britannia, whose spacious living quarters furnished in the style of a country mansion can accommodate up to 50 guests and staff.

Only 54 guests will be at the dinner, including the mayor and local dignitaries, but another 200 guests will be invited aboard for a post-dinner reception ending with a Royal Marine Band concert.

During the weekend of March 5 and 6, the British monarch and her husband will rest up in Yosemite before flying to Seattle and the end of the U.S. portion of their tour.

The royal couple will occupy the \$352-a-night, sixth-floor penthouse of the Ahwahnee Hotel, with its sweeping views of Yosemite's natural wonders and the oak, pine and redwood trees of the valley.

The penthouse's two bedrooms and a parlor with a stone fireplace are furnished in homey, colonial style. They are served by an elevator that must be operated by a special key.

The royal entourage of about 200 officials and security men will occupy the entire 121-room hotel for the weekend, plus part of the Ahwahnee Lodge.

Ed Hardy, president of the Yosemite Park & Curry Co., said 43 reservations for the hotel were canceled for the weekend.

At Yosemite, the queen and Prince Philip may walk around Mirror Lake or go horseback riding. If the weather is bad, Hardy said, they could tour the park in vehicles or watch naturalist slide shows and movies.

# Bay area Irish plan hot royal reception

There will be an Irish welcome for the Queen in San Francisco during her visit to California next month — but not the kind she usually receives on royal tours abroad.

The Bay area's Irish-American nationalists are planning a carnival style demonstration to disrupt the visit, with Irish reels played at disco sound level, free beer, and other undisclosed "pranks."

"Our aim is to embarrass the symbol of the British occupation of Ulster," said Mr John Maher, chief organiser of the protest campaign, and an influential Irish-American activist in the city. He said its supporters are expected to contribute at least \$50,000 to finance the protest, including full-page anti-British newspaper advertisements and radio commercials.

The Queen and Prince Philip are visiting California for 10 days beginning on February 26. Their hosts will be Mr and Mrs Reagan, and they will visit the President's Santa Barbara ranch as well as Los Angeles and Sacramento.

The Bay area's Irish-American community numbers about 10,000. Protest organisers also expect support from trade unions, local politicians, pro-nationalist activists, and the Irish Northern Aid (Noraid) group, recently accused of running guns to the IRA.

They also expect support from Hispanics angered by the Falklands war and from "queens against the Queen" — protesting against the dismissal of the former royal bodyguard, Commander Michael Trestrail. Funds are being collected from the local carpenters' and plasterers' unions, both led by Irish-born sympathisers.

The San Francisco Irish community has effectively protested against visits by Prince Charles and Princess Margaret in the past. "But this one will be the biggy," said Irish-born Seamus Gibney of Noraid, who has given up his builder's job to work full-time on the anti-royal campaign.

Although protest leaders promise no violence, and the campaign has a light-hearted element, thousands of leaflets are to be distributed designating Her Majesty as "the queen of torture."

"We want to demonstrate to the British people the depth of feeling in America about Ulster," Mr Maher said.

Among plans to disrupt the visit — not all of which may be carried out — will be a flotilla of boats to greet and possibly blockade the Royal Yacht Britannia on its arrival through the Golden Gate bridge, a look-alike royal couple in an open limousine, free beer as a pavement crowd diversion, and a celtic cacophony of loudspeaker music, whistles, and dustbin lids.

A formal resolution dissociating the city from the visit is to be put before the city council by Mr Maher's brother. It has an outside chance of passing.
