Soviet Reaction to Chun Visit

The Soviet news agency TASS offers the following analysis of your meeting with President Chun of the Republic of Korea.

* * * * * *

The United States is going to continue rendering all-round support to the repressive South Korean regime, regarding it as one of its main strategic "strongholds" in Asia and the Pacific region. This is the main result of the talks, held here between United States President Ronald Reagan and the visiting Seoul dictator Chon Tu-Hwan.

Their joint communique points out that both sides reaffirmed their allegiance to the treaty between the United States and South Korea on so-called "mutual defence" of 1954, which essentially made South Korea a place d'armes of the American military in the Far East. President Reagan stated, the communique stresses, that the United States had no plans for the withdrawal of American military units from the Korean peninsula. The United States undertook to continue facilitating the military buildup of the Seoul regime, pledging to supply arms and industrial equipment for strengthening the defence potential of South Korea.

Observors assess this position as a direct pointer indicating that the new American administration resolved finally to bury the widely publicized plans for a gradual withdrawal of American forces from South Korea, announced by the Carter administration in 1977.

The warm welcome accorded by official Washington to the stranglers of freedom in South Korea, sparked off a vigorous protest by the American public. These days, demonstrations are being staged outside the White House and the dictator's residence, denouncing Washington's support for the bloody dictator, calling for an end to crude United States intervention in the internal affairs of South Korea and other countries, to the fanning of military psychosis.
