BACKGROUND:

Over the past year, the White House has received numerous requests from organizations to make Bible presentations during 1983, the Year of the Bible. A Bible presentation by Guy Sanders of the Gideons has been scheduled for December 22nd during administrative time. There are four other worthy groups with similar requests which could be accomodated at the same time.

Laymen's National Bible Committee is a widely respected 43 year old interfaith, nonsectarian organization working to foster study of the Bible among Americans. Their presentation would be by the National Chairman of National Bible Week 1983, Mr. William Ellinghaus, the president of AT&T.

Seventh-day Adventist Church is a conservative Protestant denomination headquartered in suburban Washington with four million adult members worldwide. Their presentation would be by Elder Charles Bradford, the black leader of this predominantly white church in North America.

Living Bible International translates and prints Bibles in 140 foreign languages and has distributed 40 million copies of the Living Bible around the world. Their presentation would be by their president, Dr. Kenneth Taylor, the scholar who from the ancient languages paraphrased the Living Bible, the world's most popular paraphrase of the Bible.

Thomas Nelson Publishers is the largest Bible publisher in the world; they also published "Prayer for our President and 250,000 copies of the interview "Reagan, A Man of Faith." Their presentation would be by their president, Mr. Sam Moore, a long-time personal acquaintance of the President's,



Dear Mr. President:

I want to take this opportunity to tell you what an outstanding job our international shooting competitors did in the Pan American Games at Caracas, Venezuela, earlier this month.

The National Rifle Association of America is the National Governing Body for the Shooting Sports in the United States, and we are enthusiastic about the United States possibilities in the XXIII Olympiad in the Los Angeles area next year. The Olympic shooting events will be at the Prado Dam Recreation Area in San Bernardino County.

The USA Team captured 16 individual gold medals, 15 team gold medals, 12 individual silver medals, three team silver medals, and two individual bronze medals in the Pan American Games. Two of the gold medal winners broke world records: Daniel Carlisle in trap with a perfect 200 x 200 score and Erich Buljung in standard pistol with 584 x 600. Erich won gold medals in two other events, also.

Incidentally, five of the individual gold medal winners were women, two of whom were junior shooters, and four team gold medals were from the women's teams. In addition, there was a fatherdaughter combination of gold medal winners. We are very proud of all our international shooting competitors.

# MEETING WITH SUPPORTERS OF TUITION TAX CREDITS

#### I. PURPOSE:

To discuss legislative plans for tuition tax credits.

#### II. BACKGROUND:

The tuition tax credit coalition first met with you on June 22, 1982 at which time the group pledged full support to the tuition tax credit bill your staff had hammered out in previous meetings with them. The coalition recommended at that meeting that tuition tax credit legislation be attached to a major House-passed revenue bill. White House reaction to this recommendation was positive, and the coalition devoted significant resources to developing Congressional support for this approach. On one occasion later, Secretary Regan publicly expressed a preference for keeping tuition tax credit legislation as a distinct bill, and in fact, your bill has never been moved as an amendment to any piece of legislation. The coalition knows that some GOP Senators do not want to vote on this issue. Tuition tax credit leaders suspect that the White House will give them only lip service and, in the end, not fight to get your bill attached to a Housepassed revenue bill. Frustration on this issue is Some Catholic tuition tax credit leaders building. have been publically contemptuous of your efforts to date. Protestant school leaders are even more upset. In addition to tuition tax credits, they have concerns over Administration actions they view as hostile: various Justice Department decisions on specific cases, the new Social Security taxation of religious schools, and Labor Department decisions relating to unemployment insurance taxation. They will tell you that their coalition with the Administration will blow apart if there is no two-House strategy leading to a Senate vote this year.

# SUGGESTED TALKING POINTS FOR MEETING WITH TUITION TAX CREDIT COALITION

- -- It is a pleasure to welcome this coalition back to the White House.
- June 22nd of last year, we all agreed to fight hard for the tuition tax credit bill which we had drafted together.
- -- Since that time, our coalition has made some progress.

  We worked to get the bill through the Senate Finance

  Committee in a form which was acceptable. After a

  couple of close tough fights, we won that battle, and

  now have a good bill ready for Senate floor action.
- -- Now we are confronted with the need to get our bill through the Senate and then through the House. I know full well that only a two-House strategy will work.
- On Wednesday of this week, I spoke with Senator Howard
  Baker and Senator Bob Dole on this topic. I urged
  them to help us get tuition tax credits as an amendment
  to a House-passed revenue bill this year.
- -- In response, the two Senators gave me a firm commitment that tuition tax credits will be taken up on the Senate floor this year.

- -- Now, I know you will ask if the Senators agreed to a specific, House-passed revenue bill as a vehicle. They did not. They agreed that they would get back together with me very soon to work out a specific strategy for Senate passage.
- -- I called you all in today to let you know the current status of this bill we all support. It is at the very top of my domestic legislation priority list.
- -- As you know, my staff has in the past year proposed alternate legislative vehicles for tuition tax credits. For various reasons, these proposals were not adopted by our supporters in the Senate.
- -- I want you all to know now that I am personally involved with the Senators on this bill. And I will settle for nothing less than a two-House strategy which can bring this long overdue bill to my desk for signature.

I want to take this opportunity to tell you what an outstanding job our international shooting competitors did in the Pan American Games at Caracas, Venezuela, earlier this month.

The National Rifle Association of America is the National Governing Body for the Shooting Sports in the United States, and we are enthusiastic about the United States possibilities in the XXIII Olympiad in the Los Angeles area next year. The Olympic shooting events will be at the Prado Dam Recreation Area in San Bernardino County.

The USA Team captured 16 individual gold medals, 15 team gold medals, 12 individual silver medals, three team silver medals, and two individual bronze medals in the Pan American Games. Two of the gold medal winners broke world records: Daniel Carlisle in trap with a perfect 200 x 200 score and Erich Buljung in standard pistol with 584 x 600. Erich won gold medals in two other events, also.

Incidentally, five of the individual gold medal winners were women, two of whom were junior shooters, and four team gold medals were from the women's teams. In addition, there was a father-daughter combination of gold medal winners. We are very proud of all our international shooting competitors.



TIME DOES NOT ALLOW FULL ACKNOWLEDGEMENT OF ALL THE WONDERFUL PEOPLE, MANY HERE TODAY, THAT HAVE BEEN TOUCHED BY THIS FLAG AND WHAT IT REPRESENTS, AND IN TURN HAVE BREATHED LIFE INTO ITS PROGRESS, BUT I WOULD LIKE TO TELL YOU OF A FEW . . .

Some years ago, just beyond me at the Washington Monument, Carl Sandburg said:

"THE REPUBLIC IS A DREAM."
NOTHING HAPPENS UNLESS FIRST A DREAM."

THIS FLAG HAS BEEN A DREAM, AND ALL OF YOU PRESENT TODAY, ALONG WITH THOUSANDS MORE, HAVE BEEN A PART OF MAKING THIS DREAM HAPPEN.

FOR ME, IT BEGAN WITH AN 8 YEAR OLD BOY, FLEEING THE OPPRESSION OF CZARIST RUSSIA ON AN OXCART WITH HIS MOTHER AND INFANT SISTER, ACROSS ERUOPE TO AMSTERDAM, THEN A SHIP'S HOLD, CROWDED WITH OTHER HUNGRY AND DESPERATE IMMIGRANTS, YEARNING 10 SEE THE STATUE OF LIBERTY AND THE FANTASY SHE REPRESENTED.

My father repeated the story of that family trek over and over to me when I was a boy, concerned that I would take for granted the freedom and opportunity I was born into.

THIS FLAG REPRESENTS HIM, AND THE MILLIONS OF OUR FOREBEARS,
THAT KNEW FROM WHENCE THEY CAME . . . AND APPRECIATED WHAT THEY
HAD COME TO HAVE.

7 YEARS AGO, ALMOST TO A DAY, I STOOD ON THE NARROWS BRIDGE OVERLOOKING NEW YORK HARBOR, WITH 30 IRONWORKERS, AND GEORGE SCHOEPFER, DIRECTOR OF THE TRIBOROUGH BRIDGE AND TUNNEL AUTHORITY. WE SAW A DREAM RISE IN MAGNIFICENT GLORY . . . LATER TO SNAG AND RENT SLOWLY APART. THAT NIGHT THE BRIDGE AUTHORITY'S SWITCHBOARD WAS BESIEGED WITH HUNDREDS OF OFFERS OF HELP . . . AND I TOLD

GEORGE THAT I FELT WE HAD STARTED SOMETHING THAT HAD TO BE FINISHED, BIGGER AND BETTER THAN BEFORE. HE SAID, "I'LL BE THERE WHEN YOU NEED ME." . . . HE ALWAYS HAS BEEN!

FOR MORE THAN A YEAR, I SOUGHT CORPORATE HELP TO GET THE PROJECT STARTED, TO MAKE A NEW FLAG. I WROTE, CALLED AND VISITED SCORES OF CORPORATIONS WITH NO SUCCESS... UNTIL I TALKED WITH MICHEL BERGERAC, CHAIRMAN OF REVLON. BEING FRENCH-BORN, HE KNEW OF BARTHOLDI'S 21 YEAR DREAM OF ERECTING THE STATUE OF LIBERTY. WITH MICHEL'S HELP THE GREAT AMERICAN FLAG FUND WAS FOUNDED.

THERE WAS A MOMENT WHEN THE FLAG, NEW COMPLETED HAD NO FUNDS TO BE MOVED . . . AND LAY STRANDED IN A TRUCK DEPOT IN EVANSVILLE, INDIANA. ONCE MORE A BROAD APPEAL . . .
