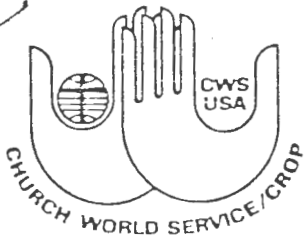

I am writing to request a meeting with either the President, Mrs. Reagan, or any other appropriate White House staff for Mr. Chris Loftis anytime during the 18th - 22nd of August, 1983. Chris Loftis is a Duke University Graduate now studying at Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary in North Carolina. Last summer he walked 500 miles across the state of North Carolina, singing, playing his guitar, and raising awareness for Church World Service/CROP about the local and global hunger situation. This summer he will be walking through North Carolina and Virginia to the District of Columbia, meeting with Governors Hunt and Robb on his way and calling attention to how one involved person can make a difference.

He writes many of his own songs, and has performed them in local North Carolina restaurants, campuses, churches, and CROP Walks for the Hungry. He sang with the late Harry Chapin on two occasions, and shares his celebrated concern and involvement on behalf of the world's one billion hungry.

Chris can help us a great deal if he can dismantle the notion in people's minds that nothing can be done about hunger. The message of Chris Loftis is that we must work hard to fight poverty and hunger in the world, and that this work must be offered in the spirit of celebration. Chris is one of the few young men today with a vision of a better tomorrow. His message is one of tremendous hope.

Church World Service/CROP, the sponsoring agency, is a thirty-five year old relief and self-help development organization of 34 Protestant denominations in the U.S. with projects in over fifty of the world's most poverty-stricken regions. It delivers emergency relief to refugee camps and to victims of natural and man-made disasters, as well as administering food for work, water development, sanitation, literacy, and nutrition development projects in many rural areas of the world where annual per capita income averages no more than \$60-80. Over 90% of every contributed dollar to CWS is used for on-site programs both in this country and abroad.



If there would be any time between the 18th and the 22nd available, we would like to arrange a meeting, either for a short discussion and photos, or for Chris to sing.

The Comfort Of Indifference

In case you missed Kays Gary's column of a week ago Tuesday, we want to repeat a quote that was worth ripping out of the paper and saving:

"Our defense mechanism against the poor is that we refuse to know them, to see their faces. If we see a child and mother doing the best they can and struggling to stay alive we feel guilt, and help. But if we don't know them, if we don't see their faces, we can stay guilt-free by assuming they are stupid, lazy, worthless."

It's comforting to know that the fellow who said that, a Duke University graduate named Chris Loftis, is planning to study for the ministry at Southeastern Seminary. We need more religious leaders like Mr. Loftis, people who feel compelled to do more than quote Matthew 25 to us as part of a sermon, people who are angry about poverty and injustice in this rich nation.

Few of us have the courage to do

what Mr. Loftis did: walk 500 miles across North Carolina in 60 days to call attention to the Church World Service's CROP program to fight hunger here and abroad. If we did, we would see what Chris Loftis saw — including street people eating out of garbage cans — and we might become as angry as he, and as determined to change the world.

But most of us try to avoid the discomfort of that kind of vision. And many of our religious leaders, cautiously rationing their own effectiveness, are content for the most part to quote those biblical passages in our temples and churches on the sabbath rather than vigorously protesting our indifference.

So it's generally easy to assume no responsibility for the suffering of our fellow travelers on this Earth. That's why people like Chris Loftis make us uncomfortable. They're such a nuisance — and so very valuable.

remain, but now have become the major practical pro-life effort which directly assists those who otherwise might be pressured into having abortions.

Please bear in mind that AAI is strictly a service movement, not involving itself in the political arena, but devoting its efforts entirely to the appeals for assistance by the millions who are confronted with problem pregnancies, and who, without such support, might succumb to the blandishments of those seeking - for whatever reason - to promote abortion as a proper expedient over the convictions and wishes of such distressed persons.

By being non-political, these centers can come closer to reaching the millions today who are so desperately in need of personal and practical support. By being non-political, AAI is unhampered by adversaries and thus in a position to help turn around the thinking of those under pressure by forces of the anti-life movement.

Mr. President, with this in mind we hope you will seriously consider accepting our invitation and address the gathering at our Annual Banquet. Naturally, because our groups are made up of more than 99% volunteer workers, both professional and para-professional, the strictly volunteer nature of this endeavor should meet with the often expressed approval by you and Mrs. Reagan. We would therefore be most honored to have the First Lady along with you for a most important source of inspiration and support.

Politically speaking, there may be some merit to recall that Michigan was one state in which a plebiscite was conducted on the subject of abortion, now more than ten years ago. Those who voted rejected abortion in 81 of 83 counties there. Then too, the Michigan legislature has nine times passed restrictive ruling on abortion, only to have such measures vetoed by the then Governor.

Thank you very much for your consideration of our large request on behalf of the American people, the people of the world -- their mothers, their babies and their families.

Dear Mr. President:

There is no reason you should remember me, but I served with the Religious Subcommittee of the Presidential Inaugural Committee in setting up the Sunday worship service the week of your inauguration. My position was one of liaison between the committee and various media groups. I also represented a mentally retarded bell choir which performed for the service and for which Mrs. Reagan graciously provided tickets for the parade during those festivities.

As Vice President for Communications of the National Benevolent Association, one of my responsibilities is a dinner for approximately 1,000 people held by NBA biannually in connection with the General Assemblies of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ). There will be a probable total attendance of 8,000 to 10,000 persons at the Assembly. The National Benevolent Association is the Division of Social and Health Services of the Christian Church and owns, operates, sponsors or is affiliated with over 50 care facilities throughout the United States including Alaska. NBA provides services to children, mentally retarded persons, and older adults. The facilities range from low income housing for older persons, through retirement villages, residential care centers for emotionally disturbed children, emergency shelters for battered children and teens, community programs in child abuse and single parenting, residential and community housing for mentally retarded, and a myriad of other social services. Our facilities rely heavily on government funding in many instances.

At the dinner to be held at the General Assembly in San Antonio, Texas, on September 25, 1983, we plan to launch campaigns for eleven of the facilities which will tie in to a later campaign for national NBA to raise funds, primarily endowment funds in order to build reserves allowing our facilities to more fully operate with less government funding. This we believe to be in full keeping with your proposed economic program. The total NBA campaign will culminate in 1987, at which time NBA will be celebrating its 100th anniversary of service.
