



In the attached memorandum to Vickers Bryan of my staff, you asked for Presidential highball glasses and White House tote bags to use as gifts for members of your staff.

Our policy is that glasses and tote bags are not to be used as gifts to staff for the simple reason that we cannot afford to stock these items in numbers sufficient to give them to every staff member who wants one. These gifts are only given to staff upon their departure -- Presidential glasses for senior staff, and tote bags for support staff. For special occasions other than departure from the staff, such as a marriage or birth of a child, we try to have a special Presidential letter sent.

Less expensive items are available for more general distribution, including to staff, such as cufflinks, tie bars and stickpins. Please let me know if these would fulfill your purpose.

This is in response to your memorandum of December 11 requesting a <u>supply of gifts</u> for Mrs. Reagan's Press Office to present to volunteer press advance people and other local volunteers on Mrs. Reagan's trips.

It is my understanding that "trip packs" containing an assortment of gifts normally given to local volunteers--cuff links, tie bars, stick pins and pens--are made available to the First Lady's Office for each of her trips. You may want to discuss this with Marty Coyne and let me know if the supply is insufficient.

The other items that you requested are not normally included in the trip packs. Their distribution is restricted and, therefore, handled on a case-by-case basis with Jim Rosebush's office. This system of funnelling requests for limited distribution items through the head of the office is used for all White House offices and seems to work well. I see no need to change this long-standing practice.

I do not mean to imply that I disagree with your assertion that volunteers deserve special recognition; of course they do. And if the current system does not accommodate this goal, I would be happy to discuss possible improvements with you, Jim, Lee and Marty.

Mr. Regan's request for a pager and two tote bags for Nancy Fiester has been approved.

I want to comment, however, on the tote bag request. As you may know, the RNC provides limited funds to the President for gifts that he can give, or are given on his behalf by senior White House staff, to visitors and guests. The intent is not to use money contributed to the RNC to provide souvenirs to White House staff. Accordingly, long-standing policy is that Presidential gifts are given to staff only on special occasions such as departures, weddings and so forth.

I bring this to your attention because I believe it is particularly inappropriate for the employees of the Chief of Staff's office to be the exception to this rule. Such preferential treatment can only lead to criticism and resentment directed to the Chief of Staff and his immediate staff.

I hope you will convey to members of your office the reason for my reluctance to provide Presidential gifts to them. I will do so, of course, upon Mr. Regan's request, but I believe he, too, should know of the potential for criticism. If you would like, I will mention this to Mr. Regan.


