White House Public Liaison Schedule Proposal

Jack Burgess, White House Public Liaison, called this morning to inform me that his office is submitting a schedule proposal for a Presidential signing ceremony of Senate Concurrent Resolution 18. This resolution requests that the President call upon the Soviet government "to secure the freedom of religious worship in places of both churches and all other independent religions as their own constitution provides for," and specifically, "to permit the concrete resurrection of both the Ukrainian Orthodox and Catholic Churches and other independent religions in the USSR." As this is the first resolution passed by Congress which cites the liquidation of two national churches in the USSR and calls for their resurrection, the White House Public Liaison would like to use it as part of a broader campaign to reaffirm the Administration's commitment to human rights.

I recommend that NSC concur with the White House Public Liaison proposal. A signing ceremony would proffer an opportunity to focus on Soviet violations of an inalienable right, the freedom of worship, which has received relatively little attention from this Administration, and would enable the President to make a public statement emphasizing the U.S. belief in the importance of religious freedom. It would especially be a strong and needed offset to Billy Graham's remarks about the measure of religious freedom in the Soviet Union. As Jack Burgess pointed out, a signing ceremony would also have domestic political advantages. Since Senator Goldwater sponsored the resolution, this would allow the President, before the November elections, to credit those Republicans in the Senate and House who co-sponsored the resolution.

Given the time constraints on submitting schedule proposals, an NSC decision is needed by 2:00 p.m. today.

#### RECOMMENDATION

That NSC concur with the White House Public Liaison Office proposal for a Presidential signing ceremony of Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 18.

AS YOU KNOW, I, ALONG WITH MY WIFE, AUGUSTINA, AND TWO OF MY DAUGHTERS, LIUBA AND LILIA, AM RESIDING IN THE AMERICAN EMBASSY IN MOSCOW BECAUSE THE SOVIET GOVERNMENT WILL NOT PERMIT US TO EMIGRATE. THE OTHER PART OF MY FAMILY OF 12 CHILDREN LIVES IN CHERNOGORSK.

WE ARE GRATEFUL TO YOU PERSONALLY, MR. PRESIDENT, AND TO YOUR GOVERNMENT FOR YOUR EFFORTS TO REACH AN AGREEMENT WITH THE SOVIET AUTHORITIES SO THAT WE MAY FINALLY LEAVE FOR THE WEST.

I AM AWARE THAT YOUR GOVERNMENT IS WORKING CLOSELY WITH THE FEDERAL REPUBLIC OF GERMANY TO FIND A SOLUTION TO THIS TERRIBLY DIFFICULT PROBLEM. THE FACT THAT MY COUSIN, GRIGORII VASHCHENKO, HAS BEEN PERMITTED TO EMIGRATE TO THE FRG IS A VERY HELPFUL SIGN AND A POSITIVE INDICATION THAT AN ANSWER CAN BE FOUND.

IN ADDITION TO EXPRESSING MY APPRECIATION TO YOU IN THE LETTER I ALSO WISH TO INFORM YOU ABOUT A FURTHER COMPLICATION IN THE LIFE OF MY FAMILY, THAT IS, THE SERIOUS ILLNESS OF MY WIFE. AS YOU MAY KNOW, MY WIFE SUFFERS ULCERATED COLITIS AND FIBROMA. DOCTOR HAS TOLD US IN THE PAST (THREE YEARS AGO) THAT SHE REQUIRES SURGERY. IN RECENT MONTHS HER CONDITION HAS DETERIORATED, AND THE NEED OF SURGERY AS SOON AS POSSIBLE HAS BECOME QUITE PRESSING. ANY STEPS THAT YOU AND YOUR ADMINISTRATION CAN TAKE TO HELP US OUT OF THIS HORRIBLE SITUATION SO THAT

MESSAGE (CONTINUED):

WE CAN EMIGRATE TO THE WEST, OBTAIN THE NECESSARY MEDICAL TREATMENT FOR MY WIFE, AND FINALLY FIND PEACE OF MIND AND THE RELIGIOUS FREEDOM TO RAISE OUR CHILDREN ACCORDING TO THE PRINCIPLES OF THE BIBLE, WILL BE PROFOUNDLY APPRECIATED BY EVERY MEMBER OF MY FAMILY.

MAY GOD BLESS YOU AND GIVE YOU STRENGTH IN THESE DIFFICULT TIMES. SINCERELY YOURS, PETER VASHCHENKO. END QUOTE.

SUBJECT: My Second Session with Gromyko - October 4

Today's return meeting with Gromyko at the Soviet U.N. Hission went four-and-a-half hours. The atmosphere, as at our first session, was serious and devoid of polemics. Basic differences were not narrowed, but I believe we laid the foundation for future discussions.

Gromyko dealt at length on the Middle East. His main point was that as a major power close to the region the Soviet Union must be included in diplomatic efforts to achieve Middle East peace. While he reiterated familiar Soviet support for a Palestinian state, he went out of his way to repeat several times that the USSR also supports Israel's right to exist.

Discussion proceeded from the Arab-Israeli dispute to the Iran/Iraq war. This gave me the opportunity to tell Gromyko we consider the Gulf an area of vital importance to us, and if the conflict spreads to endanger our friends in the area this would be a matter of grave concern to us.

On human rights, I stressed Jewish emigration, and mentioned Anatoly Shcharanski as well as people with a claim to American citizenship who wish to emigrate. Gromyko claimed that emigration had declined because our relations have turned down, but did not budge on substance.

On Afghanistan, Gromyko sounded the same two notes as in the first meeting: the problem is mainly the result of outside interference, and the USSR favors the talks taking place under the UN Secretary General's auspices with Pakistan and Afghanistan.

I stressed the disruptive influence of Soviet support for the arms buildup and political subversion in the Caribbean/ Central America by Cuba and Nicaragua. I told Gromyko that the introduction of jet fighter aircraft or armed Cuban forces in Nicaragua would be unacceptable to the U.S.

On southern Africa, I described the efforts we and the Contact Group are making to achieve a Namibia settlement, and how Cuban troop withdrawal from Angola is related to it. Gromyko replied that the Soviets would like to see the problem solved, but emphasized that Cuban troops would only leave after the South Africans were out of Namibia.

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At the close of our meeting, I reiterated a point made last week: We are prepared to go in a more constructive direction in our relationship, or continue as we are. For our part, we would prefer to embark on a more constructive path, but the choice is up to the Soviet Union.

Soviet Ambassador Dobrynin Under Secretary Eagleburger

Subject: Proposal for Upcoming Shultz/Gromyko Bilateral

Summary. Ambassador Dobrynin met at his request with Under Secretary Eagleburger and passed on a Gromyko proposal that as a positive measure the second Shultz-Gromyko meeting would agree on some topics that the two sides would follow-up in later lower-level confidential, informal meetings. Areas mentioned were nuclear non-proliferation, restrictions on conventional arms sales, chemical weapons, Indian Ocean, and the Nuclear Test Ban. Dobrynin emphasized this was a non-inclusive list with the US free to add or subtract from it. End Summary.

1. Ambassador Dobrynin met at his request on Friday, October 1, with Under Secretary Eagleburger. He said that Foreign Minister Gromyko was looking ahead to the upcoming second Shultz-Gromyko bilateral and was thinking of what positive results could come of it. "Off the top of his head" there were a few areas where Gromyko thought something could be done. Dobrynin mentioned nuclear non-proliferation; the test ban treaty; the chemical warfare treaty; restrictions on sales of conventional weapons, and the Indian Ocean as some examples.

3. Under Secretary Eagleburger said that a point that bothered him was that all the Soviet suggestions were in the area of arms control. Dobrynin hastened to say that these were only rough suggestions and other issues could of course be suggested as well. He said that the Soviets did not expect us to agree to pursue all the Soviet suggestions. We were certainly free to state our objections on any of the topics. They wanted to throw out a variety of ideas for us to choose from.

<sup>2.</sup> Dobrynin emphasized that these were just suggestions and that the Soviets were open-minded and would welcome any other suggestions that we wished to make. Gromyko's idea would be that the topics could be briefly discussed in the Shultz-Gromyko meeting and agreement reached on which specific areas would be followed up. The follow-up would be done in a confidential, informal way at a lower level: perhaps by the respective Embassies in some instances; on the periphery of international conferences by experts in others, and so on. The method can be worked out; the point is to get agreement on what areas will be pursued.

Avital Shcharansky, wife of hunger-striking Jewish dissident Anatoly Shcharansky, called on me yesterday accompanied by Baruch Gur of the Israeli Embassy who evidently is seeking appointments for Avital with the President, Ed Meese and you. (Paula Dobriansky sent you a memorandum on this yesterday.) Secretary Shultz mentioned Avital's concern about her husband in his meeting with Gromyko yesterday.

Avital pressed me to do something to help save her husband's life and specifically suggested arranging an exchange. I told her that I would check with State Department officials and others to see what could be done. Gur said that Avital planned a trip to the Hill today to see, among others, Senator Percy. Gur also said he was trying to arrange a meeting with you and others in the White House, but did not mention the President.

The chances of freeing Anatoly are bleak indeed. We have several times in the past tried to arrange exchanges, but without success. If you or Bud see her, the only thing we can promise her is that we will keep on trying.

Secretary Shultz yesterday raised with Gromyko the general issue of human rights in the USSR including Soviet emigration policy. In this context, he mentioned that Avital was in Washington and planned some kind of demonstration or hunger strike. Gromyko replied that the U.S. has created a "less favorable climate" for resolving issues of this nature. This is, incidentally, the first time we can recall when the Soviets directly linked increased restrictions on emigration with the "climate" of U.S.-Soviet relations.

We should probably not tell Avital that Shultz raised the Shcharansky case with Gromyko. If this gets out, many others will be angered that we did not mention the cases of their relatives -- especially of those who claim U.S. citizenship and are not permitted to leave the Soviet Union. We can, however, tell her that the Secretary knows of her concerns and will do what he can to help.

YOU WILL RECALL THAT, IN A PREVIOUS COMMUNICATION TO YOU, I NOTED THAT, WHILE THE U.S. AND ISRAEL ENJOY CLOSE AND FRIENDLY RELATIONS, ISRAEL IS A SOVEREIGN STATE. I MUST. THEREFORE, CATEGORICALLY REJECT AS INAPPROPRIATE IN A COMMUNICATION BETWEEN US YOUR ALLEGATIONS CONCERNING

- -- CHARGE RESPONDED BY OUTLINING THE US POSITION ON LEBANON, STRESSING THE NECESSITY FOR THE REMOVAL OF ALL FOREIGN TROOPS. THE PRESIDENT HAS CLEARLY AND FORCEFULLY STATED OUR REVULSION OVER THE MASSACRES. IT MUST BE BORNE IN MIND THAT ISRAEL IS NOT THE ONLY POWER GUILTY OF MILITARY ACTION IN LEBANON. HABIB IS NOW BACK TO WORK ON THE PROBLEM OF FINDING A PEACEFUL RESOLUTION.

I concur wholeheartedly with the Robinson/Blair critique of the Foreign Ministers' East-West statement. It is a serious mistake to allow the pipeline issue to be delegated to such a low priority. We must, as your initial instructions indicated, seek a European commitment to limit Soviet gas purchases to present contracts and accelerate development of alternatives.

Recent cables in from Norway and talks with senior Nigerian officials indicate that this type of political statement is essential if producer countries are to get off dead center in developing alternatives. They are looking for it and counting on us to deliver. Market share for large-scale alternatives must be preserved, and the most efficient means to accomplish this is by a commitment to limit purchases to present contracts.

Otherwise, the Soviet Union will be the marginal supplier of gas to Europe, and there is no doubt in my mind that they will eliminate the competition even if they have to sell marginal gas at uncompetitively low prices. A recent CIA study concurs with my earlier assessment that the Soviets -- by using spare capacity in both existing lines and the first strand of the Siberian pipeline -- can eliminate large-scale competitors. They do not need a second strand to capture the European gas market. (That is why we must be wary of agreeing too quickly to no second strand unless it accompanies a statement about no further purchases and development of alternatives.)

The overall statement is good, but we will be judged by the operative elements. Having lived in the international energy communique world for most of the last decade, I can honestly say that nice sounding communiques usually produce a sense of accomplishment and relief when completed, yet rarely are they effectively implemented unless there are specific commitments. All we need is a one sentence commitment from the Europeans to not purchase any more Soviet gas. The public, including Ruhrgas, the Norwegians, and the Nigerians will read that signal loud and clear.

Integrity of Agricultural Contracts

Ever since the lifting of the embargo on grain sales to the Soviet Union, the agricultural community — and its representatives in Congress — have pressed the Administration to grant delivery assurances on agricultural export contracts. While the Administration has declined to provide any blanket assurances or to support legislation to this effect, the President made a forthcoming statement on agricultural export policy in a speech to agricultural editors on March 22 and basically repeated that policy in a speech to the corn growers on August 2. On both occasions he asserted that farm exports would not be used as an instrument of foreign policy except in extreme situations and as part of a broader embargo in cooperation with other countries.

Although these statements were favorably received by the agricultural community, they did not fully satisfy its desire for unambiguous assurances. The Soviets are contributing to the uncertainty in the farm community by passing the word they will not buy U.S. grain (above the "embargo free" 8 million ton level) without contract guarantees. The pressure for such assurances has increased in recent weeks, culminating in a meeting last Friday on the Hill with farm state Republican members of Congress, which I attended along with Jack Block and Tim McNamar. Senator Dole chaired the meeting, which also included Senators Durenberger, Helms, Jepson, Lugar and Percy plus several Congressmen led by Bob Michel. The members of Congress insisted in no uncertain terms that their constituencies were not satisfied with the policy statements made thus far, were convinced that the ... absence of specific contract assurances created a de facto grains embargo with the Soviets and demanded specific action by the Administration. While Jack, Tim and I made no commitments, we agreed to consider urgently possible courses of action.

Yesterday I met with a small group from Treasury, USDA and USTR to consider our options. Our general feeling was that we should not support any legislation -- although Durenberger's amendment "contract sanctity" to the CFTC legislation has passed the Senate and will go to conference in the resumed sessions. Rather, our consensus was that, first, the President should issue in the coming days a reiteration of his agricultural export policy in a manner designed to maximize its public impact. Secondly, before the October 28-29 grains consultations with the Soviets we would decide whether to offer the Soviets delivery assurances in return for additional purchases above the 8 million tons. Finally, we should work in the coming months toward a policy of integrity of contracts, both agricultural and industrial, subject to our strategic licensing requirements and with a national security exemption to cover sensitive high technology items.

As agreed at the meeting, we have drafted a proposed policy statement. We have shared the draft with USDA, but we do not have its clearance. I told yesterday's group that I would need to consult with you before giving clearance on the proposed course of action and that you might wish to raise the matter with the President.

In seeking solutions to this problem, we are faced with a number of disagreeable alternatives. On foreign policy grounds, the best solution is to do nothing, but that option seems to be ruled out by the domestic pressures. It is by no means clear that our modest proposal will provide much satisfaction to the agricultural community, which seems unwilling to settle for anything less than formal, unambiguous integrity of contracts. On the other hand anything that is portrayed domestically -- as this would necessarily be -- as going farther in our grains trading relationship with the Soviets would be attacked by the Europeans as further demonstrating the inconsistency of our policy vis-a-vis the Soviet Union. It would also be a strange signal to give in the context of the probable dissolution of Solidarity. Finally, it leaves in limbo the Administration's position on the Durenberger amendment. On balance, however, I believe it is the least objectionable course of action.

In view of the important foreign policy implications of this issue, I recommend that you review this issue with the President before we make a final decision on how to proceed.
