Regarding the attached memorandum from Al (Tab A), you may recall my mentioning some time ago that I expected you to receive a request to see the Chinese Foreign Minister, Huang Hua, at the end of this month.

I recommend that no commitment be made at this time, especially until we see what happens at Cancun. Huang Hua will be there with Premier Zhao Ziyang.

For your information, a Chinese Vice Premier, Fang Yi, was in town this week and was angry at not being received by you (a request was not made from State, but a meeting would have been unlikely in any event), and refused a meeting with the Vice President, saying that he "had to be in Los Angeles." I am told that the tone of Fang Yi's meetings was very unpleasant.

Huang Hua, Vice Premier and Foreign Minister of the People's Republic of China, will visit Washington, October 29-30. This will be a vitally important visit for our bilateral relations and quite possibly a critical follow-up to previous discussions with Premier Zhao Ziyang in Cancun. I think it important that Huang's schedule include a meeting with you, preferably during the afternoon of October 30. It would also be important as a reciprocal gesture for my meetings in China last June which were at the very highest level.

As part of the program for Huang Hua, we will be holding a series of meetings in the State Department on foreign affairs. Huang will meet with the Secretaries of Defense and Treasury, as well as with the Director of the CIA. Vice President Bush has agreed to host a luncheon in Huang's honor.

THEY TIRELESSLY PRESSED THEIR VIEW THAT AGREEMENT AT CANCUN ON GLOBAL NEGOTIATIONS (GN) WAS POLITICALLY CRUCIAL. NORTH/SOUTH TENSIONS WERE RISING AND U.S. AGREEMENT TO GO ALONG WITH GN WAS NEEDED TO AVOID A "FAILURE" OF CANCUN AND A SOVIET VICTORY. WHEN PRESSED, THEY COULD GIVE NO HARD EVIDENCE OF INCREASED NORTH/SOUTH TENSION BUT SEEMED CONTENT TO REITERATE THAT OTHER CANCUN PARTICIPANTS PUBLICLY FAVORED REACHING AGREE-MENT ON GN AT CANCUN, AND THAT U.S. FAILURE TO AGREE WOULD LEAD TO "FAILURE." END SUMMARY AND COMMENT. 4. DAS ALBRECHT PRESENTED THE U.S. POSITION IN THE MORNING SESSION AND GAV DETAILS ON TRADE, INVESTMENT AND FINANCE, ENERGY AND AGRICULTURE ALONG THE LINES OF THE PRESIDENT'S SPEECH, COPIES OF WHICH WERE GIVEN TO THE PRC SIDE. THE AFTERNOON SESSION CENTERED ON THE PRC APPROACH WHICH FOCUSED ON THE QUESTION OF GLOBAL NEGOTIATIONS. DR. PU PRESENTED THE FOLLOWING DETAILED PROPOSAL FOR U.S. REACTION, WHICH HE CHARACTERIZED AS A "PRELIMINARY CONCEPTION" ABOUT HOW TO "BREAK THE DEADLOCK" IN NORTH/SOUTH (N/S) RELATIONS. THE MOST IMPORTANT POINT OF CONTROVERSY, SAID PU, CONCERNS AGENDA AND PROCEDURE FOR GLOBAL NEGOTIATIONS. THE CHINESE SUGGESTED THE FOLLOWING:

(1) WITHOUT PREJUDICE TO THE COMPETENCY, FUNCTIONS AND POWERS OF THE SPECIALIZED AGENCIES AND THE FACT THAT IMPORTANT ISSUES WOULD REQUIRE DECISION BY CON-SENSUS, THERE SHOULD BE NO LIMITATION ON QUESTIONS DISCUSSED AT A GLOBAL NEGOTIATION CONFERENCE. (2) TO AVOID FURTHER DELAY OF DISCUSSION OF AGENDA ITEMS AT THE GLOBAL NEGOTIATIONS CONFERENCE, DISCUS-SION SHOULD BEGIN ON THOSE SUBSTANTIVE ITEMS ON WHICH A CONSENSUS HAS BEEN REACHED. THE PARTICIPANTS SHOULD FIRST SOLVE THOSE ISSUES WHICH ZULVOST PREUSING FOR THE LDC'S AND FOR WHICH CONDITIONS ARE MATURE. (3) AGENDA ITEMS ON WHICH THERE IS NO CONSENSUS SHOULD BE RESOLVED IN THE COURSE OF THE GLOBAL ROUND OF NEGOTIATIONS. -- THE CHINESE PROPOSAL "IS NOT NEW" AND IS NOT THE "CREATION OF THE CHINESE." THE CONCEPT OF GLOBAL NEGOTIATIONS WAS WELL DEFINED AT THE 1979 34TH UNGA. MOREOVER, CERTAIN PHRASES IN THE CHINESE PROPOSAL, SUCH AS ALLOWING GLOBAL NEGOTIATIONS "WITHOUT PREJU-DICE" TO THE SPECIALIZED AGENCIES, EMERGED IN UN DIS-CUSSIONS AND HAVE BEEN ACCEPTED BY THE LDC'S. IN RESPONSE DAS ALBRECHT RAISED THE FOLLOWING POINTS:

-- N/S TENSIONS ARE NOT AS HIGH OR INTENSE AS THE CHINESE DESCRIBE. U.S. RELATIONS WITH MANY DEVELOPING COUNTRIES ARE GOOD, AND U.S. PROGRAMS ARE TAILORED AND WILL CONTINUE TO BE TAILORED ACCORDING TO THE PARTICULAR NEEDS OF A COUNTRY OR PROBLEM. THE MENTION OF "TENSIONS," SAID ALBRECHT, HAS TENDED TO INCREASE PRIOR TO CANCUN SIMPLY BECAUSE THE MEETING IS A FOCAL POINT FOR THE ISSUE.

- 2. SUMMARY. DURING HOUR-LONG MEETING BETWEEN VICE CHAIRMAN DENG XIADPING AND FORMER SECDEF HAROLD BROWN DCT 18, CONVERSATION CENTERED ON THE TAIWAN PROBLEM AND ON BROWN'S VIEWS ON FUTURE US-PRC MILITARY SALES AND MILITARY COOPERATION. DENG ADDED SPECIFICITY TO PREVIOUS PRC WARNINGS OF POSSIBLE DETERIORATION IN US-PRC RELATIONS, CITING THE NETHERLANDS AS A PRECEDENT, AND SAID THAT THE PRC WOULD NOT DECIDE ON ARMS PURCHASES FROM THE US UNTIL AFTER THEY KNOW US INTENTIONS TOWARD TAIWAN. HE REPEATED THAT "MISHANDLING" OF THIS QUES-TION COULD RESULT IN LOSS OF POPULAR SUPPORT FOR THE CURRENT CHINESE LEADERS, INCLUDING HIMSELF. END SUMMARY.
- 3. BROWN WAS ACCOMPANIED BY GENERAL (RET) TIGHE (EX DIA) AND RICHARD SOLUMON (RAND CORP). AMBASSADOR HUMMEL AND NAVATT CAPT MONK ALSO ATTENDED, ALONG WITH VPREMIER/DEFMIN GENG BIAD AND OTHER PRC OFFICIALS. 4. BROWN OFFERED TO RE-CAP HIS VIEWS AS ALREADY EXPRESSED IN CONVERSATIONS WITH OTHER PRC OFFICIALS. BROWN SAID THAT ALTHOUGH HE IS NOW A PRIVATE CITIZEN, HE CONTINUED TO HAVE VIEWS OF HIS OWN ON THE IMPORTANT SUBJECT OF US-PRC RELATIONS AND HE HAD TALKED WITH (ALTHOUGH HE SAID HE DID NOT TRY TO REPRESENT) REAGAN ADMINISTRATION OFFICIALS. BROWN SAID THAT STATEMENTS MADE DURING THE REAGAN COAMPAIGN LAST YEAR WENT BEYOND THOSE OF THE CARTER ADMINISTRATION, BUT STATEMENTS IN RECENT MONTHS HAD DEFLATED THE EXPECTATIONS OF CHIANG CHING-KUD ON TAIWAN. THE REAGAN ADMINISTRATION HAD NOT YET MADE BASIC DECISIONS ON ARMS SALES TO TAIWAN, AND THERE ARE SOME PRO-TAIWAN VIEWS AROUND THE ADMINISTRATION, ALTHOUGH NOT NECESSARILY WITHIN IT. BROWN SAID HE WAS NOT SURE WHAT THE DECISION WOULD BE BUT IT IS POSSIBLE THAT PRESIDENT REAGAN WILL LIMIT ARMS SALES TO TAIWAN TO REPLACEMENTS AT PRESENT LEVELS OF SOPHISTICATION, OR IT IS POSSIBLE THAAT SALES WOULD BE MADE AT HIGHER LEVELS, OR THAT NO FURTHER SALES WOULD BE MADE, WHICH OF COURSE IS WHAT THE PRC WISHES. 6. BROWN SAID HIS PERSONAL VIEW IS THAT CESSATION OF ALL SALES COULD PRECIPITATE UNREST ON TAIWAN THAT WOULD DESTRUCT RE-UNIFICATION. TAIWAN MIGHT TURN TO OTHERS FOR WEAPONS SUPPLY, OR THERE COULD BE LOSS OF CONTROL AND A LAPSE INTO ANARCHY ON TAIWAN OR EVEN INTO WARLORDISM. THERE COULD ALSO BE A MOVE TOWARD INDEPENDENCE BY THE NATIVE TAIWANESE. BROWN SAID THAT IN HIS PERSONAL OPINION IT WOULD BE IN EVERYONE'S INTEREST FOR TAIWAN TO HAVE ENOUGH SELF-CONFIDENCE SO THEY CAN MOVE TOWARD PEACEFUL REUNIFICATION. THAT PROCESS WOULD TAKE SOME TIME -- AND VICE CHAIRMAN DENG WOULD HAVE THE BEST SENSE OF HOW MUCH TIME --AND MARSHAL YE JIANYING'S NINE-POINT OFFER TO TAIWAN SEEMS VERY FORTHCOMING. 7. DENT RESPONDED THAT AT THE PRESENT TIME CHIANG CHING-KUD CAN COMPLETELY CONTROL THE SITUATION ON TIAWAN, SO SOME OF BROWN'S SCENARIOS DO NOT EXIST. SINCE THE PRC'S NINE-POINT PROPOSALS THERE IS EVEN LESS REASON FOR THE US TO PROVIDE ARMS. THE PRC HAS ELABORATED ON THESE VIEWS, AS BROWN KNEW. EXDIS BEN QUITE PRUDENT IN ARMS SALES TO TAIWAN, AND WE APPRECIATE THIS, BUT THE QUESTION IS NOT OVER. THIS IS PRECISELY THE SHADOW HANGING OVER US-CHINA RELA-TIONS; WE HOPE THE USG WILL BE EXTREMELY PRUDENT IN HANDLING IT. IF IT IS NOT HANDLED PROMPTLY THERE IS DANGER THAT OUR RELATIONS WILL MARK TIME OR EVEN RETROGRESS. THE CHINESE PEOPLE REWCT VERY STRONGLY ON THIS ISSUE. The Visit of Chinese Vice Premier Fang Yi

I hosted a successful visit by Chinese Vice Premier Fang Yi to Washington and the West Coast October 14-22. The occasion for Fang's visit was a meeting of the U.S.-PRC Joint Commission on Scientific and Technological Cooperation, which Fang and I co-chair. Fang is responsible for all civilian science and technology in China. He is the most senior Chinese official to visit the United States since your inauguration.

Our cooperation with China in science and technology has played an important role in the normalization of U.S.-PRC relations. In less than three years since normalization we have signed agreements to cooperate in seventeen fields, ranging from health to basic sciences. In several of the fields--such as space, hydropower, and agriculture--the cooperation will lead to commercial benefits for the U.S.

Fang and I agreed that the ongoing cooperative programs have been highly successful. We both pointed to problems which at times have hampered the cooperation. Fang mentioned our controls on high technology exports to China. I raised the problem of insufficient access for our scientists to some Chinese research facilities.

We agreed, however, that we could work out these administrative problems and that we would not allow them to stand in the way of further progress in our scientific relations. Fang stated that scientific cooperation with the U.S. had the highest priority for them. Fang also made it clear that they desire strong investment by the U.S. private sector in development of their oil and mineral resources.

A slightly negative note during the visit resulted from Fang's disappointment that he was not received by you. Fang did meet Secretary Haig and I had arranged for a call on the Vice President on the Vice President's first day back from South America, but Fang decided to leave the previous day for Los Angeles with the rest of his delegation. I believe that we offered Fang a reception appropriate to his rank, especially given your hectic pre-Cancun schedule, and that his disappointment is not of lasting concern.

We have asked repeatedly for a briefing memorandum from State on the Huang Hua meeting. You will recall that in Cancun Premier Zhao Ziyang said that he had two additional points to bring up with the President, but that (due to lack of time) he would give them to Huang to pass to Haig.

Al told me on the way back from Cancun that Huang told him the PRC wants a "date certain" for the <u>termination</u> of weapons deliveries to Taiwan. Al said that this is a "crisis," that it could lead to "disaster." He insists that the "Democrats are playing this issue for all it's worth," presumably "for 1984."

Al said that he would send me a memorandum of conversation on the Chinese visit "tomorrow," i.e., Sunday.

Since Monday we have asked for this memo five times, and we have not yet received it. Hence, since we do not have the results of his latest meeting with Huang, we are not able to provide the President with a thorough briefing. I suspect Al will come to us at the last minute with a paper describing a "must" position for the President.

In any event, I would like to brief the President on this meeting tomorrow morning.

Chinese Reaction to Huang Hua's Visit

Attached at Tab A is a State cable which you should read. I would like to make these points:

- -- Ji Chaozhu is the man the President met in March and, as you know, he's smooth. He has tried to put a nicer gloss on a rough visit.
- -- Ji says that the Chinese have not completed a full review of the meetings, which leaves the Chinese side open for a change of position a positive hint.
- -- On the other hand, he hasn't given away a thing in this message and there could be a hidden trap.
- -- Ji is linking talks on Taiwan with a Premier Zhao trip to the U.S., believing that this gives them some leverage. He says that the "shadow" over our relations (Taiwan) would have to be removed before such visits, which means that the Taiwan question should be resolved to their satisfaction.
- -- The Chinese are trying to draw us into early talks on Taiwan. They told the President that there should be a moratorium on arms sales while such talks are being carried on. The talks could in fact go on forever and therein lies the trap.
- -- However, in a seeming concession, they might be prepared to forego a moratorium on arms sales if we agreed to start talks on Taiwan with them. They know that such talks would cause a lot of heartburn in Taiwan, undermining its confidence in us.
- -- Therefore, any talks we have with the Chinese should be broad-ranged and not confined to Taiwan at this stage. Secretary Regan's trip and Stoessel's trip should keep the range of discussions broad.

A final note, Huang Hua never raised Taiwan with either Weinberger or Casey. The Chinese are probably trying to line up CIA and DOD on their side. At the same time, they want to preserve their equities with these two organizations, even if relations are downgraded.

Intercession with the Senate on Chinese

Consular Convention

At present the Consular Convention with the PRC is being held up in the Senate Foreign Relations Committee by Senator Jesse Helms because he believes thatit could be a tradeoff for other things he may want in the State Department.

For the reasons cited in the attachment, the State Department is understandably interested in getting this treaty ratified. I agree with their desires and I believe at this time, when we are going to shake up the relationship with Peking, that we should put out lines to Peking which will hold when the relationship changes shape.

What will break this loose, I am told, is a call from the White House to Senator Howard Baker. Senator Baker says that, armed with this, he believes he can break it out of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee. I therefore suggest that an appropriate person in the White House call Senator Baker and seek his help.

RECOMMENDATION: That somebody in the White House whom you deem appropriate phone Senator Baker on this issue.

Tab A Justification for Ratification of Consular Convention

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Failure to complete ratification of the US-PRC Consular Convention would first and foremost limit and reduce our ability to serve and protect the interests of American ctizens in China. Failure to ratify would be seen by the Chinese as evidence of the inability of the U.S. Government to follow through with carefully negotiated international agreements even in non-controversial areas such as consular relations. It would reinforce a perception that there is an anti-China bias in this Administration.

Since the signing of the Convention in September, 1980, the Chinese have voluntarily followed its provisions in dealing with consular matters. If the Convention is not ratified, we could lose many important guarantees, including:

- 1. That consuls will receive prompt notification of arrests of U.S. nationals and will have the right to visit regularly with them and to attend their trials.
- 2. That both nations will facilitate the reunion of families.
- 3. That both nations will facilitate travel by persons who claim dual nationality.
- 4. That consular protection will be extended to persons who claim dual nationality.

These latter provisions are especially important to the many Chinese-Americans who travel to or have relatives in China.

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In addition, ratification of the Convention will almost certainly make it easier to proceed in other areas of consular relations important to U.S. citizens, such as mutual liberalization of visa procedures for businessmen.

2. DURING A BRIEF VISIT TO BEIJING, FORMER EA ASSISTANT SECRETARY DICK HOLBROOKE MET TWICE WITH JI CHADZHU, DEPUTY DIRECTOR FOR AMERICAN AND OCEANIAN AFFATRS IN THE MFA. JI CONFIRMED THE TOUGH POSITION ON U.S. ARMS SALES TAKEN BY VICE PREMIER/FOREIGN MINISTER.

3. HOLBROOKE FOUND JI KWHO EXPECTS TO BE ASSIBNED TO THE CHINESE MISSION IN WASINGTON TO JANUARY) SUBDUED AND RELUCTANT TO TALK. JI CLAIMED, UNDER GUESTIONING, THAT THERE HAD BEEN NO CHANGE IN THE CHINESE POSITION, WHICH HAD APPARENTLY BEEN MIRUNDERSTOOD EARLIER BY THE U.S. HE STRESSED THE IMPORTANCE OF THE PRC'S MINE-POINT REUNIFICATION PROPOSAL TO TAIPEL, ALLEGED THAT ITS IMPORTANCE HAD ALSO BEEN MISUNDERSTOOD IN HASHINGTON, AND EMPHASIZED -- IN A PHRASE HE HAVE SELDOM HEARD SINCE THE VERY DAWN OF U.S.-CHINA RAPPROACHEMENT -- THAT "IT IS FOR HE WHO TIED IT TO UNDO THE KNOT," (JIE LING YOU XI LING REN), I.E. AMERICANS ARE RESPONSIBLE FOR

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CREATING CHINA'S STATE OF DISUNITY AND AMERICANS HUST LIKEWISE REAR ESPONSIBILITY FOR BRINGING IT TO AN AND. JI SAID VEHEMENTLY THAT HE KNEW FOR A FACT THAT THERE WERE MANY IN WASHINGTON WHO ARE SEEKING TO ENGINEER THE EMERGENCE OF TWO CHINAS OR ONE CHINA, ONE TAIWAN.

4. JI DENIED THAT THERE HAD BEEN ANY "MAJOR" DECISION MEETINGS BETHEEN THE RETURN OF VICE FOREIGN MINISTER ZHANG WENJIN FROM NEW YORK AND HUANG HUA'S DEPARTURE FOR CANCUN AND WASHINGTON. HE ADDED THAT "SUCH MATTERS ARE NO LONGER DECIDED BY ONE MAN IN CHINA AS IN THE PART BUT ARE DECIDED THROUGH A CONSTANT PROCESS OF MEETINGS AND CORRECTIVE DISCUSSION."

9. JI REITERATED THAT "NOW THAT A FORMAL NEGOTIATING PROCESS HAS ALREADY BEGUN," U.S. ARMS SALES PRIOR TO AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE TWO SIDES HOULD CONSTITUTE "BAD FAITH" AND RESULT IN AN IMMEDIATE DOWNGRADING OF THE U.S.-CHINA RELATIONSHIP. HE ADDED THAT SUCH DETERIORIATION IN RELATIONS WOULD AFFECT "ALL ASPECTS" OF OUR INTERACTION, INCLUDING TRADE AND EXCHANGE, THE CHARACTER AND LEVEL OF DIPLOMATIC REPRESENTATION, ETC.

6. HOLBROOKE SHARPLY AND REPEATEDLY WARNED JI THAT THERE WOULD BE VERY ADVERSE REACTION IN THE U.SM TO WHAT HOULD BE INTERPRETED AS AN UNWARRANTED AND DRASTIC CHANGE IN PRC POSITIONS. In the recent meetings in Cancun and Washington, the Chinese have taken a harder line on future arms sales to Taiwan. The reasons for this and probable future Chinese courses of action need to be carefully analyzed. Therefore, I request that a paper be prepared by 18 December 1981. (8)

The paper should also include a current assessment of the position of Deng Xiaoping. This would update your excellent analysis of Deng and the FX. It would be important to include what kind of pressure Deng is currently under and from whom. (S)

It would also be useful if you could look at interest groups in the PRC which might favor a continuation of strong relations with the U.S., particularly in the fields of education and technology, at the expense of a hard-line Taiwan policy. (8)
