## China Won't Downgrade Links With U.S. Over Sale to Taiwan, Peking Official Says

PEKING — China won't carry out its threat to downgrade political relations with the U.S. if Washington goes ahead with its proposed \$60 million military sale to Taiwan, according to a Chinese official kept abreast of Sino-American relations.

The Reagan administration is expected to formally notify Congress this month of its intention to proceed with the sale. The notification has been delayed for three months for fear of rupturing relations with Peking.

"We will protest against the sale, but not to the extent of downgrading relations," the well placed Chinese official said.

The source, who declined to be identified but said he was authorized to discuss the issue said that China will take into consideration the fact that the sale involves only spare parts and no weapons. Moreover, he noted, the sale was agreed on before China raised its objections in bilateral discussions.

Both American and Chinese officials have been tight-lipped on the talks, which were requested by Premier Zhao Ziyang when he met President Reagan at Cancun, Mexico, last fall. The discussions started last November and are being conducted through the two countries' embassies.

The source said that the U.S. has agreed that "there won't be new military transfers" to Taiwan as long as the talks continue. That is why, he indicated, the Chinese will allow the spare-parts agreement to go through without precipitating a crisis.

The Chinese have repeatedly threatened to downgrade relations with the U.S. if it persists in selling arms to Taiwan. China's paramount leader, Vice Chairman Deng Xiaoping, told former British Prime Minister Edward Heath Tuesday that the U.S. has to acknowledge Chinese sovereignty over Taiwan.

Mr. Deng was quoted last month in a Chinese magazine as saying that America's handling of the Taiwan problem was unacceptable. If the question can't be solved, he said, "then let the relations retrogress." On the issue of Chinese sovereignty over Taiwan, he said, there isn't any room for compromise.

The Chinese have called on the U.S., both publicly and in diplomatic discussions, to phase out arms sales to Taiwan. The U.S. announced when it established diplomatic relations with China in December 1978 that it would continue to sell carefully selected defensive weapons to Taiwan.

### Gradual Reduction

"China has made reasonable proposals" in the discussions, the Chinese source said. "We recognize that this is a problem with historical roots" and that time is needed to settle the issue. That is why, he said, China has proposed that arms sales be reduced gradually.

The Chinese source also disclosed that the U.S. has made a counterproposal. According to the source, the Americans have proposed linking the reduction of arms sales to Taiwan to tranquility in the Taiwan Straits and to the peaceful unification of Taiwan with the China mainland.

China has rejected this proposal, the source said, contending it constitutes "double interference" in Chinese affairs: selling arms to Taiwan and telling China how to resolve the unification issue.

"We are still hoping for the best while preparing for the worst," the source said, repeating a phrase used recently in a commentary by the official Xinhua news agency. But, he said, China's emphasis is still on "hoping for the best."

That emphasis and the disclosure that China won't downgrade relations appear designed to damp speculation that a break is imminent. In recent weeks, Western diplomats increasingly have said that a deterioration in relations was inevitable.

The source characterized such reports as "very pessimistic." His general tone was moderate and he sought to switch attention from the spare parts accord to the principles governing China's attitude.

Even if there were a downgrading of relations, the source said, China hopes that that wouldn't affect economic, trade and cultural relations. However, he said, the Americans are saying that any downgrading of relations would affect such ties.

"This way of talking won't help U.S.-China relations," he said. "It sounds like a threat."
