Dear Mr. Carmen:

Thank you for your letter of April 20, 1982, regarding the donation of excess U.S. Government property (IBM 360/65 computers).

At the formal invitation of the U.S. Government, fully coordinated with the International Communication Agency and GSA, a ten-member Chinese delegation came to the United States to study the feasibility of using excess government IBM 360/65 computers for educational purposes. I am enclosing a copy of the cable which instructed the Embassy in Beijing to transmit, on behalf of GSA, the letter of invitation to the Chinese delegation.

The Chinese have since advised us their desire to accept the computers. In anticipation of the transfer, they have recently signed a contract for approximately \$150,000 with Ultimate Computer Services of Rockaway, New Jersey, to handle shipping, installation and training services. The value of subsequent contracts could eventually exceed an additional \$350,000.

At this advanced stage, U.S. Government unwillingness to follow through on commitments would certainly have negative consequences for our overall bilateral relationship. This Administration considers strong relations with China to be a critical element in the regional and global balance of forces. I cannot stress strongly enough the importance of moving forward with this project and would very much hope that you can agree to allow the donation to be made, as planned, to the International Communication Agency. This Administration has repeatedly made clear that it is important that the United States, in its dealings with all countries, demonstrate reliability and consistency.

Dear Mr. Carmen:

Over a year ago the General Services Administration initiated discussions with the Office of Chinese Affairs, Department of State, concerning donation of excess U.S. government property (IBM 360/65 computer systems) to China for educational purposes.

After careful analysis, review and coordination during this time between representatives of GSA, State, the United States International Communication Agency (USICA), IBM, and the Chinese Embassy in Washington, an invitation was extended by GSA to the Chinese to visit the U.S. to study the feasibility of using these computers in their university programs.

On March 17, 1982 a ten-member delegation from China arrived in the U.S. for a one-month visit to pursue this project further. We have now been advised that the delegation wishes to accept the IBM 360/65 computers being offered by GSA. I am enclosing a preliminary list of the delegation's minimum computer requirements, and request that your Agency takes the necessary steps to assist the Chinese with arrangements for the transfer. Since legal authority to transfer the equipment to China rests with USICA under provisions of the Fulbright/Hayes Act, we will naturally wish to coordinate transfer matters with that organization.

US-China relations have developed rapidly in many different areas in the last several years and particularly since the establishment of diplomatic relations in 1979. This gesture by GSA to offer excess US Government computers to China is fully consistent with US interests and objectives and is just the type of project which contributes to a broadening of understanding between our two peoples. It has the full support of the Department of State.

Members of the delegation and the Chinese Embassy have expressed to us on numerous occasions their complete satisfaction with the visit. They also have had many kind words for Mr. Donald Page and Ms. Dee Morgan of your staff,

both of whom have been extremely helpful to the delegation. I would like to express my appreciation to you for making this such a constructive, rewarding and pleasant visit for all members of the delegation.

I hope there will be a successful outcome to the ongoing discussions on exactly which computer systems the Chinese may want. If I or a member of my staff can be of further assistance to GSA on this project, please feel free to contact me.

SUBJECT: GSA DONATION OF IBM 360 COMPUTERS TO CHINA

1. OVER A YEAR AGO THE GENERAL SERVICES ADMINISTRATION (GSA) BEGAN DISCUSSIONS WITH THE DEPARTMENT CONCERNING THE POSSIBILITY OF DONATING EXCESS US GOVERNMENT PROPERTY IBM 360 COMPUTER SYSTEMS TO CHINA. THE CHINESE HAVE EXPRESSED INTEREST IN USING THESE COMPUTERS IN VARIOUS EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS IN CHINA, AND NAMED A TEN-MEMBER DELEGATION TO VISIT THE US IN EARLY 1982 IN ORDER TO STUDY THE FEASIBILITY OF USING SUCH OLDER COMPUTERS.

2. WHILE RECOGNIZING THAT THE PROJECT MAY BE WORTHWHILE, THE DEPARTMENT AND ICA, NEVERTHELESS, HAD A NUMBER OF INITIAL RESERVATIONS, STEMMING PRIMARILY FROM CONCERNS ABOUT THE AGE OF THE COMPUTERS, MAINTENANCE COSTS, AVAILABILITY OF SPARE PARTS, AND POWER CONVERSION. AFTER LENGTHY DISCUSSIONS WITH GSA AND CHINESE EMBASSY AUTHORITIES, WE NOW FEEL THAT THE CHINESE ARE SUFFICIENTLY AWARE OF SUCH RESERVATIONS AND THAT IT WOULD BE USEFUL FOR THEM TO VISIT THE US TO MAKE A DETERMINATION OF THE ECONOMIC VIABILITY OF THEIR USE OF THE COMPUTERS. ACCORDINGLY, THE DEPARTMENT AND ICA SUPPORT GSA IN INVITING THE CHINESE DELEGATION FOR A THREE WEEK VISIT TO WASHINGTON, D.C., NEW YORK AND SAN FRANCISCO, COMMENCING AROUND MARCH 10, 1982, FOR PURPOSES OF EXPLORING THE PROPOSED TRANSFER IN GREATER DETAIL.

3. GSA HAS AGREED TO ACT AS THE OFFICIAL SPONSOR FOR THE DELEGATION SINCE THE INITIATIVE AND EQUIPMENT ORIGINATES FROM THAT AGENCY. SINCE LEGAL AUTHORITY TO TRANSFER THE COMPUTERS TO CHINA RESTS WITH USICA, THAT ORGANIZATION WILL SERVE AS THE CONDUIT THROUGH WHICH THE TRANSFER IS MADE, SHOULD THE CHINESE DECIDE TO ACCEPT THE COMPUTERS. THE DEPARTMENT'S ROLE IS LIMITED TO FACILITATIVE ACTIVITIES.

4. BELOW IS THE TEXT OF THE LETTER OF INVITATION TO THE HEAD OF THE DELEGATION, YAN PEI-RAN TOGETHER WITH A TENTATIVE PROGRAM:

BEGIN TEXT.

- PURSUANT TO PREVIOUS DISCUSSIONS WITH THE STATE DEPARTMENT, THE GENERAL SERVICES ADMINISTRATION AND THE CHINESE EMBASSY IN WASHINGTON REGARDING THE POSSIBLE USE OF SOME IBM 360 COMPUTERS IN CHINESE UNIVERSITIES FOR EDUCATIONAL PURPOSES, WE ARE PLEASED TO HEAR THAT A DELEGATION HAS BEEN APPOINTED TO COME TO THE UNITED STATES TO EXPLORE THIS MATTER IN DETAIL. WE HAVE IN MIND SOME LARGE 360/65 MODELS WHICH ARE CURRENTLY IN USE IN THE DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE BUT ARE SCHEDULED TO BE REPLACED BEFORE APRIL 1, 1982. SO THAT YOU MAY SEE THESE INSTALLATIONS IN OPERATION AND BE ABLE TO QUESTION THE MAINTENANCE AND OPERATIONS STAFF, WE ANTICIPATE THAT YOU WILL BE ABLE TO CONCLUDE YOUR TRAVEL ARRANGEMENTS AS QUICKLY AS POSSIBLE.

- SHOULD THE APPROPRIATE CHINESE ORGANIZATION DECIDE TO ACCEPT THE COMPUTERS DISCUSSED IN THIS LETTER, WE ARE PREPARED TO ARRANGE TRANSFER THROUGH THE AUSPICES OF THE UNITED STATES INTERNATIONAL COMMUNICATIONS AGENCY USICA. THIS ARRANGEMENT WOULD BE CONSISTENT WITH UNITED STATES LAWS AND REGULATIONS. THE USICA WOULD NOT BE ACCEPTING ANY RESPONSIBILITY OR OBLIGATION FOR MATTERS ASSOCIATED WITH THE COMPUTERS BEYOND THE TRANSFER ITSELF.

- ALTHOUGH LESS THAN 200 OF THESE IBM 360 COMPUTERS ARE STILL FULLY OPERATIONAL IN VARIOUS US GOVERNMENT AGENCIES, THEY ARE CONSIDERED ECONOMICALLY OBSOLETE IN THE UNITED STATES BECAUSE OF THE HIGH LABOR COSTS ASSOCIATED WITH MAINTENANCE AS WELL AS THE INCREASED CAPABILITY OF MORE RECENT COMPUTER SYSTEMS. NEWER TECHNOLOGY ALSO HAS A LOWER MAINTENANCE CHARGE. IT IS THOUGHT THAT CHINESE MAINTENANCE, HOWEVER, MIGHT REDUCE THESE COSTS. NEVERTHELESS, SINCE WE ARE UNAWARE OF ALL THE RESOURCES AVAILABLE TO YOU IN CHINA, WE ARE UNABLE TO MAKE A RECOMMENDATION OF THE ECONOMIC VIABILITY OF THE COMPUTERS FOR USE IN YOUR UNIVERSITY COMPUTER PROGRAMS.

- SINCE YOUR PROPOSED DELEGATION HAS A HIGH LEVEL OF TECHNICAL CAPABILITY, WE ASSUME THAT THEY ARE ALREADY AWARE OF MANY OF THE PROBLEMS INHERENT IN THE TRANSFER OF THIS EQUIPMENT TO CHINA, SUCH AS POWER CONVERSION, THE TRAINING OF CHINESE ENGINEERS, SPARE PARTS, AND RELATED COSTS. WE WOULD EXPECT TO REVIEW ALL ASPECTS OF THESE MATTERS WITH YOU AND TO PROVIDE YOU WITH AS MUCH INFORMATION AS POSSIBLE SO THAT YOU CAN DRAW YOUR OWN CONCLUSIONS. IF YOU DECIDE TO ACCEPT THE COMPUTERS, WE ARE REQUIRED TO OBTAIN AN APPROPRIATE EXPORT LICENSE FROM THE DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE, AND MY OFFICE SHALL BE HAPPY TO PREPARE THE LICENSE APPLICATION.

- WE HAVE ENCLOSED A DRAFT PROGRAM FOR YOUR CONSIDERATION WHICH WOULD LAST APPROXIMATELY THREE WEEKS.

- WE ALSO WOULD BE WILLING TO ASSIST WITH ARRANGEMENTS FOR OTHER VISITS, AS YOUR GROUP MAY DESIRE.

- WE UNDERSTAND THAT ALL EXPENSES AND COSTS ASSOCIATED WITH THE PROPOSED VISIT I.E., TRANSPORTATION, LODGING, MEALS, ETC., AS WELL AS THE TRANSFER OF THE EQUIPMENT WILL BE BORNE ENTIRELY BY THE CHINESE SIDE.
