U.S. ACTIONS IN THE SOUTH ATLANTIC CRISIS

Pursuant to the decisions reached at the meeting of the National Security Council of April 30, 1982, we are taking, effective immediately, the following actions in connection with the dispute between the United Kingdom and Argentina over the Falkland Islands in the South Atlantic:

- -- Issuance of an NSC-approved press statement which summarizes the U.S. position in the South Atlantic crisis, is supportive of the UK position and includes the announcement of concrete steps underscoring U.S. determination not to condone the use of unlawful force to resolve disputes.
 - The suspension of all military exports to Argentina. This action covers deliveries of all items remaining in the FMS pipeline, primarily affecting spare parts in the amount of \$3.9 million; it also covers the suspension of existing licenses for export of Munitions List items to Argentina and the withholding of further export licenses for such items. This suspension will affect non-government as well as government end-uses in Argentina, thereby reaching a category not covered by the Humphrey-Kennedy Amendment or the subsequent legislation.

- -- The withholding of non-Munitions List export license requests for dual-use and related COCOM-type items.
- -- The withholding of new Export-Import Bank credits, insurance and guarantees.
- -- The withholding of new Commodity Credit Corporation guarantees (which affects agricultural products worth approximately \$2 million).
- -- A private warning to Argentina that the measures announced do not encompass the full range of economic sanctions which the U.S. has at its disposal and which could be applied depending on circumstances.
- -- The withholding of any required U.S. consent for thirdcountry transfers of U.S. origin items the export of which from the U.S. would not be approved under the above decisions. (Note: Withholding of consent for transfer of FMS origin items sold to third countries is compelled by existing law.)



REMARKS OF JUDGE WILLIAM P. CLARK TO THE COUNCIL OF THE AMERICAS

June 21, 1982

9:15 A.M. EDT (Provided Tape)

JUDGE CLARK: It's with great pleasure that I welcome this most distinguished group to Washington on the occasion of the Council of The Americas Thirteenth Conference in this city.

Sam, I'm glad that you've changed the rules from every other year to maybe every year, particularly right now as we encounter unanticipated difficulties to the south.

The gathering is not only important for your organiza-. tion but also for our friends in the Hemisphere, and certainly to this Administration.

I'll be brief, as I must. We have a meeting, as you are aware, with Mr. Begin, which begins momentarily. Tomorrow, with President Monge from Costa Rica, and it's going to be a very busy week, much of it affecting and being affected by, I must say, the work of this organization.

The United States, of course, joins you in welcoming the end of the hostilities, the combat in the South Atlantic, and I assure you that we do stand ready to resolve the conflict between Great Britain and Argentina. We fervently hope that the cease-fire that we're now viewing will hope and that an enduring peace will be established.

viewing will hope and that an enduring peace will be established. In that connection, last night, the President invited Mrs. Thatcher to stop by while she is in New York at the Disarmament Conference. She's coming in at the end of the day, Wednesday, to discuss this very issue. We stand ready to help, and no doubt will continue to assist the reconciliation that must occur.

It has really troubled us, and particularly the President, that two old friends, two old allies, have found it necessary to spill blood, particularly in the case of Argentina. Because the President was most proud of the relations that were developing in the first year-and-a-half between this Administration on the one hand and Argentina on the other. A great effort had gone out on our part, as it had on the part of the Government and the people of Argentina, to perhaps remedy some of the problems that had existed over the last six years between our two countries. And we saw real progress on the one hand. On the other we look upon the conflict and the aftermath as being only a temporary interruption in those relations, political, commercial, economic.

We firmly believe that the period ahead should be used wisely to build upon and strengthen those ties between not only Argentina and the United States but all countries, all hemispheric neighbors.

We will be working in the days and the weeks to come to set an additional foundation, as we must. President Reagan has said that one of his highest priorities in the Administration -- and he's repeated it numerous times -- is to improve our hemispheric relations. This is a goal that we intend to continue to pursue. No one can suggest that we have not evidenced this, as may be seen in our strong positions and actions toward the marxist insurgency in El Salvador, which of course resulted in elections, a democratic process never anticipated by our detractors and not even by some of our friends.

Of course, the Caribbean Basin initiative, which you'll hear more about, while in some difficulty on the Hill, we have not relaxed in that rather comprehensive program, and again we ask for your assistance there.

As you pursue your deliberations, I would ask that you keep our initiatives in mind. You offered to be helpful at the end of last month when members of your Board came into the White House to offer to help in every possible way. It was at that time that we set up a special liaison between you and the White House in addition to your communication with the State Department toward accelerating our programs to increase our relations, better our relations, particularly now in light of the South Atlantic conflict.

You might say that the President is now calling that chip, and asked me to say so to you this morning. So, again, I thank you for that great assistance and thank you for your good thinking, and now your good doing as we watch your progress over the two-day period. Alfonso Sapia-Bosch, our representative from the National Security Council, will be with you and reporting back to me and to the President on your activities as well as offering to assist you logistically and any other way that we might.

So, again, thank you very much. (Applause.)

I am writing to inquire whether we are offering both the Argentines and the British some help in feeding the POW's in the Falklands/Malvinas. As an anthropologist much interested in gift exchange and the symbolism of gifts, I am reassured by Argentine citizens in Washington that we might benefit a little in a humanitarian gesture toward the POW's which would help all sides. Indeed, apart from the political implications, we would most be helping the Argentine soldiers maintain their health while returning home to resume more peaceful pursuits.

A former Roman Catholic priest at the Smithsonian thinks that the Catholic Relief Services might also be interested in this opportunity.

Dear Mr. Dillon:

Judge Clark greatly appreciated your letter of June 16 concerning the conflict in the South Atlantic and has asked me to provide you with the following information.

When British forces on the Falklands took an unexpectedly large number of Argentine prisoners, we shared your concern regarding their humanitarian needs. We made clear that we were prepared to respond affirmatively to requests for assistance.

Now that the prisoner repatriation effort is almost completed, a relief effort by the U.S. does not appear necessary. We have no reports that the smaller number of remaining prisoners lack food or medical assistance.

Thank you for sharing your suggestions with us and for forwarding a copy of the Foreign Policy article by Messrs. Davidson and Montville.
