

*Begun and held at the City of Washington on Monday, the twenty-fifth day of January,
one thousand nine hundred and eighty-eight*

Joint Resolution

Commemorating the bicentennial of the French Revolution and the Declaration of the Rights of Man and of the Citizen.

Whereas the Treaty of Commerce and Amity concluded February 6, 1778, between France and the United States was the first alliance entered into by the United States;

Whereas the independence of the United States was achieved with significant assistance from France and from individual citizens of France;

Whereas the ideals of liberty and freedom which animated the people of the United States during the American Revolution were shared by many of the people of France and are held sacred by both peoples today;

Whereas the year 1789 was of particular significance in the history of both France and the United States, marking the opening chapter of the French Revolution and the concluding chapter of the American Revolution;

Whereas within a period of 31 days, the National Assembly of France approved the Declaration of the Rights of Man and of the Citizen on August 26, 1789, and the Congress of the United States approved the Bill of Rights on September 25, 1789, thereby proclaiming the sanctity of human rights on both sides of the Atlantic Ocean and guaranteeing them for future generations; Whereas the Government of France has established a Commission for the Bicentennial of the French Revolution and the Declaration of the Rights of Man and of the Citizen; and

Whereas an American Committee on the French Revolution has been organized to plan an appropriate commemoration in the United States of the bicentennial of the historic events of 1789 and of the shared aspirations, ideals, and experiences of the French and American peoples: Now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That (a) the Congress and people of the United States extend to the people of France an expression of friendship and high regard on the occasion of the bicentennial of the French Revolution.

(b) The Congress hereby—

(1) urges the people of the United States to observe the bicentennial of the French Revolution as may be appropriate to the occasion; and

(2) finds with pride and satisfaction that France and the United States remain fully committed to the principles of the Declaration of the Rights of Man and of the Citizen, and the Bill of Rights, respectively.

PARTICIPANTS: The President

French President Francois Mitterrand

DATE, TIME: May 9, 1988, 1:23 p.m. - 1:31 p.m.

AND PLACE: Oval Office

President Mitterrand came on the phone to say how delighted he was to hear from "his dear friend Ron". The President said he, too, was pleased to be able to speak with Mitterrand today. He said he wished to extend congratulations on Mitterrand's impressive victory in Sunday's elections. President Reagan noted that Mitterrand had clearly won the admiration of the French people.

President Mitterrand said that he greatly appreciated the President's call and the congratulations. He said it was very pleasant to hear from the President today. He observed that he was now doing what the President had already done -- begun a second term in the Presidency. President Mitterrand said that he also welcomed the opportunity to tell the President how much he looked forward to working with him for another year. He noted that there were many issues on the international agenda they should discuss. He said that he felt the two of them had accomplished so much together over the last seven years.

President Reagan added that he was looking forward to talking with him at the Toronto Economic Summit. He noted that Brian (Mulroney) has a lot of good ideas and we expected that this would really be a productive Summit. President Mitterrand said he, too, looked forward to that meeting -- there was a lot of work that could be done there. He said that he hoped the two of them would have a chance to talk privately in Toronto. President Reagan responded that he would very much like that.

Mitterrand reflected on the past seven years the two of them had worked together, and noted that he had "many warm memories of what had been accomplished" in that time. Mitterrand then turned the conversation to the immediate tasks facing him, including the necessity of forming a new government. He said he anticipated being very busy for a time.

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President Reagan said that he would also like to take this opportunity to invite Mitterrand to come to Washington this summer for a State Visit. He said that, if the idea was acceptable to Mitterrand, the President would have Ambassador Rodgers follow up to make specific arrangements for the visit. President Mitterrand responded that he very much appreciated the invitation and remarked that this "was a new idea". It was one that he would very much like to consider, but "at first glance" it sounded good -- it was something he would enjoy very much. He indicated that he would get back to the President, and added that he had planned to write to the President soon.

President Mitterrand inquired about how things were going for the President and with Mrs. Reagan. The President said he was doing just fine and the First Lady was doing quite well. The President asked about Mrs. Mitterrand and asked that he (Mitterrand) convey his best wishes. President Mitterrand thanked the President again for the kind call. He remarked that he needed to take a few days off after the election campaign, but thought the need to prepare his new government would keep him occupied. President Reagan congratulated President Mitterrand again for "his stunning victory" and said he looked forward to seeing him in Toronto.

The call concluded at 1:31 p.m.

Subject: Congratulatory Phone Call to new French President
and Invitation for State Visit

Per your request of May 2, we are attaching points for the President to make with the winner of the French presidential elections. The final round of the elections is on May 8. President Mitterrand is expected to be reelected, but the points could be used with Prime Minister Chirac if he wins.

We recommend that the President congratulate the new French President, offer a general invitation to come to Washington on a State Visit this summer, and note that our ambassador in Paris will follow up. This will provide for an orderly way of fixing the July 28 date, since the new French president will probably not be able to give a definitive answer on the phone. The new French president will form a new government, and it will be useful for Ambassador Rodgers to keep track from the beginning of planning for the visit.

We recommend that the President make the call on Monday, May 9, or Tuesday, May 10. There is a six hour time difference between Paris and Washington. We will provide an interpreter for the phone call. We request as much advance notice as possible once the exact date and time for the phone call have been set.
