UK: PYN ATTACKS GRONYKO'S REJECTION OF REAGAN'S PROPOSALS

(TEXT) FOREIGN SECRETARY MR FRANCIS PYM TONIGHT ATTACKED AS "TOTALLY UNTRUE AND DELIBERATELY MISLEADING THE RUSSIANS? REJECTION TODAY OF A NEW COMPROMISE DEAL ON MUCLEAR DISARMANENT PROPOSED THIS WEEK BY PRESIDENT REAGAN.

REJECTION OF THE PROPOSALS CAME EARLIER TODAY FROM THE SOVIET FOREIGN HINISTER NR ANDREY GROMYKO AT A NEW CONFERENCE IN MOSCOW.

BUT IN A STATEMENT TONIGHT IN LONDON: MR PYN SAID: "I DEEPLY REGRET MR GRONYKO'S HASTY REJECTION OF PRESIDENT REAGAN'S PROPOSALS FOR AN INTERIM AGREEMENT ON INTERMEDIATE-RANGE NUCLEAR MISSILES.

\*ONCE AGAIN THE RUSSIANS HAVE REACTED NEGATIVELY AND WITHOUT ANY TIME FOR PROPER CONSIDERATION. PROPOSALS MADE THIS WEEK.
BY PRESIDENT REAGAN WERE THE RESULT OF SEVERAL MONTHS OF BETAILED CONSULTATIONS BY THE NATO ALLIES.

"WE HAVE TRIED HARD TO MEET SOVIET CONCERN SO THAT IN INTERIN AGREEMENT COULD BE REACHED ON A WAY OF PROHIBITING A WHOLE RANGE OF WEAPONS -- THE SS-20S; CRUISE; AND PERSHING MISSILES.

\*WE HOPED THE SOVIET UNION WOULD CONSIDER THE INTERIM PROPOSALS SERIOUSLY AND DISCUSS THEM IN GENEVA. WE ARE THEREFORE DEEPLY DISAPPOINTED THAT MR GRONYKO SHOULD DISMISS THE PROPOSALS OUT OF HAND AT A PRESS CONFERENCE HELD LESS THAN THREE DAYS AFTER THEY WERE MADE.

"MR GRONYKO CLAINS PRESIDENT REAGAN'S OFFER LEAVES THE WEST WITH 'HORE THAN TWICE AS MANY NUCLEAR WARHEADS IN EUROPE AS THE SOVIET UNION'. THIS IS TOTALLY UNTRUE AND DELIBERATELY HISLEADING.

\*DEPLOYMENT OF CRUISE AND PERSHING WILL MAKE NO DIFFERENCE TO THE NUMBER OF U.S. WARHEADS IN EUROPE.

\*FIRST, THE WARHEADS ON CRUISE AND PERSHING MISSILES WILL BE COMPENSATED FOR BY THE WITHDRAWAL OF AN EQUAL NUMBER OF OTHER WARHEADS.

"SECONDS: NR GRONYKO OVERLOOKS THE FACT THAT NATO HAS UNILATERALLY REDUCED THE NUMBER OF WARHEADS HELD IN EUROPE BY 1.000 SINCE 1979 -- A GESTURE TO WHICH THERE HAS BEEN NO RESPONSE FROM THE RUSSIANS.

"MR GROWYKO CLAIMS THE PRESIDENT'S PROPOSAL FAILS TO TAKE ACCOUNT OF BRITISH AND FRENCH STRATEGIC DETERRENTS. I CAN DALY REPEAT THAT THE INTERMEDIATE RANGE NUCLEAR FORCE STOCKS DO NOT ADDRESS STRATEGIC MERPONS. THEY DO NOT INCLUDE THE URST FORCES OF SOVIET STRATEGIC SUBMARINE-LAUNCHED NUCLEAR MEAPONS, MANY OF WHICH ARE TARGETTED ON WESTERN EUROPE.

"THESE ARE COVERED IN THE STRATEGIC ARMS REDUCTION TALKS.
MR GROMYKO STATES THAT PRESIDENT REAGAN'S PROPOSALS IGNORE U.S.
AIRCRAFT BASED IN MESTERN EUROPE OR ON AIRCRAFT CARRIERS CAPABLE
OF REACHING TARGETS IN THE SOVIET UNION.

"THE WEST DOES NOT EXCLUDE THESE AIRCRAFT. ON THE CONTRARY THEY HAVE BEEN DISCUSSED IN THE GENEVA TALKS BUT NATO HAS PROPOSED A STEP-BY-STEP APPROACH IN WHICH THE FIRST STEP SHOULD BE REDUCTIONS IN THE LAND-BASED MISSILES WHICH POSE THE GREATEST THREAT TO BOTH SIDES.

"THEN THE NEGOTIATORS WILL HAVE TO DISCUSS NOT ONLY U.S. BIRCRAFT BUT ALSO THE LARGE NUMBER OF SOVIET BIRCRAFT WHICH ARE CAPABLE OF DELIVERING A NUCLEAR BITACK ON WESTERN EUROPE.

\*MR GROMYKO SAYS THAT THE SOVIET INTERMEDIATE-RANGE MISSILES AIMED AT ASIA CANNOT BE TAKEN INTO ACCOUNT IN THE INF TALKS.

"THE NATO ALLIES HAVE ALL ALONG WORKED FOR A WORLD-WIDE BAN ON WEAPONS OF THIS TYPE. THE SS-20 IS A HIGHLY MOBILE SYSTEM WHICH COULD QUICKLY BE TRANSPORTED FROM THE SOUIET FAR EAST AND TARGETED ON EUROPE. "IN ADDITION, THE NATO ALLIES HAVE ABSOLUTELY NO WIDH TO ...
SEE THE THREAT POSED BY THESE TERRIFYING WEAPONS TRANSFERRED
TO THEIR FRIENDS IN ASIA.

"IT WAS NATO WHICH FIRST PROPOSED THE PROHIBITION OF AN ENTIRE CLASS OF NUCLEAR WEAPONS. THE RUSSIAN REFUSED THIS, HOWEVER.

\*NATO THEN PROPOSED AN INTERIM AGREEMENT PROVIDING FOR LESS FRR-REACHING REDUCTIONS. AGAIN THE SOVIET RESPONSE WAS NEGATIVE.

"I VERY NUCH HOPE THAT IT IS NOT THE RUSSIANS' LAST WORD. THE CRYING NEED IS FOR A CONSTRUCTIVE RESPONSE IN GENEVA AND SOON."

BRUCE KENT, SECRETARY FOR THE CAMPAIGN FOR NUCLEAR BISARMAMENT, COMMENTED: "CND IS NOT SURPRISED THAT THE SOVIET UNION HAS REJECTED PRESIDENT REAGAN'S LATEST OFFER...

"NO PROPOSAL WHICH ALLOWS FOR THE INTRODUCTION INTO EUROPE OF ANY FIRST-USE MISSILES LIKE CRUISE OR FIRST-STRIKE WEAPONS LIKE PERSHING II WILL BE ACCEPTABLE TO THE SOVIETS.

"NEVERTHELESS THE SOVIETS COULD AND SHOULD BEGIN NOW TO WITHDRAW
A SUBSTANTIAL PROPORTION OF THEIR SS-20'S IRRESPECTIVE OF THE
SO-CALLED ZERO TALKS AT GENEVA.

"SUCH A WITHURAWAL WOULD GIVE EVIDENCE OF THEIR GOOD FAITH AND DO NOTHING TO DAMAGE THEIR SECURITY.

"THEY AS WELL AS THE WEST HAVE A MASSIVE NUCLEAR ARSENAL WELL ABOVE ANY LEVEL THAT DETERRENCE MIGHT BE THOUGHT TO DEMAND."
