SOLIDARITY RALLY

May 1, 1983

More than sixteen months ago the Polish Government began its campaign to stamp out the unprecedented achievements of Solidarnosc, the Solidarity Movement. In creating a genuinely free and independent trade union, Solidarity and Lech Walesa sparked renewed hope in the hearts of the Polish people for attaining the basic human values that movement seeks to uphold. Despite martial law, the legal abolition of Solidarity, and a continuing wave of suppression -- carried out under intense Soviet pressure -- the spirit of Solidarity still shines as a beacon of freedom to people around the globe. The plight of Solidarity's leaders and its ideals remains vividly real not only for its nearly ten million members, but among all those concerned with the dignity and liberty of a great people.

Today Poland stands at a crossroads. The Polish Government faces an alienated populace and an economy in ruins. But a policy of reconciliation, of permitting the Polish people a genuine voice in their own future could galvanize the energy and vision of this long-suffering nation to solve its economic problems and vigorously pursue a new and better life for all. As I said on December 10th of last year, this Administration will respond if the Polish Government introduces meaningful liberalization measures. But such steps cannot be merely cosmetic. They must represent real progress toward a restoration of the fundamental rights of the Polish people.

The current struggle and travails of the people of Poland are of truly historic import to the entire world. We will never be distracted from the significance of developments in that nation. What we have witnessed is a genuine struggle of workers in a so-called workers' state for basic human and economic rights. The Polish people have exposed the fundamental inequalities inherent in a communist system and the falsehood of communist claims that the workers are the true beneficiaries of a party-run state. Indeed, we salute the courage of the Poles who daily face intimidation and harassment. Their heroic resistance to their Government's attempts to suppress Solidarity serves as an inspiring display of the indomitable desire for freedom in the hearts of men and women everywhere.

We want the Polish people to know that the future of Poland and free trade unions is a matter of deep concern not only to the Administration but to the American people, as your presence here today testifies. We pledge our solidarity with them and our vigilance for the restoration of human rights in that country.
