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# Top Graduates Named for C&GSC Course

FORT LEAVENWORTH, Kans. — Army Capt. David H. Petraeus and Maj. John K. Thompson of the Canadian armed forces were the top students among the 1004 officers who were graduated recently from the Command and General Staff College.

During the June 3 graduation ceremonies, Petraeus, an Infantry officer, received the Gen. George C. Marshall Award as the top graduate of the Regular C&GSC Course, while Thompson, a Quartermaster officer, received the Dwight D. Eisenhower Award as the distinguished allied graduate. An award for excellence in military history writing, called the Arter-Darby Award, was presented to Capt. Larry George, an Engineer officer.

Two other awards were presented for the first time — the Master Tactician Award, and the Master Logistician Award.

The Master Tactician Award was established to recognize those students who demonstrate a special aptitude for tactics. Nominees for the award were required to prepare a corps-level tactical plan and present a 2½-hour defense of the plan to a panel of specialists. The first-time winners were Maj. Fred M. Berger (IN), James H. Willbanks (IN), Hans-Otto Budde (German Army-IN) and Capt. Craig D. Wildrick (FA).

Nominees for the Master Logistician Award were required to prepare a corps-level logistics plan, and submit a three-hour oral defense. The winner of this year's competition was Capt. Paul A. Stuart (QM).

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RESOLUTION

Expressing the sense of the Senate with respect to the  
relationship of the Executive and Legislative Branches in the  
formulation of the foreign policy of the United States.

Whereas the framers of the Constitution of the United States  
determined that an essential part of the Constitutional  
design is a distinct separation of powers among the branches  
of the Federal Government;

Whereas the framers considered extensively and did carefully  
craft a Constitutional system of checks and balances to  
maintain a balance of power among the branches;

Whereas as the Constitutional representative of the United States  
and the diplomatic negotiator for the United States with  
foreign nations, the Executive is vested with the power to  
formulate, articulate, and implement the ongoing foreign  
policy of the United States;

Whereas the Constitutional role of the Legislative Branch in  
foreign policy is one of helping to shape the broad outlines  
and set the basic direction of foreign policy through such  
means as legislation, the apportionment of funds,  
declarations of war and national emergency, and particularly  
the responsibility of the Senate to provide advice and  
consent with respect to treaties with and the appointment of

ambassadors to foreign governments;

Whereas the danger and complexity of the present world situation dictate that the United States have a consistent and coherent foreign policy and require representatives of the United States to proceed with caution, with unity of design, and with dispatch;

Whereas in order for the United States to be a dependable ally, and to have its international undertakings accepted with a high degree of confidence, the foreign policy of the United States must reflect the ability to respond reliably and effectively;

Whereas because of the special responsibilities and challenges thrust upon the United States by virtue of its having become a major world power, the Legislative Branch indeed did respond, following World War II, by effectively delegating to the Executive certain powers and prerogatives never before delegated;

Whereas many foreign policy initiatives by the Executive following World War II were generally accepted and reinforced with bipartisan support in the Legislative Branch with respect to major policies and events from the Vandenberg Resolution through the Cuban Missile Crisis;

Whereas a course of events and a series of decisions led to a deepening commitment by the United States in Southeast Asia and to the loss of over 57,000 American lives without action by the Legislative Branch in the form of a declaration of war or national emergency;

Whereas the Legislative Branch understandably resented and ultimately overreacted to the consequences and costs of that major commitment of lives and resources, with adverse effects on the interests of the United States and on freedom in Southeast Asia;

Whereas in the years following the involvement of the United States in Southeast Asia, the Legislative Branch has taken unto itself a role that goes far beyond shaping the broad

outlines and setting the basic direction of foreign policy, apportioning funds, and advising and consenting, to one of devising and dissenting with respect to day-to-day foreign policy;

Whereas the Legislative Branch actually is now devising detailed foreign policy and dissenting from many of the actions of the Executive Branch through attempts to dictate specific foreign policy initiatives or to overturn decisions properly made by the Executive;

Whereas as a deliberative body with the propensity for protracted debate, composed of elected representatives of local and regional interests with a proclivity for partisan posturing for domestic political purposes, and lacking the depth of information or the amount of time required to reach a full understanding of complex foreign policy questions, the Legislative Branch is unlikely to be able to provide the consistent, reliable, coherent, unified, responsive, and flexible foreign policy required to meet rapidly changing conditions;

Whereas the Chief Executive, elected by all voting citizens of the United States, is better able, with the resources of the Executive Branch, to provide the management of a foreign policy that reflects the interests of the Nation as a whole;

Whereas the conflict over foreign policy that has developed in recent years between the Executive and Legislative Branches causes doubt and confusion among our allies, provides comfort to our adversaries, and results in a loss of effectiveness in negotiations and the conduct of foreign policy; and

Whereas it is in the national interest to reestablish a truly bipartisan foreign policy: Now, therefore, be it

1        Resolved, That it is the sense of the Senate that--

2            (1) the Legislative Branch should recognize and  
3        reaffirm that--

4            (A) the Constitutional role of the Legislative  
5        Branch with respect to foreign policy is properly

1 limited to oversight, and to helping to shape the  
2 broad outlines and set the basic direction of such  
3 policy through legislation, through the apportionment  
4 of funds, and through the advice and consent of the  
5 Senate with respect to treaties and the appointment  
6 of ambassadors; and

7 (B) the Executive has the Constitutional  
8 authority and responsibility to formulate,  
9 articulate, and implement the foreign policy of the  
10 United States;

11 (2) the Executive should continue to inform, assist,  
12 consult, and cooperate with the Legislative Branch with  
13 respect to the formation and implementation of foreign  
14 policy; and

15 (3) the Legislative Branch should, in a new spirit of  
16 bipartisanship, cooperate with the Executive Branch in  
17 the conduct of a foreign policy that is in the best  
18 interests of the United States and the preservation of  
19 freedom.
