

Dear Sir ,

At the begining of March the British Police issued a warning to the Libyan skiles in the U.K to be more vigilant with the implication that a new wave of terrorism is expected. Security measures were taken and as expected a series of events took place in London and Manchester.

I missed my usual Friday's prayer on the third of March because it was known to me that a group of Libyan "students" would be waiting for me at the mosque. I was asked to leave my home along with my family to a secret address for a length of time as reported in the Guardian of 4 March 1984.

As it was anticipated a group of around 50 Libyan "students" came to the mosque in the area where I live. The Police presence was pronounced at both the mosque and my house with the intention to deter as well as to protect.

A party was held at the Portland Hotel in Manchester on the same Friday evening ostensibly to celebrate the seventh anniversary of the establishment of so called People's power in Libya. This party was to provide a cover for the presence of large number of the so called students and Embassy officials so that they would be able to celebrate their supposed success in my "Physical Liquidation" and the bombing of the house where my wife and children live.

During the party speeches were given in which the usual attacks against the opposition were made. And at the end of the party a meeting was held by selected "students" and Embassy officials, apparently to discuss ways and means to achieve their terrorist objectives and why they failed until then to reach their primary targets.

On the early hours of saturday 10 March 1984 two bombs were exploded in London and three other bombs were discovered and defused. For brevity sake I am not going to give you our opinion about the reasons behind these explosions but if you are interested I will be more than happy in writing to you about it.

On sunday 11 March 1984 at dawn two bombs were exploded in Whally Range, a residential area in Manchester. One of these bombs was placed in a car which was parked in front of a building where the other bomb was found.

Two facts are of special interest :

Firstly, my brother Mr. Hisham Benghalboun (a known member of the Libyan Constitutional Union) used to live in the building that was bombed in Manchester and secondly, his car is of the same type and make of the car where one of the bombs was placed.

To understand the recent events one has to outline briefly the historical developments that gave rise to them.

Since siezing power on 1 September 1969 as a result of a coup d'etat Gaddafi started a campaign of distortion of modern Libyan history to the extent of negating the existance of dates and symbols of national significance and value as exemplified in his rejection and abandonment of the national flag and the day of independance. In order to legitimize his coup d'etat and its aftermath Gaddafi has been employing all the propaganda means available to him to convince the Libyan people that the course of events that started on 1 september 1969 came as a result of a popular demand for a change and that this demand arose because of the supposed inefficiency and misrule of the old regime.

Demagogic methods and propaganda campaigns appealed to many of the young. Cult of personality was built around Gaddafi. Any deviation from this conception of himself and his "glorious revolution" was not tolerated and dealt with very severely. He became the megalomaniac par excellence.

A few years after staging his coup d'etat Gaddafi started implementing ideas that defy comprehension and reason. He abolished all the institutions that form the core of modern and civilised state starting with the Constitution itself. He abolished the legal institutions and the judiciary. Bureaucratic, administrative and other institutions followed suit.

All of this led the Libyan people to a state of resignation and helplessness, which made Gaddafi believe that he succeeded in convincing the Libyans that their history and their happy future started with the coup d'etat and his prominent part in that affair. For according to him it was he and nobody else who saved the country from the injustice and the dictatorship of King Idris.

In following this line, Gaddafi's media has been trying very hard to paint a very bad picture of the Constitutionally chosen King and his rule.

⁰Following secret preparations and arrangements it was felt that the time was ripe on 7 October 1981 (the day the Libyan people adopted their Constitution in 1951) to announce in Manchester the establishment of the Libyan Constitutional Union in an effort to stop the absurdities that have been taking place in Libya. It is to be pointed out that neither us nor any of the other opposition movements was given a mandate by the Libyan people to assume authority. The only mandate the Libyan people have ever granted was given to the Constitutional rule manifested in the late King Idris.

A cessation of the illegal and chaotic state of affairs in Libya is called for, furthermore, the LCU calls for a free and general election in Libya and that this election should be supervised by impartial observers and safeguarded by the existing Constitution (which is subject to acceptance, amendment or rejection by the Libyan people) for a Government to be elected and the legitimate rule to be returned.

The immediate reaction to the announcement of the LCU and myself as its head, was quick to appear and was to the point. For it took only three weeks for me to be under a serious threat of assassination as reported in the Daily Mirror and in the Manchester Evening News on 29 & 30 October 1981 and covered by Piccadilly Radio. This immediate reaction signified the seriousness of the threat the LCU has to the regime in Libya.

As a result of the efforts of the LCU for the last two years the hope of an end to this nightmare was revived among the Libyans. Efforts have been made to counter the claims of Gaddafi's propaganda machine especially among the young. As a result of the work which has been done by Libyans acting in secret, the ideas that Gaddafi tried his best to cover, started to gain ground among the Libyan people. It became clear in Libya the magnitude of the achievements gained by the country since the end of World War II and up to the coup of 1969.

It has been accepted that Gaddafi has nothing to do with the liberation of the country or "redressing the wrong" that happened to it or its people.

What became clear and apparent to the new generation as it has been to the old, is that what happened in 1969 was a coup d'etat and not a revolution. Further the Libyans realized that the coming to power of Gaddafi was a disaster and a setback for the country's plans for development and its future. These ideas started to gain currency among the other opposition movements and groupings in agreements with the LCU. In addition to that the people who are loyal to the late King Idris and the men who worked with him appreciate what the LCU is doing in showing the historical and important role played by the late King in the struggle and the independence of the country. That was in response to what Gaddafi's media is trying to establish which is to give Gaddafi an importance and historical significance that he does not deserve.

It's the late King Idris who is remembered with gratitude and respect among the Libyan people. For his role in the evolution and the development of Libya is rivaled by none in modern times. Furthermore in addition to his prominent role in the political arena, King Idris was a spiritual leader who has enjoyed a loyalty and affection in Libya and the countries on its borders, which Gaddafi considers to be a potential threat.

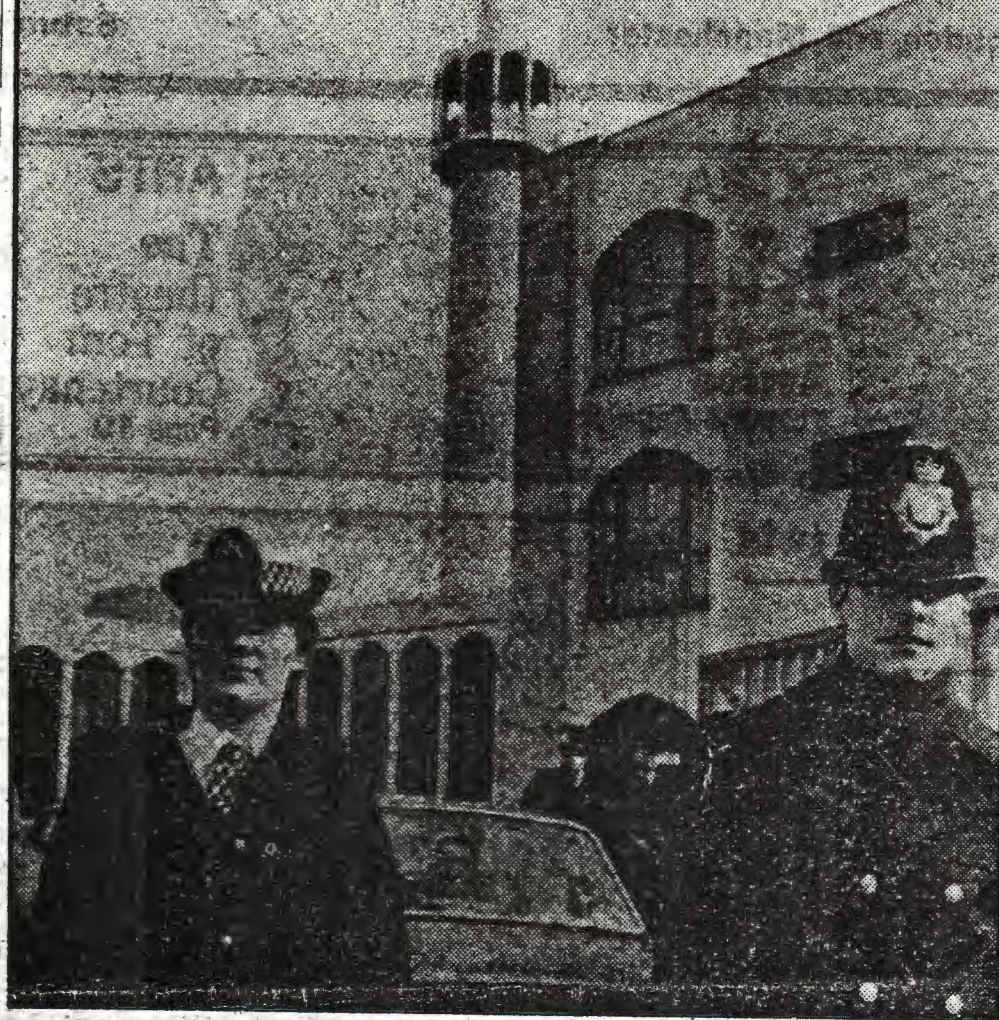
All these people who have either religious or/and political ties with the late King Idris and his family look on the LCU with high regard, for its defence of the late King's reputation which is based on his great religious and political legacy.

For my family and I the future is uncertain. We still have to endure a continuous state of anxiety and tension.

Armed police guard mosque in special Libyan exile alert

Uniformed and plain clothes police were on guard yesterday at the London Mosque and Islamic Cultural Centre in Regent's Park and armed Special Branch officers were provided for prominent Libyan opposition leaders living in the capital.

It was part of a special security operation mounted to protect exiled opponents of Colonel Gadhafi's regime on the seventh anniversary of the establishment of so-called people's power in Libya. Last night Scotland Yard said that the security measures would now be scaled down — "but not too rapidly."

In Manchester, the leader of the Libyan Constitutional Union, Mr Mohammed Bin-Galboun, left his Didsbury home and went into hiding on

police advice.

A police spokesman said: Greater Manchester Police are acting in support of the measures which are being taken to ensure the safety of certain Libyan nationals in this country.

There was no visible police presence last night at a noisy party being held at the city's Portland Hotel by some 250 members of the Libyan Students Association, many of whom travelled there from London.

An association spokesman said last night that the event was "to celebrate the achievement of people's power in Libya" and that he knew nothing about threats against exiles.

In London, the Libyan People's Bureau — the country's equivalent of an embassy —

dismissed the police warnings as "malicious allegations."

Special Branch officers who monitor Arab affairs are concerned that the recent takeover of the London bureau by the "revolutionary Student Force" may herald a new wave of officially inspired violence against dissidents.

Dr Mahmoud al-Maghrabi, a former Libyan prime minister and a veteran opponent of Colonel Gadhafi, said yesterday of the security alert: "Anyone who is outside Libya in opposition is an enemy and therefore to be liquidated. They've said so enough times and they've done it as well."

Two Libyan exiles were assassinated in London in 1980, a journalist outside the Regent's Park Mosque and a solicitor outside his home in Kensington a few weeks later.

Police guard Libyans and children in Manchester

FAMILY OF SIX ON GADDAFI'S LIST OF DEATH

A SPECIAL police guard has been mounted on the family of a Libyan exile living in Manchester — who have become the target of a Arab assassination squad.

The 35-year-old man, his wife and four children, have been put on a "hit list" by Libyan dictator Colonel Gaddafi.

The fact that the children have been included in the vendetta is a cause of special concern.

One of the Libyan leader's top henchmen is believed to have arrived in Britain to organise the assassination attempt.

Police are taking the threat so seriously that the man, Mr Muhammed Abdu Bin Galboon, has been equipped with a special "bleeper" system to keep him in direct, round-the-clock contact with police.

A constant guard of CID and Special Branch detectives has been placed on his home in a Manchester suburb.

Mr Galboon was put on the death list because of his work overseas against the Libyan regime.

Mr Galboon, president of the expatriate Libyan Constitutional Union, has dedicated himself and his organisation to overthrowing Col Gaddafi and bringing about the return of ousted King Idris.

Now, since the threat of the political killing, he has virtually become a prisoner in his Manchester home and dare not send his children, aged nine, seven, four, and three, to school.

Genuine

The man leading the death squad is believed to have organised other murder attempts in Europe in the past, as part of Col Gaddafi's assassination campaign against overseas Libyans hostile to his rule.

The murder threat came after Mr Galboon's organisation announced its aims of working to topple Col Gaddafi — the Libyan dictator replied with a warning broadcast over the state radio that all the men in the organisation and their wives and children would be killed.

"Nobody can protect them from us — not even Scotland Yard," the warning said.

A senior police officer in Manchester said today: "We think this threat is genuine and we are not taking the matter lightly."

"Mr Galboon is being given absolute security and special attention is being paid to his home and family."

LATE last year, a Libyan student living in Cambridge Avenue, Whalley Range, Manchester, was stabbed to death in a ritual killing. His wife said the murder was "political."

HUNTED

A FAMILY in Britain were last night living in fear of death from Libyan dictator Gaddafi's hit men.

Special Branch detectives have mounted a round-the-clock guard on the intended victims, who are living in a Manchester suburb.

They were alerted after news that one of Colonel Gaddafi's top "death squad" men has arrived in Britain to organise the murder mission.

He is a high-ranking Libyan who is suspected of having masterminded previous killings in Europe, though he never pulls the trigger himself.

The killer squad's target is a 35-year-old Libyan exile who has launched an organisation to overthrow Gaddafi and reinstate the deposed King Idris.

Muhammed Abdu Bin Galboon, president of the Libyan Constitutional Union, is virtually a prisoner in his home with his wife and children, aged nine,

seven, four and three.

His organisation announced its aims in a proclamation the day before the killing of President Sadat of Egypt.

When the news reached Gaddafi, he put out a warning over Libyan radio.

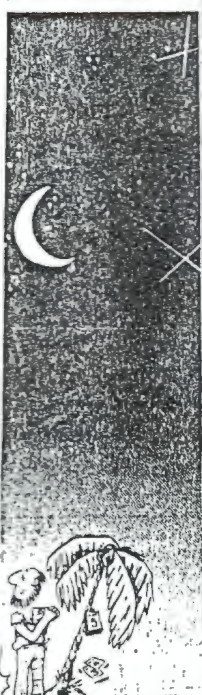



Dear Mr. Baker ,

On the occasion of this festive season I would like to convey to you my warm greetings and best wishes for a merry Christmas and a happy New Year.

Also, I would like to take this opportunity of writing to you to outline the origin and development of the content of the communications that I've had with the U.S. officials.

The first of my meetings with U.S. officials took place in an Arab capital in July 1982. These high ranking department of state officials have special interest and expertise in the Libyan affairs. My discussions with these officials were extensive and covered wide ground in various meetings which lasted for several days. These meetings were promoted by the officially expressed U.S. desire to stand by the democratic principles and to confront the illegal and dictatorial regimes like Qaddafi's. This was evident in my conversations with the U.S. officials who gave me the impression that the U.S. is eager to actively assist the democratic forces in Libya. During these discussions, the officials I was conferring with, maintained a constant contact with their colleagues in Washington D.C. by telex, the impression I had was that my analysis and proposals had been well received and appreciated. The favourable impressions I've got, were confirmed later, when I was advised to visit Washington D.C. to pursue the matter further, which I did in September of the same year.

From the discussions with the U.S. officials in Washington D.C. followed by more in the Arab capital where the initial discussions took place, I came to the conclusion that in spite of the fact that my argument was recognised as being cogent by the officials concerned, the prevailing official view was to continue with their earlier perception of the case, which I think is based upon misleading informations and wrong evaluations. They offered me to participate in a scheme they are in sympathy with for being consistent with their conception, but in spite of the fact that this offer was not flattering, I refused in a most tactful way. And it was hinted to me that the U.S. would see to it that the LCU will not get any support or assistance from U.S. friends in the area, which what has been happening ever since. In my refusal of this offer I have advanced the opinion that this scheme was ill planned and can lead to very expensive failures. Subsequent events which culminated in what happened on (May 84), proved that was indeed the case.

In a letter from the director of the North African Affairs Department in the U.S. Department of State, your interest in my views was indicated, which motivated me to renew my contact with the U.S. officials on optimistic basis.

But my first two long meetings with the U.S. officials in Washington D.C. in July 1984, were total disappointments as I mentioned to you in a letter dated 17 July 1984.

From my last meeting with the U.S. officials in Washington D.C. early this month, and from certain activities that have been going on in some Libyan opposition movement, I found out that a decision has been made to adopt and to put into practice most of the LCU proposals and ideas. Sadly, these ideas were taken out of their integral whole and manipulated to suit the aims and goals of some ex-Qaddafi's diplomats who have been cooperating with U.S. officials before my contact with these officials has started. And, the thinking of these officials points to the opinion that, too much time, effort and money have been expended in fostering this relationship with these ex-diplomats to make any change of direction feasible now. Besides, any change of policy regarding this group would imply that a series of mistakes in analysis have been taking place.

The LCU's mode of analysis and conclusions, concerning the Libyan case, are very much rooted in the historical heritage of the Libyan people. These thoughts and ideas resulted from a number of achievements that have been realised and gave shape in the process to modern Libya. These fundamental notions are sacred to the Libyan people, for they define their conditions and give rise to their aspirations. I hope that these ideas will be the motivational force behind the Libyan people's efforts to organise and increase their effectiveness in confronting the present ruthless and dictatorial regime, in order for them to establish a just and a durable system of government that is based upon the rule of law which is consistent with the democratic principles and practices.

Taking these ideas out of their integral whole, and their manipulation to make them serviceable for who can not appreciate them, is to distort them. I think that the result of this attempt will not be just a failure, costing time and money like the previous one, but also the heritage and achievements of the Libyan people.

I am not aware of any inherent ill feeling or enmity between the American and the Libyan peoples. Moreover, the Libyan people have never harmed the legitimate interests of the U.S.A. , and I do not think that the American people will deliberately and knowingly support any scheme endangering the achievements, the heritage, and the future prospects of the Libyan people.

Upon putting this case to you, dear sir, and the White House Staff, I am confident that it will be looked at closely and considerately.

Thank you for your letter of 11/30/81, it arrived here 12/7/81...what can I say?

Naturally by the time my letters to the President got to you you hadn't received my final correspondence. Let me quickly give you some background to the run. It takes over six months to set up the logistics regarding this national run. Then we had it re-routed to provide proper political exposure. We decided to include the U.S. Service Runners. Next we had to hold up the run pending the arrival of the Service teams. The logistics and coordination with police departments across the country takes six to eight months of work and preparation so that we can know within five minutes where each team will be, plus the food, gas, timers, A.A.U. officials, closing and opening of streets, mapping, etc., etc. (Thank God the work is done by those more capable than I.)

My Company owns the run, and I want my country involved, at no cost to them. So with no word, I rewrote the President regarding the timing. Then I had the run cancelled for 1982 because we did not know who to contact in Washington regarding the Services... no one except my friend who has more than enough to do running our great nation. Then you wrote to me and we've gotten to first base. How's this for a proposal to you:

We will begin in 1982 to set-up the run, anew. We will invite each arm of the military - army, navy, marines and air force. They will face a Nike Running team and the Los Angeles Fire and the Los Angeles Police Departments. The run by the latter two was done to the Olympics from Los Angeles to Montreal, Canada in 1976. This run also will be coast to coast. You provide your own vehicles and your colors, uniforms, doctors and trainers. We will provide the food, vitamins, nutritionists and gas. If you need more we'll get it for you at no cost to our government. I love my country and our President, and this is the Super Bowl of Runs.

The run will take 16 days and a great many young athletes from high schools and colleges will get a fresh new look at our military. It should help with recruiting and give our military a very favorable exposure -- that is just to mention a few of the added benefits.

The Police Brotherhood will cooperate with the L.A. Police Department as they have in the past in getting us across country.

D.C. and ending at the Los Angeles Coliseum just before the Olympics, again with the presentation of the President's Cup. In 1983, we will start in Los Angeles and go across country to Washington, D.C., arriving just before the First Lady's Birthday. Again there will be the presentation of the President's Cup on the 4th of July to the winning team.

If you find this run to your liking, a team event at no cost to our country, (with enough time to prepare for it), if you feel your teams can go day and night for 16 days, then re-contact me. The Re-Union is just that. I want to reunite our country (or at least help) behind our President.

The books we have on the run are voluminous. Each team and team member will be provided with maps of towns, their streets, rules, regulations, weather over the past twenty years, etc., etc. Well as you can see, it's well thought out, expensive, and the patent is pending on the run. It has already been A.A.U. sanctioned and run under their rules. I will next meet with your representatives here or on the Pacific Coast in early 1982. If the Interservice Sports Committee gives a tentative approval for 1983, if we are still in tentative accord, then your man or men will meet with our coordinators to see the logistics involved and routes to be run. If we are still in tentative accord, then we shall ask for your acceptance and approval of your participation in the Re-Union Run.

At that time you all can begin to have your own time trials to see who is strong enough to participate from the military teams. In September of 1982 the books will be ready for each team. In June 1983 the run will commence. As 1984 is an election year, I would like by then to see the interest of our whole nation in this run, with so many states involved, it's a natural.

Again, thank you for your kind consideration of this run. I sincerely hope, given a period of time, you will see fit to include at least one or more of your Service teams. Time has passed for 1982, please get just a tentative approval for 1983. We would love to include you.

With your kind permission, I am sending a copy of this letter along with yours to our President.

This letter is in response to your request for the views of the Department of Commerce on S. 871, a bill to prohibit all exports to or imports from Libya.

The Department of Commerce does not support the passage of S. 871. We believe that the selective controls now in place on trade with Libya fulfill United States foreign policy objectives without causing the problems that would be created by a total trade embargo with Libya.

The Secretary of Commerce, in consultation with the Secretary of State, has developed an effective export policy toward Libya. Under this policy, a validated license or reexport authorization is required for all exports and reexports to Libya of U.S.-origin commodities or technology, as well as for certain foreign products based on U.S. technology or containing U.S.-origin components. Medical supplies, food, and other agricultural products are exempt from this policy. Generally, the Commerce Department denies requests for validated licenses for items controlled for national security reasons, and for goods and technology destined for the petrochemical processing complex at Ras Lanuf. License applications for other oil and gas equipment and technology are denied by the Office of Export Administration if it determines that the item is not readily available from sources outside the United States. In addition, imports of Libyan crude oil are also restricted for national security reasons under Section 232 of the Trade Expansion Act of 1962.

This trade policy was developed to restrict the U.S. contribution to Libya's capacity to engage in activities detrimental to United States foreign policy interests, specifically Libya's international terrorist activities. It achieves this objective without unnecessarily restricting non-strategic export transactions which amounted to over \$200 million in sales in Fiscal Year 1984. Moreover, by imposing controls selectively, and not codifying

the controls in statute, our present policy provides the President with the flexibility to respond to changes in U.S.-Libya relations. Finally, unlike S. 871, our current policy does not mandate the application of U.S. export controls to U.S. subsidiaries operating abroad. The extraterritorial reach of U.S. controls has been viewed with great concern by our trading partners. In sum, S. 871 creates an export control policy toward Libya which does not merit favorable consideration.

The Office of Management and Budget has advised us that there is no objection to the submission of this report from the standpoint of the Administration's program.
