Subject: Galtieri Call

First I think we have to recognize that one purpose of the Galtieri call may be to play Haig off against the President. Alternatively he may seek to use a little psychological warfare against Thatcher by leaking to the press that he has been in touch with the President.

We can't let this happen. It will confuse the issue and open us to the same tactic as the shuttle continues with very harmful potential.

I recommend:

1. That we not announce the Galtieri call.
2. That if Glatieri leaks it, we say that Galtieri called ~~and the President~~ (emphasis on his having placed the call) and without getting into details, was reassured of the President's wish to find a peaceful solution to the issue.
3. That if it does not leak, that no separate cable or call be made to Thatcher. That if it does leak, we send a simple cable via Cabinet line to say nothing more than we have to.
4. In any case, the first step ought to be to send Al an accurate and complete summary of the call so that he cannot be sandbagged by Galtieri saying something at variance with what was really said in the conversation.

Subject: Efrem Zimbalist and Argentina

Efrem Zimbalist called today to report a contact from a friend--an American--who does business in Argentina. His friend had been contacted by a General Pena who conveyed the following message:

"We are concerned for the restoration of good relations between the US and Argentina after the Junta is thrown out." We realize that the British cannot stop fighting now, but after they take the islands back, the Junta will be deposed and then we must move quickly--the US and Argentine patriots--to restore our relations."

He wanted guidance. I explained that we were receiving signals from a number of sources; some of them patriots; some of them self-serving, and that if he were contacted again, he should only say he had passed the message along.

I will have Gen Pena run through the Agency file.

When you called me last night you were kind enough to suggest that I might get in touch with you. I am taking advantage of this somewhat earlier than I thought I would. Today General Miret, the Plenipotentiary sent to the United Nations from Argentina called on me at his initiative. He summed up the latest Argentine proposal as follows:

1. An immediate ceasefire.
2. Mutual withdrawal of Argentine and British forces with the Argentine withdrawal to begin before the British.
3. The withdrawal to be to a distance of 150 miles by both sides.
4. The Falklands to be governed by a representative of the UN together with four nations, two each to be appointed by Argentina and Britain respectively, with the United States being one of them. These nations would also supply the garrison for the Falklands.
5. Negotiations between Britain and Argentina to take place under the aegis of these four nations.

General Miret told me informally that Argentina was prepared to let these negotiations extend through 1983. General Miret also says that this proposal has been given to Enders by the Argentine Ambassador in Washington. My

view is this:

1. We were right to resist the use of force by Argentina to settle an outstanding dispute (though I have my questions about the tactics).

2. We do not have an equal interest in humiliating Argentina in its political objective and to bring about a cataclysmic reversal of its domestic politics and the disruption of the Inter-American system, both of which we are now in severe danger of having happen.

I think we can avoid this by bringing about decisively an end to hostilities in the nearest future. It seems to me the Argentine proposal has many of the key elements that achieve this objective, but in any event some explicit American program is needed to break the logjam before something irreversible has happened in Latin America and Argentina.

I told General Miret that I was in no position to express a view and all I could do was to make sure that his view reached the travelling party. You are, of course, free to share this with the President. Every good wish,

SUBJECT: Today At The United Nations

1. As you may know, at about noon on Thursday the Spanish modified their resolution calling for a simple ceasefire to include the further call for implementation of UNSC resolutions 502 and 505. This addition would, of course, implicitly require Argentine withdrawal.
2. The British have succeeded in getting a delay until tomorrow morning for the vote. They will work throughout the night with the French to develop language that would assure a linkage between the Secretary General's responsibility to verify compliance with the ceasefire (as currently written) and the additional responsibility to verify the withdrawal. I will keep you advised.
3. New Subject -- START. Intelligence sources report that we can expect Pravda to publish a very severe point-by-point criticism of the President's START proposal in the next day or so. By its tone and length it may well be viewed by U.S. reporters as a rejection of our position. That should not worry us.
4. If this should break while you are away, I recommend that you instruct Larry Speakes to take the position that while we acknowledge these unofficial views which historically are to be expected, we will look forward to receiving official Soviet comment when the talks open in Geneva on June 29. The President remains committed to achieving serious reductions in strategic weapons.
