SUBJECT: Reply to Speaker O'Neill on Visit of U.S.S.R. Delegation Led by Vladimir V. Shcherbitskiy

Speaker of the House of Representatives Thomas P. O'Neill sent a letter on January 31 to advise you that, in response to his invitation, a delegation of the the Supreme Soviet of the U.S.S.R. will visit the House during the the week of March 4. The delegation will be headed by Vladimir V. Shcherbitskiy, First Secretary of the Ukrainian S.S.R., a full member of the Politburo and of the Presidium of the U.S.S.R. Supreme Soviet. Aside from Foreign Minister Gromyko, Shcherbitskiy is the first full Member of the Politburo to visit the United States since Brezhnev's visit in 1973. (When full Politburo member Mikhail Solomentsev visited the the United States in 1977, he was only a candidate member. Boris Ponomarev, also a candidate member of the Politburo, visited the United States in 1978.)

O'Neill has appointed Congressman Thomas F. Foley Chairman of the House delegation handling the visit for the Congress, and he has asked that you appoint someone from the State Department to coordinate Department support for the visit.

The attached reply to Speaker O'Neill assures the Speaker of our interest in assisting the Congress in making this a successful and productive visit. It informs the Speaker that you have asked Tom Simons, Director of the Office of the Soviet Union Affairs, to coordinate with the Congress on all aspects of the visit. (Note: H does not concur with this designation * and will be forwarding its own memo on this subject.) Hill staffers have asked that we forward your reply to Speaker O'Neill as soon as possible, since they intend to use Executive Branch approval of the visit as one means to help their efforts to set up a more interesting schedule for Shcherbitskiy.

You will shortly receive a decision memo outlining our plans for Executive Branch participation in this visit, including your own participation and recommendations for the White House. We will also be sending you an information memo later this week describing overall preparations for the Shcherbitiskiy visit in more detail.



Dear Mr. Secretary:

As you know, I extended an invitation to the Supreme Soviet of the U.S.S.R. to send a delegation to the House of Representatives in reciprocation for the 1983 official House delegation visit to the Soviet Union which was lead by Representative Thomas S. Foley. I have been informed by Ambassador Dobrynin that the Supreme Soviet has accepted this invitation and a delegation will visit the House the week of March 4. The delegation leader will be Vladimir V. Scherbytsky, a member of the Politburo and of the Presidium of the Supreme Soviet.

I have appointed Representative Thomas S. Foley, the Majority Whip of the House of Representatives, as Chairman of the official House delegation that will receive the Soviet visitors and have asked him to coordinate their activities in the Congress. 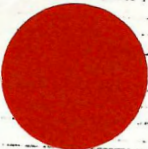
