#### U.S. 'DISPLEASURE' COMMON FACTOR' IN LEADERS' DEATHS

[Excerpt] The world press is continuing to publish materials related to the murder of Swedish Prime Minister Olof Palme. The investigations into this murder by the Swedish authorities have thus far found no trace of the criminals, although a computer photograph [fotorobot] compiled on the evidence of witnesses has been distributed today.

But as the recently received facts show, it is not a question of the actions of an individual murderer but of a carefully planned plot worked out in fine detail.

Attempting to elucidate whom Olof Palme disturbed in restrospect, the Swedish press recalls that strong disagreements first arose around the personality of the deceased prime minister when he expressed sharp condemnation of the U.S. aggression in Vietnam and participated in a mass protest demonstration in Stockholm in 1968. Numerous fresh facts also are adduced. It is particularly recalled that Olof Palme was subjected to crude attacks a year ago, only a year ago, on the part of U.S. Assistant Secretary of State Burt. The cause for Washington's displeasure at that time was the Swedish Government head's criticism of Washington's policy with respect to Nicaragua.

In considering the circumstances of the eminent statesman's death, I thought of certain circumstances which I would like to share with you, comrades.

The world has witnessed the violent removal of a number of eminent figures from the political arena over the past few years. Each of these evil deeds is significant in its own right. But if one correlates them, then a most significant chain of events emerges. I will name a few of these terrorist acts:

The murder in Delhi of one of the most prominent statesmen of the past few decades, Indian Prime Minister Indira Gandhi. Her policy, as is known often aroused sharp criticism from Washington. The tragic death of former Italian Prime Minister Aldo Moro, who had irritated Washington through his desire to set up cooperation with the Italian Communist Party. The death in August 1981, in an aircraft disaster, of the leader of the Panamanian revolution, Omar Torrijos, who led the Panamanian people's struggle against Yankee imperialism for the right to control the Panama Canal. Friends of General Torrijos — the remarkable writers Graham Greene and Gabriel Garcia Marquez and also his brother — have openly accused the U.S. CIA of organizing the aircraft disaster. Also included on this list is the name of Chilean President Salvador Allende, a politician who aroused Washington's special, I would say paranoid, hatred.

And here is the most recent report, just received from the Brazilian capital. Investigations are under way there involving the group of doctors who operated on Tancredo Neves, elected to the post of president of Brazil in the spring of 1985. Neves' impending accession to the post of president caused much unease on the banks of the Potomac, insofar as he had spoken during the preelection campaign of the need to fight U.S. economic and political dominance in Brazil.

As has now become known, the operation, which was carried out on Neves on the eve of his accession to the presidency, took place in must suspicious circumstances. In particular, 18 people were in the operating theater at that time, of whom only half were doctors. Tancredo Neves thus died on the operating table without having occupied the post to which he was elected by the people of Brazil.

The circumstances of the tragic deaths of those whom I have named are different. The common factor is only that each of them was a figure who had aroused the displeasure of Washington.

There are no facts at this time which permit one to say definitely as to who put together the plot against Olof Palme. But, agree with me that the chain of events which I have recalled provides food for thought.

[Excerpt] Moscow -- Question: What message did Mikhail Gorbachev intend to convey in his policy report to the CPSU congress?

Answer: The message -- though addressed to two different audiences -- is that we cannot continue as at present, that we must change the way we think and behave. For our people this means that we must change, change our social relations, and the way we work within the party and government. For the outside world it means that we have reached a point of no return. If we continue to behave as we have behaved for years, the result will be frightening.

Question: What is the conclusion?

Answer: That despite all the difficulties and problems, we live in the same world, are extremely interdependent, and are in danger. In fact we face many dangers and we can only tackle them if we unite. So, like it or not, we must work together. We can do nothing on our own, and neither can the North Americans or the Europeans.

Question: What are these dangers?

Answer: The danger of war, the arms race, the possibility of the world's irreparable split between rich and poor nations, and the despair of the developing countries, whose situation is worsening daily.

Question: How can a greater degree of security be attained?

Answer: Gorbachev has formulated a new concept of security. Security cannot be built by means of weapons, military organizations, or military technological methods. It would be a miracle. Nowadays security is a political problem that can only be solved by political means. Otherwise the result will be that we will have more weapons and less security.

Question: But the United States cannot be blamed entirely for the cold war. Has the USSR not made mistakes too?

Answer: Nobody is perfect, of course, and if history gave us the chance to live again undoubtedly we would act differently, do other things... but that is a luxury that history does not grant us. It is time not to concentrate on who is more or less to blame but to decide what must be done now. Lenin said on a certain occasion that there are different kinds of mistakes.

SUBJECT: Protest Over Soviet Insinuations Of U.S. Responsibility For Palme Assassination

As noted in your March 17 memorandum, the Soviets continued to make outrageous insinuations of U.S. responsibility for the Palme assasination following our March 3 protest. The March 6 piece by Valentin Zorin on Soviet television was particularly scurrilous. Deputy Assistant Secretary Mark Palmer again protested the continuation of the campaign to Soviet Charge Sokolov on March 20, citing the Zorin piece and a March 2 Izvestia article by Georigy Arbatov.

Interestingly, it now appears that our original March 3 protest and the negative Swedish reaction to the Soviet statements may have had some effect. One of the Soviet writers involved in the campaign, Chingiz Aytmatov, felt it necessary to publicly deny any intent to hint at CIA involvement in the Palme assassination. Aytmatov told the Swedish daily "Dagens Nyheter" in an interview appearing March 17 that he was "alarmed" his March 2 Pravda article had been interpreted in the Swedish press as insinuating CIA involvement in Palme's death.

As noted in the attached memorandum prepared by our Bureau of Intelligence and Research, Soviet propaganda on the Palme assassination is now taking a more subtle line, implying only that his death was the work of those who opposed his efforts on behalf of peace and disarmament.

USSR: More Insignations About Palme's Assassination

Soviet media have dropped the initial implied charge that the US was involved in the murder of Swedish Prime Minister Palme, but the subtler linkage of an international conspiracy against peace and disarmament now seems to be emerging. A recent report alleging a coincidence between Palme's advocacy of Gorbachev's peace proposals and the timing of his death suggests the Soviets intend to continue exploiting the Palme case on behalf of their disarmament campaign.

A senior East European official abroad alleged the Soviets had told him that Palme was killed only a few hours after signing a letter to President Reagan and General Secretary Gorbachev that advocated key elements of Gorbachev's arms control proposal, according to a clandestine report. The official instructed his subordinates that in conversations with foreign officials no direct charge of US complicity should be made but that the "coincidence" should be "worked in."

Immediately after Palme's assassination Soviet media insinuated that the US was implicated in the murder. For example, TASS March 1 alleged that Palme had aroused US hostility and had long been kept under surveillance by the CIA for his opposition to the war in Vietnam. Georgiy Arbatov wrote in Izvestiya March 2 that he did not know who killed Palme but he "knew who hated him," implying a US hand in the murder.

This line of guilt by innuendo largely dropped out of central Soviet media organs after the US protest to the Soviet Embassy in Washington March 3, although Soviet commentator Valentin Zorin in a subsequent Soviet domestic TV broadcast (March 6) drew a parallel between Palme's death and those of Indira Gandhi, Aldo Moro, Omar Torrijos and others, stating that each had aroused the displeasure of Washington. (Soviet media had insinuated CIA involvement in all these deaths.)

# SECRET/NOFORN/NOCONTRACT/ORCON

There were no propaganda overtones attendant to Soviet Premier Ryzhkov's attendance at the Palme funeral. However, the media continued to carry praise of Palme as a peace activist and to imply that his death was the work of those who were against his activities on behalf of disarmament and peace. In his eulogy Arbatov had noted that Palme's last thoughts were focused on the USSR's new disarmament proposals, and Soviet press spokesman Lomeyko March 14 observed that he had championed a world without nuclear weapons and supported a ban on nuclear testing.

On March 4, USIA sent a worldwide cable to the field asking for reports on any media items or enquiries regarding a US/CIA role in Olof Palme's death. Several posts responded, mostly with replays of the TASS item appearing in the local communist party organ. USIA guidance to posts was that they should not even dignify the charge of US involvement in the Palme murder with a comment. This was essentially the same tack taken by the Department spokesman.

While the US demarche may have put to rest the initial innuendos, we can expect to see more of this subtler, less direct linkage of an international conspiracy against disarmament and peace, with the implication that the US stands in the background.

Dear Senator Durenberg r:

Now that there is conclusive evidence that the reakdown of a Chernobyl nuclear power plant reactor produced a considerable quantity of radioactive fallout, we have a chance to utilize this fact for propaganda purposes. Furthermore, it is good for us that Moscow has made no official statement on the event.

Therefore we suggest that following steps should be taken:

- Reports should be spread by our associates in European information media giving the public the details of Chernobyl disaster:
- m number of victims should be alleged to be somewhere between 2,000 and 3,000;
  - me mass evacuation of population from the 100-mile zone;
- and panic should also be given publicity.
- a appropriate illustrations and textual material should be provided,
- a campaign should be organized by USIA officials who should also supply the material needed.
- In view of the forthcoming Tokya summit data should be provided for the statement on the Cheropoyl disaster to be issued by the seven leaders.
- Considering the facts about the increased air pollution, our allies should be recommended to stop imports of food and other commodities from Eastern bloc.
- Our allies should be influenced so as to make a request for compensation for contamination of their territory.

We will keep you informed of any future measures.

Dear General Schweitzer:

Enclosed is a copy of the forgery attributed to you.

We are able to draw some conclusions at this time.

- 1. The copy of the forgery in our possession was placed on the desk of an Italian journalist by an unknown person. It was in a plain white envelope. This method of surfacing a forgery is a well-known Soviet technique.
- 2. Based on information supplied by General Schweitzer, USIS Rome was able to convince the journalist that the letter was a forgery. As a result the perpetrators were compelled to use a Guatemalan "news service" known to be associated with the Cuban-Nicaraguan-backed insurgents to provide credibility to the Italian news agency that surfaced the forgery. This revealed the Cuban-Nicaraguan hand in the forgery.
- 3. General Schweitzer's evidence, provided to the Italian press service, was widely distributed both by them and USIA. Thus, the facts about the forgery are now well-known. Such exposes raise the cost to the forgers.

The following are preliminary findings of an unofficial but expert forensic examination of the forgery:

- 1. Paper: Not common in America.
- 2. Text: Possibly, the letterhead and the text were all printed on one machine, although it is difficult to determine from a copy. The letterhead does not appear to be "spliced" on.
- 3. Signature: Because the letter is a photocopy and the note provided was signed with a felt-tip pen it is difficult to say anything about the signature. However, it appears to be well executed. Lab would need several samples of the General's signature to determine such things as where he signs his name in relation to the signature bloc.
- 4. Comments: Based upon a cursory examination, it appears the document is an excellent forgery.
- A linguistic examination of the forgery is now being done.
