SUBJECT: Denial of Soviet Visit to Alaska Pipeline

The Department of State is denying a request from General Electric that they host a group of Soviet engineers, headed by an unspecified deputy minister of the gas industry and the operational manager of the export gas pipeline, on a tour of the Alaska pipeline in June. We will inform GE of our decision.

The Soviets wanted to review the Alaska pipeline consortium's experience in maintaining GE Frame V turbines in the tundra. All equipment which the visitors would have seen is licensable for export to the USSR under current standards. The Soviet delegation also planned to tour Canadian pipelines equipped with aircraft-engine derivative compressors. The Soviet <u>quid pro quo</u> would have been a visit by GE engineers to the new Soviet export gas pipeline to Western Europe.

While we perceived commercial utility for GE from the exchange of visits, 25x1 opportunities for the USG, we believe the Soviets would have been the net gainers. In addition, there was a strong possibility that the visit would have been interpreted as evidence that we now view our pipeline sanctions as a mistake, and that we are relaxing our oil and gas equipment export controls. Therefore, we decided to deny the visit.
