Dear Mr. President:

On Monday, August 17,1981, you chose to call a National Security Council meeting and disrupted a jewelry business show being held at the Century Plaza Hotel in Los Angeles, California.

This letter is not to complain of the workings or needs of the Federal Government nor is this letter not to show appreciation for the work this year of your Administration; for your tax cuts, budget cuts and for the general mood of optimism that you have managed to instill into the business community. But this letter is to complain about what you did to what was at last going to be a much needed successful business show.

The jewelry industry has been suffering like very few industries. We have had a drop off in employment of 30% in the last several years, imports are up to where they are now 25% of all jewelry products sold in this country, the fluctuating prices of gold are driving us crazy, interest rates are driving us broke, and charlatan diamond and gold investment counselors are driving us up a wall. We finally got a business show that was going well. Saturday and Sunday were superb, but from 12:00 Monday on, the show absolutely died because of the hubbub created by your visit. The big buyers, who wait until a business show quiets down before sitting down to work peacefully, all went home, leaving us frustrated and more than slightly disgusted.

We in the jewelry industry know the needs of government must come first, but I just wish the Government, generally considerate to business, could sometimes be specifically considerate before upsetting one of the most important (and costly) trade shows we have during the entire year.

We continue to wish you well for the next 7½ years of your Administration, but please give us the opportunity to flourish also.

Dear Mr. President:

As one President to another, I felt I should write you regarding a very unpleasant experience I had with your staff at the Century Plaza Hotel.

We were attending a Retailer Jewelry Association Trade Show (Held annually at the Century Plaza). The dates of the Show were August 15-17th and the Show for the Trade was to have been opened until 6 P.M. each day. Normally we would stay over on the last day working with customers until we were finished.

On Monday morning, August 17th, we were informed by the Secret Service that we would have to vacate our suite at 4 P.M. since you and your party had determined to take the entire floor.

Since you profess to be "pro-business" it might be of interest to you that it was necessary for us to turn away two new customers who returned to write opening orders and could have represented 20% additional business during the Show; who knows what other orders we lost at the last minute.

It cost my company thousands of dollars to participate in these Trade Shows in addition to a great deal of effort on the part of each of my sales people.

Closing elevators, having Secret Service people with dogs and general confusion about the details of when we had to be out of the hotel to satisfy your party's needs, did nothing to win you any friends.

What rights does one have when the Staff of the President of the U.S.A. can dismiss citizens the way we were?

I would recommend that your staff check out what functions might be going on in the hotels you plan to use in the future and have a little more consideration for the expense of Trade Shows and Conventions; after all, our success is the success of the country and you haven't turned things around yet.
