

I. PURPOSE

To permit the Republican Leader Bob Michel, and the Republican Whip, Trent Lott to brief the President on the status of House Republican deficit reduction efforts.

II. BACKGROUND

It is likely that the House Budget Committee will begin markup of the First Budget Resolution the week of March 19, 1984. In anticipation of this, the Republican Leadership of the House has been working with its Senate counterpart to develop a package of deficit reduction measures.

Though their package is not complete House Republicans are contemplating options that would achieve \$130-160 billion in savings over three years. The principal components at this time are:

- Defense growth which results in a spending level of \$295 billion (Function 050) for FY 1985.
- (2) A tax proposal similar to that just reported by the Ways and Means Committee which provides \$45 billion in additional revenue over the next three years.
- (3) Freezing nondefense spending and some changes in COLA formulas providing at least \$45 billion in savings over the next three years.

The Leadership will meet Tuesday, March 13 and Wednesday, March 14 with all House Republicans to obtain their recommendations for the deficit reduction package. It is expected that the final drafting of the budget alternative will begin on Thursday, March 15. (Background cont.)

The Leadership feels it is important to have Republican unity on a deficit reduction package so they can effectively counter a Democratic budget proposal.

I. PURPOSE

To visit the school the White House "adopted" on October 13, 1983.

II. BACKGROUND

As part of a nationwide effort to promote private sector involvement in education, you announced that the White House would lead by example and "adopt" Congress Heights Elementary School in Southeast Washington.

Since your announcement on October 13, White House staff members have been tutoring students, addressing classes at the school, exchanging letters, sponsoring field trips, donating books and equipment, and many students have attended various White House functions.

Following your proclamation declaring school year 1983-84 as the Year of Partnerships in Education, 18 federal departments and agencies have adopted schools. Thus far, we have identified 27,479 educational partnerships across the country. This figure continues to increase as the Department of Education surveys all 111,000 schools.

You will see a demonstration of the IBM "Writing to Read" Program, an excellent private sector initiative example. IBM donates the computer equipment to the school system to teach kindergarten and 1st graders how to read using modern computer techniques.

The President of Togo and the Chairman of the Interim Council of Grenada have also visited the school.



I. PURPOSE

To discuss the budget and our ongoing effort to achieve Republican unity in a deficit reduction package.

II. BACKGROUND

You have met twice (March 8 and 9) with this key group of Republican Senators in an effort to devise a deficit reduction package. Thus far, there appears to be general agreement on the idea of a package embodying a "three legged stool" approach focusing on revenue, non-defense spending, and defense. While there appears to be general agreement on the revenue package and non-defense spending cuts, the defense numbers remain a sticking point.

During your second meeting with this group last Friday, Senate Majority Leader Howard Baker asked for one more opportunity to meet with you today. In the meantime, Baker will have met with the other Senators in another attempt to come to some agreement on the defense numbers.

It is important that we reach some agreement with Republicans in the Congress. We anticipate that the Democrats will present their own package some time this week--perhaps Wednesday. We need to demonstrate a unified Republican approach to deficit reduction before the Democrats act.



- -- The Bipartisan Commission reported to me in mid-January that Central America is a vital national security interest.
- -- The Bipartisan Commission concluded that:
 - o Further Communist guerrilla warfare success there will mean that the U.S. would have to either substantially increase its defense capabilities along our southern border or sharply reduce our commitments in Europe, the Middle East and Asia.
 - The level of U.S. effort must be increased substantially.
 - Nicaragua violated its commitments to implement democracy and its cooperation with the Soviet bloc and Cuba in exporting subversion gives a preview of what other Communist regimes there would do.
 - Further Communist success in Central America would mean potentially millions of refugees coming into the U.S.
- -- Based on the Bipartisan Commission's recommendations, I have asked Congress to fund a comprehensive program of economic aid and military assistance (\$8 million over five years with two-thirds economic and social aid).
- -- That request is now before the Congress and deserves support.
- -- We have an immediate emergency situation in El Salvador:
 - Our military assistance funds ran out at the end of February; shortages are showing up.
 - We expect the Communist guerrillas, as in 1982, to launch increased military attacks to disrupt the democratic election of March 25, 1984.
- -- In Nicaragua, the anti-Sandinista paramilitary forces have made Nicaraguan export of subversion more difficult and have exerted positive pressure for Nicaragua to negotiate with its neighbors -- that process must continue.
- -- My Administration could have acted under special emergency authorities, but instead, we sought to use the customary Congressional funding process.
- -- My Administration is proposing a balanced program with the funding considered necessary to accomplish our national security purposes; those in Congress who fail to support the Bipartisan Commission program, will be held accountable by the American people and by history.

TALKING POINTS ON LEBANON

- -- The U.S., in cooperation with MNF our allies, did the right thing by giving Lebanon a breathing spell to try and arrange the withdrawal of foreign forces and to bring about internal political reconciliation.
- -- However, Syria and other radical forces, through refusal to withdrawn and its support of terrorist activities and subversion, was able to intimidate the Government of Lebanon and force it to renounce the May 17 agreement.
- -- No American should regret our efforts in Lebanon:
 - o Most of the PLO is out of Lebanon.
 - o Syrian-Israeli war has so far been avoided.
 - The Lebanese may yet, when they meet again in Switzerland next week, agree to a broad-based government of national unity.
- -- Our MNF policy was broadly supported at the outset by a bipartisan resolution, but unfortunately that support waned.
- -- We stand ready to assist with diplomacy if the parties wish it.
- -- We see less need for a U.S. military role in and around Lebanon but will, as appropriate, continue to assist to the government's efforts to strengthen its military capabilities and try to achieve stability.

TALKING POINTS ON IRAN/IRAQ WAR

- -- As we have said before, the prospect of the Iranian regime achieving its objectives of overturning the Government of Iraq concerns us because this is not only : aggressive behavior toward a neighbor, but would seriously threaten further the peace and stability of the Gulf region.
- -- We deeply regret the loss of lives on both sides.
- -- We believe this will have very negative long-range effects on the future stability in the region.

TALKING POINTS ON GREECE/TURKEY CONFLICT

- -- We have been in touch with the Greek and Turkish governments, both here in Washington and in Athens and Ankara, to urge restraint by both parties and to obtain further information.
