As you know, on October 8th, the House passed, with amendments, the Senate-passed version of H.R. 5484, the "Anti-Drug Abuse Act of 1986." The bill contains improvements over the Senate bill. In particular, the death penalty was added, and objectionable provisions concerning sugar importation and the creation of a new forfeiture fund were dropped. Also deleted were proposed amendments of the Internal Revenue Code that would have permitted taxpayers to check off part of their refunds for drug abuse and enforcement programs and would have permitted use of Federal taxes to reimburse State and local law enforcement agencies for their costs. In addition, the more limited Senate language concerning the use Department of Defense personnel and resources in anti-drug enforcement activities was retained. Other troublesome provisions remain, however; the most important are highlighted below.

DRUG-FREE WORKPLACE

The bill omits amendments to the Civil Service Reform Act and the Rehabilitation Act proposed by the Administration. Under those amendments, the connection between job performance and drug use that now must be proven before disciplinary action may be taken, would be repealed; and individuals would not be qualified as handicapped solely for drug use or addiction.

DRUG-FREE SCHOOLS

DO EN SISOM The bill contains excessive funding, \$150 million a year above our proposal of \$100 million a year. Also, the restrictions placed on the funds allocated to the Secretary of Education, especially the set-aside for higher education grants and the requirement that funds be used to develop anti-drug curricula, are objectionable. The Administration has always held that curriculum development is not an appropriate Federal activity.

INTERNATIONAL COOPERATION AND LAW ENFORCEMENT

Defense Department Assistance to Civilian Agencies

The bill would require the Defense Department to develop a plan to assist civilian drug enforcement agencies. The plan would have to be submitted to the Armed Services Committees, which would "submit their approval or disapproval of such . . . plan to the Secretary [of Defense]." This type of committee approval or disapproval is an unconstitutional legislative veto, prohibited by the Chadha decision.

Interdiction

The excessive funding levels for the Customs Service and Coast Guard are objectionable, as is the earmarking of types and placement of assets, which should be left to the National Drug Enforcement Policy Board (NDEPB). (In particular, we object to requiring the Defense Department to make 4 E-2C aircraft available to the Customs Service and 4 E-2B's to the Coast Guard. We also object to authorizing \$25 million for command, control, communications and intelligence centers, a determination best left to the NDEPB.)

Asset Forfeiture Funds

The bill still provides for uses of forfeiture funds beyond ok what the Administration proposed; it is, however, a distinct improvement over the Senate version.

International

The Administration objects to denying trade benefits to "uncooperative" drug producing countries. The Administration must retain flexibility to act, based on an assessment of current circumstances. The Administration also opposes any efforts to restrict the President's discretion in directing United States participation in the activities of the various multilateral development banks, or otherwise conducting foreign policy.

State and Local Assistance

The bill provides \$350 million for each of fiscal years 1987-1989 for drug law enforcement grants to State and local law enforcement agencies. The Administration agreed to a funding level of \$100 million in 1987, to be derived from reprogrammed funds.

EXPANDING PUBLIC AWARENESS AND PREVENTION

We continue to oppose any requirement to convene a White House Conference.

GOAL 3: EXPAND DRUG TREATMENT

Administration Initiative

The Administration initiative would increase FY87 drug abuse treatment, research, and prevention funding to \$551 million, or \$233 million more than previously requested in the President's FY87 Budget. The \$233 million would be used to expand States' treatment capacity, demonstrate community-based drug abuse prevention programs, and expand Federal research and prevention efforts. The Administration also prooses to eliminate restrictions on States' use of block grant funds, thus permitting States to better target Federal treatment funds.

Senate Bipartisan Initiative (S 2878)

S 2878 would increase authorizations for drug and alcohol abuse research and the substance abuse and mental health block grant by \$259 million over the President's FY87 Budget. S 2878 would not provide for expanded prevention efforts. The bill also proposes \$25 million in FY87 and \$25 million annually in FY88 and FY89 for special alcohol and substance abuse programs among Indians.

Objectionable Provisions

o Metzenbaum amendment to increase block grant authorization to \$24% million over the \$490 million assumed in the President's FY87 Budget. As brought to the floor, S 2878 would have raised the authorization to \$675 million. 736

GOAL 6: EXPAND PUBLIC AWARENESS AND PREVENTION

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
Administration Initiative

The Administration initiative encourages private sector initiatives in educating the public with respect to drug abuse. In addition to \$10 million previously requested in the President's FY87 Budget, an additional \$5 million is requested for Federal programs to encourage private sector initiatives.

Senate Bipartisan Initiative (S 2878)

S 2878 would authorize an additional \$3 million for Federal Programs to encourage private sector initiatives, or \$2 million less than proposed by the Administration. S 2878 also proposes a White House Conference on Drug Abuse and Control to study the

drug abuse problem and propose solutions. The Conference would probably cost \$2 million.

I. Summary

The proposals should be categorized, and for each there should be references to options available to the Administration, i.e. appropriate degrees of support or non-support.

V. Funding

This section should focus on costing of the initiatives, both those offered by the Administration and any being proposed by Congress that are felt worthy of support.

VI. Communications

The final section of the Report should include a proposed plan for communications of the Administration's program.

I envision presentations of the Report to the Council without the President in attendance on September 10 and 15, and then possibly with the President on September 16. You might think about how best to present the recommendations and the decision issues in a timely manner. You could focus on the Administration plan on September 10, and on legislation at the meeting of the 15th. The two would be combined for the September 16 meeting.

Drug Abuse Policy Action Plans

On August 4, 1986, President Reagan announced "six major goals of what we hope will be the final stage in our national strategy to eradicate drug abuse" and "lead us toward a drug-free America." The goals included:

- Drug-Free Workplaces
- Drug-Free Schools
- Expanded Treatment
- Improved International Cooperation
- Strengthened Drug Law Enforcement
- Increase Public Awareness and Prevention

On August 5, 1986, the Domestic Policy Council established a Drug Use Prevention Working Group to develop action plans to meet the President's goals for demand reduction, i.e., drug-free work-places, drug-free schools, expanded treatment, and increased public awareness and prevention. The Working Group is to finalize its report to the Domestic Policy Council by September 5, 1986.

As Working Group Chairman, I am establishing five task forces to address the various objectives:

- 1. A Legislative Review Task Force to coordinate legislative proposals and ensure compliance with the President's policy and goals.
- 2. A Drug-Free Workplace Task Force to develop action plans for implementing a strict no-illegal-drug-use policy for the Federal workforce and for encouraging state and local governments and the private sector to follow the Federal lead.
- 3. A Drug-Free Schools Task Force to ensure that a policy of being drug free is adopted by every educational institution, from grade schools to universities.

- 4. A Treatment Task Force to develop an action plan for improved treatment for drug users and improved methods for identifying drug users, with the primary objective of determining how to provide effective treatment to drug users as early in their use cycle as possible.
- 5. A Private Sector Prevention Task Force to develop an action plan for expanding drug abuse prevention, with emphasis on community-based programs and initiatives. The Task Force should prepare recommendations for organizational and procedural changes within the Federal government to provide innovative direction to Federal efforts and to be creative and effective in encouraging and supporting private sector efforts.

It should be noted that communications are being coordinated by the White House Public Affairs Office as a separate activity. Input will be requested by the Drug Abuse Policy Office from the public affairs offices of the various agencies.

The objectives of the Working Group and its task forces will be to develop a series of actions items which contribute directly to the President's goals with a specific target of making illegal drug use unacceptable in every segment of our society.

The action items will be presented to the Working Group on Monday, August 18, 1986. At that time, the Working Group will decide which actions should be developed for inclusion in the report to the Domestic Policy Council.

You are reminded that all discussions and materials related to Working Group or task force activities are considered Presidential documents, subject to Executive Privilege, and cannot be shared with any person outside the Working Group.

September 2, 1986 - Working Group on Drug Policy reviews and comments on the draft options paper.

Working Group on Drug Policy reaches consensus on the recommendation to issue an executive order on a drug free Federal workplace.

Working Group on Drug Policy reaches consensus on the Draft Justice Department drug bill that follows the President's six goals.

Working Group on Drug Policy recommends that the Justice Department send the omnibus drug bill to OMB for expedited clearance.

Appropriate contact should be made as soon as possible with the Senate leadership to make sure that the elements of the administration's omnibus drug bill are included in any Senate legislation.

- September 3, 1986 Submit draft issue paper to the Attorney General for review.
- September 4, 1986 Circulate issue paper to DPC members in preparation for the DPC meeting on Monday September 8.
- September 8, 1986 DPC should approve the development and issuance of an Executive Order on drug use in the Federal workforce.

DPC should approve the submission of the Omnibus Drug bill compiled by the Justice Department to OMB For expedited clearance.

- September 14,1986 President and Mrs. Reagan speak to "The Heart of America" on drug abuse.
- September 16,1986 DPC meeting with President to approve comprehensive drug program.
- September 17,1986 Presidental statement announcing transmittal of Administration legislative package.


