Good evening. I'm delighted to have this opportunity to speak before the Washington Charity Dinner of 1984. By the way, I understand that among the many celebrities present tonight are two of my close friends, Charlton Heston and Bob Hope. Charlton, I can't help thinking that, although you may have played Moses, Bob Hope and I knew the man. But it's a pleasure to join you in honoring the Vice President and Barbara Bush.

George Bush, as Vice President you've served our Nation with unflagging vigor. You've presided over the Senate, travelled to 48 States and too many foreign countries to count, and you've given me the benefit of your judgment, insight, and friendship. George, I firmly believe you're the best Vice President America has ever had.

Barbara, just as George has done us all proud, you've carried out your role with dignity, determination, and charm. You've hosted countless events at the Vice President's House, taken your fight against illiteracy to 54 cities -- and even found time to edit the memoirs of a cocker spaniel named C. Fred Bush. can't think of a more timely reason for bestowing this award. That visit to El Salvador promoted our diplomatic objectives in the region and showed the world that America is firmly committed to peace, prosperity, and freedom for the people of Central America.

Some claim that the people of Central America face only two choices: right-wing dictatorship or Marxist revolution. George Bush challenged the people of El Salvador -- and of Central America -- to reject both those options and choose instead the path of democracy. The Salvadoran people accepted that challenge and, in a genuinely democratic vote, they elected Jose Napoleon Duarte to lead their country in freedom. By doing so, they acted courageously on their own behalf, and set an example for all Central America.

Yet if they are to succeed in their noble venture, the people of El Salvador, and the other free Central American nations, will need help. Our Administration is hard at work to extend that crucial assistance. We're providing military aid to keep the region from falling to Soviet- and Cuban-backed guerrillas. And, to help the fight against poverty, we're supplying vital economic assistance. Indeed, three out of four dollars of American aid to the region are in the form of economic aid.

Despite all we're doing at the Federal level, the support of private groups like the Washington Charity Dinner is crucial. Already, I understand, the Washington Charity Dinner has distributed more than \$1 million worth of food to refugee camps

throughout Central America. Your work is making life better for thousands, and you're proving that the American people care deeply about our neighbors to the South.

So many of you deserve special mention: the honorary co-chairmen, His Grace Archbishop Bernard Law, Bob Hope, Charlton Heston, and Pat Boone; this year's co-honorees, Dexter Yager, Hal Gooch, Pete Chelovich, and Dan O'Neill. Every person who helped make tonight's event a success has my heartfelt gratitude. But more important, you have the gratitude of the people of Central America. Let us pray that the liberty which has taken root in that region will flourish, and that God will grant all His people the peace and freedom for which they yearn.

Mike, Nancy and I wish we could be there to celebrate your "Assault on the Inside Passage." The boat race sounds like hard work and a genuine test of endurance, but since it was all in the name of a wonderful cause -- the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation -- it must have been exhilarating.

In his book, Alex: The Life of a Child, Frank Deford writes, "Many of us have convinced ourselves that children don't die any more, not in the latter half of the 20th century, not in the United States of America...." Well, the sad truth is that American children do still die -- and hundreds die every year from the ravages of cystic fibrosis. Alex Deford was one of those children. Your "Assault on Cystic Fibrosis," in honor of that brave little girl, will do much to end complacency about this terrible disease and promote research to combat it. I can't think of a memorial for Alex that would be more fitting.

Over the years, Nancy and I have taken personal interest in the fight against cystic fibrosis. Here in Washington last summer, Nancy served as honorary chairman of the First Annual Children's Ball for Cystic Fibrosis. The event raised more than \$100,000, and that money has been used to launch the Nancy Reagan Cystic Fibrosis Research Fund at the University of California at San Francisco. The Nancy Reagan Fund is part of the C.F. Foundation's new research development program -- the first privately-supported, nationwide network of centers where scientists can work exclusively to find the cause of cystic

fibrosis. Your boat race chairmen, Dave and Sue Hook, were present for the ribbon cutting, and I want you to know that Nancy and I are mighty proud to be a part of this exciting new project.

Just last fall, I received a letter from the C.F. Foundation about matching Federal funds with New York State funds for a heart-lung transplant in a patient with cystic fibrosis. We were able to put those funds together, and Rick Dinsbiers got that operation. Rick only lived 51 days, but his courageous struggle provided a research breakthrough. Since cystic fibrosis was never found in his new heart or lungs, Rick's case helped prove that the disease does not flow through the body.

Doctors tell us that, given enough money, a control for cystic fibrosis can be found in the next 3 to 5 years. And that's why the work of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation is so terribly important. Each of you has my heartfelt gratitude. But more important, you have the gratitude of the thousands you've been working so hard to help. Because of all you're doing, one day soon, children like Alex Deford will be able to defeat cystic fibrosis and lead full and happy lives.

Thank you, God bless you, and keep up the good work.



PRESIDENTIAL TAPING: 50th ANNIVERSARY DINNER OF THE FEDERAL
COMMUNICATIONS ACT OF 1934
THURSDAY, MAY 31, 1984

Representatives of the Congress, the Courts, the Commerce Department, the Federal Communications Commission, and distinguished ladies and gentlemen: Good evening. It's a pleasure to be with you, via modern electronic communication, to congratulate the Federal Communications Commission on its 50th Anniversary.

The Commission's founding in 1934 brought together under one roof the duties of the Federal Radio Commission and the telecommunications responsibilities of the Interstate Commerce Commission. This marriage of interests has served our country well through the 50 -- often rough, sometimes tumble -- years of the F.C.C.

Radio communication is nearly as old as this century. With the advent of ship-to-shore transmissions, it became clear that radio frequencies had to be protected from interference. The Navy first took on the job, and then the Department of Commerce licensed channels, trying to ensure that each operator stayed on his own frequency. As the commercial potential of this new medium became clear, broadcasters swamped the airwaves of our big cities. It was evident to all concerned that the time had come to get the situation organized.

By 1934 -- I was a sportscaster by then -- radio licensing was part of the Federal scheme. The new Federal Communications Commission reported 623 broadcast stations on the air that year.

Today there are over 9,400 radio stations and 1,400 T.V. stations throughout America.

The Commission has also grown. On that first day of the F.C.C., July 11, 1934, 233 employees reported for work. Today, over 1,900 professionals work for the F.C.C. The industries regulated by the Commission -- not only broadcasting and telecommunications, but mobile radio, satellites, and so many others -- are inseparably linked to our national vitality and the American way of life.

Change, of course, has been the one aspect of electronic communications that has remained constant. The business has been perpetually evolving, leaping forward with electronic discoveries, setting new ground rules for itself with every advancement. Today, for example, competition is seeping into every nook and cranny of the telephone business. Telephones in automobiles are becoming standard equipment. Paging devices and other wireless forms of communication permit us to keep in touch anywhere in the world. Fifty years ago, in the first summer of the F.C.C., this was the stuff of comic strip and science fiction writers, not regulators.

This jubilee year of the F.C.C. helps us recognize the importance of maintaining our freedom -- every American's most precious possession -- in light of the technological progress. If our liberty is to have meaning, it must keep pace with technology.

The electronic press informs, educates, enlightens, and entertains. Sometimes it even gets under our skin, but that's its job, too. In 1984, we will likely see the number of

television stations surpassing the number of daily newspapers in this country. Television and radio must be afforded the same Constitutional protection as other members of the press. Our current F.C.C. Chairman, Mark Fowler, has provided leadership and common sense in this effort.

I believe the F.C.C. has done a good job. It's an institution of integrity, often asked to do the seemingly impossible task of regulating rapidly expanding, and sometimes unruly technologies.

And it's performed well. We've seen the F.C.C. become everything you wanted from your Government . . . and less. We've learned that sometimes, the best we can do in Washington is to get out of the way of the innovators and entrepreneurs. Mark Fowler and his colleagues can be proud of the job they are doing. The F.C.C. is there when it's needed -- as a cop on-the-beat, keeping the airwaves free and clear. But it's not standing as a roadblock to those who would enter the highways of service to the American people.

So, congratulations to all of you who work with and for the Federal Communications Commission, especially to the pioneers present tonight. When the F.C.C. opened its doors for business some 50 years ago, few dreamt that it would usher our country into the communications revolution of the last half century. I salute a great agency and its leadership for making good on a 50-year-old promise of service to the American people. Here's to your next 50.
