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

Ronald Reagan Speaks Out

Thomas Jefferson— A Birthday Tribute

April 15 is the day you and I are forcefully reminded that Uncle Sam and his relatives in the State Capitol are digging deeper into our pockets than ever before. Ironically, this event comes just two days after the 235th birthday of an American patriot who warned his fellow citizens ceaselessly of the dangers of centralized power.

Thomas Jefferson's birthday doesn't get much attention these days. Yet he, perhaps more than any other American of any age, gave voice to the principles which formed the American creed. "We hold these Truths to be self-evident," wrote the 34-year-old Virginian in the Declaration of Independence, "that all Men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights, that among these rights are Life, Liberty and the Pursuit of Happiness. . . "

In his Inaugural address as President 25 years later, Jefferson defined a sound policy for government's relation to our economic system. "A wise and frugal government," he said, "shall restrain men from injuring one another, shall leave them otherwise free to regulate their own pursuits of industry and

improvement, and shall not take from the mouth of Labor the bread it has earned."

Jefferson never ceased to warn his fellow Americans about centralized power. He asked, "What has destroyed liberty and the rights of man in every government that has ever existed under the sun?" And answered, "The generalizing and concentrating all cares and powers into one body."

Champion Of Freedom

Jefferson dreamed of an America of yeoman farmers and small communities, where property ownership and basic education were widely distributed among the people. He was almost fanatically devoted to the cause of sound money which retained its value. He was an unwavering champion of freedom; not only freedom to make one's way unhampered by government, but also the essential freedoms of speech, of press, of assembly, of worship.

His advice to his young nephew on the subject of character is worth chiseling in stone for the benefit of those in public life today: "Nothing is so mistaken," said he, "as is the supposition that a person is to extricate himself from a difficulty by intrigue, by chicanery, by dissimulation, by trimming, by an untruth, by an injustice."

Perhaps the finest tribute ever

uttered to our third president was that of Senator John W. Daniel of Virginia in 1908. "There is not a heart that loves humanity and thrills with noble rage for right and truth and justice," said Sen. Daniel; "there is not a people on earth who are weary and heavy laden under the burden of oppression; there is not a chancellor who loves equity; there is not a devotee who bows his head in free worship to his Maker: there is not an ingenuous student by the midnight lamp; there is not a toiler by land or sea; yea, there is not an astronomer who reads the stars, nor a humble farmer in his cabin, nor a freeman anywhere who treads the earth with the spirit of the free who does not

bless God that Thomas Jefferson lived, and that his life goes marching on.

"If it is right that man sues for, and if he does not believe that one man is born bridled and saddled, and the other booted and spurred, let him pluck a flower from this good man's life and wear it in his soul forever."


Yes, Thomas Jefferson has gone on to that corner of heaven reserved for those who fought for Liberty and the Rights of Man. But we Americans, his spiritual descendants, would do well to follow John Daniel's advice: Pluck a flower from Thomas Jefferson's life, and wear it in our soul forever.

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. ROBERT C. MCFARLANE THE WHITE HOUSE

SUBJECT: WREATH-LAYINGS AT ARLINGTON NATIONAL CEMETERY BY VISITING HEADS OF STATE (1976 - 1985)

According to records maintained by the Office of Protocol of the Department of State and by the Office of the Historian at Arlington National Cemetery, 58 heads of State or Chiefs of Government have laid wreaths at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier during the past nine years.

That number includes a significant representation from our former World War II enemies -- Germany, Japan and Italy. The chart below provides statistics in support of this assertion.



In tribute to our Nation's honored dead, the Confederate Memorial Committee's wreath will be placed at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier by Chairman Thomas Warner Smith. All are invited to attend this concluding portion of this afternoon of tribute and remembrance.

Memorial Services were first conducted by the United Confederate Veterans on the Sunday nearest to Jefferson Davis' Birthday, the 3rd of June. When the veterans were no longer able to continue, due to age and infirmities and the death of many of their members, the ceremony at Arlington was turned over to Camp. No. 305, Sons of Confederate Veterans.

That camp continued the services for some years and then proposed the formation of an independent committee with members from various Confederate patriotic organizations in the Washington area. The committee was formed and entitled the "Confederate Memorial Committee," and was given the one specific duty of conducting the annual memorial services at Arlington National Cemetary on the first Sunday in June.

From that time on the Confederate Memorial Committee has arranged and held these services, and invited all Confederate and, at times, other patriotic organizations in the vicinity to participate.



At Tab A is a request from Secretary Hodel for permission to place the President's name on a wreath. The wreath will be presented tomorrow at the dedication of a war memorial on Attu Island, in the Aleutians. On the Japanese side, wreaths will be presented from the Emperor and Prime Minister Nakasone.

Subject: Presentation of Presidential Wreath at Dedication of War Memorial on Attu Island

With the approval of the U.S. Department of the Interior and the U.S. Department of State, the Government of Japan is constructing a war memorial on Attu Island, Alaska, to the "memory of all those who sacrificed their lives in the islands and seas of the north Pacific during World War II and in dedication of world peace." The memorial is being built at the expense of the Government of Japan and will be maintained on a costreimbursable basis by the Department of the Interior's Fish and Wildlife Service. The Service manages Attu Island as part of the Aleutian National Wildlife Refuge.

The memorial will be dedicated on June 30, 1987. The Japanese Consul General in Anchorage, acting for his government, will present a wreath on behalf of the Emperor and a wreath on behalf of Prime Minister Nakasone. A wreath is being provided for presentation by the Regional Director of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, who will be the senior Federal official present.

Permission is requested to have the third wreath presented on behalf of President Reagan.

Military Order of the Loyal Legion of the United States

My dear Mrs. Conroy:

I was very impressed with your article on the subject of Robert E. Lee which was published in the POST in connection with the celebration of his birthday. I attended the ceremony at the Capitol as a Past President of the Aztec Club of 1847 (Military Society of the Mexican War) which grew out of the officers' club in Mexico City of which General Lee (then Captain) was a member, along with two of my great grandfathers. So many of the junior officers, especially regulars, in the Mexican War became general officers on both sides of the Civil War.

The Loyal Legion was founded by a group on Union Army officers on the day of Lincoln's death, April 15, 1865. Fearing there would be chaos, they dewlared they would uphold the ideals of Lincoln - they would be his Loyal Legion. They served in the military escort on the funeral train to Springfield.

In 1922, President Harding, knowing the history of the Loyal Legion, asked them to arrange a suitable ceremony for the dedication of the new Lincoln Memorial. This was done and thanks to Major (later Lt.Gen.) Clayton Barney Vogel, WHO WAS Commandant of the Marine Barracks in Washington and who gave full logistic support, the deed was done. Vogel was a Companion of the Loyal Legion and later its Commander-in-Chief.

The Loyal Legion decided to continue this ceremony and commencing in 1923, has held the ceremony at the Memorial on February every February 12 regardless of the day of the week or the condition of the weather. Every President except Messrs. Kennedy and Carter, have attended and there has always been a Presidential Wreath laid. There is enclosed a copy of the draft program for this year. You will note that I will be the Master of Ceremonies; about the 17th time in the past 30 years.

It is very appropriate to have Deputy Secretary of Defense William Howard Taft IV take part in this program since it was his great grandfather who was Chairman of the Commission appointed in 1911 for the construction of a memorial to President Lincoln. Ex-President Taft attended the dedication not in his capacity as Chief Justice but as Chairman of that Commission to turn over to President Harding, the building. Enclosed are copies of photos taken at the time. I attended as a small boy with my grandmother and the thing that

impressed me most were the array of huge horns around the top of the building. It was the first time such a large electronic public address system had ever been used. Public radio broadcasting soon followed. That day, May 30, 1922, was the last public appearance of Robert Todd Lincoln.

We have always had a difficult time, especially in the past 20 years, of promoting one of the greatest Presidents this country ever had; the great emancipator, and leader who preserved the Union. His assasination was the worst thning to ever affect the South. He was the only man who could have kept the ''Radical Republicans'' powerless and thus prevent that terrible period of the carpert baggers which we call ''Reconstruction''. Lincoln and Lee together could have succeeded in ''binding up the wounds''.

The mass media fails to take any interest in patriotic events, especially in advance of the event. Unless there is something negative or sensational, they have no interest whatever. How many Washingtonians associate the Lincoln Memorial with Martin Luther King's great speech and later demonstrations, rather than with Abraham Lincoln? How many even know his date of birth? Often we have been asked why there were not more spectators at our ceremonies even when a President attends. The answer is that it has been impossible to get any advance publicity. I have had TV editors tell me it is not news until it happens; that King's birthday has a political angle but Lincoln's does not.

What can we do? Could you use your influence with the Washington Post or others to publish, for example, between February 6th and 10th, some notice of this ceremony to take place on the morning of the 12th and, perhaps, some background on it?
