Dear Horst:

Thank you for your message of 27 November. I agree that Friday should be a successful meeting. I appreciate your flexibility in agreeing to launch an effort to improve conventional defense at the December DPC, a topic we both agree is important and worthy of special attention.

We understand European interest in US-Soviet relations, especially as they pertain to possible arms reductions. We do not believe, however, that it is useful to make any statements which imply that consultations have been unsatisfactory among Allies. The record of the US Government in consulting with Allies and existing bodies to keep them informed speaks for itself.

Although many of your proposed changes are acceptable, we are disappointed with some of the suggested modifications.

We can agree to the title "Commitment to Peace." We agree to your addition "...and to the other pertinent multilateral and bilateral documents" in para 4. We agree to your addition "...and will continue to do so" in para 8.

As you might suspect, we are most disappointed by your alternate language concerning resources for defense. Considering the magnitude of the threat, we simply do not see how we can make the necessary improvements without paying the price, no matter how efficiently we operate. We are, however, prepared to accept the language "The President and the Chancellor, therefore, agreed on the need, in concert with other Allies, for a coherent short and long-term Alliance approach to enhancing NATO's conventional capabilities, and are determined to exert special efforts to make the necessary resources available." We cannot, however, accept the following sentence you propose, which implies that the Federal Republic of Germany has already done all that is necessary in its long-term decision. As we have often said, we all need to do more. We, therefore, propose to delete that sentence.

We also note that a sentence in the next paragraph "In particular, he welcomed the Federal Government's recent decision toward sustaining the Bundeswehr's force structure" has been deleted in your text. We would like to see it reinstated.

In the following paragraph, the sentence "Underscoring the basic policy of the North Atlantic Alliance, the President and the Chancellor reaffirm that deterrence and defense, together with arms control and disarmament." has now been changed to read "...arms control and disarmament, as well as deterrence and defense..." The North Atlantic Alliance is foremost a defense alliance. We do not believe that arms control takes precedence over defense, some failure to provide an adequate deterrent forecloses the prospect of effective and equitable arms reduction. We would wish the order restored to the text that we agreed to in Washington.

We accept your language on MBFR. We can agree to your change to "they express their determination to work for progress" on a verifiable, comprehensive global ban on chemical weapons at Geneva.

We can accept your formulation on the signifiance of the new phase of US-Soviet relations involving the Shultz-Gromyko meeting in Geneva.

In the context of the other statements on arms talks and consultation contained in the statement, we believe the language you suggest has some long-term risk. We can accept the following: "In particular, the President and the Chancellor stress the importance of close consultations amongst the Allies on arms control matters."

We do agree on the desirability of finishing work on the text before Friday, especially if you wish to provide an embargoed text to German journalists. Thus, I look forward to a quick reply. We have asked Ambassador Abshire at NATO to contact Ambassador Wieck, as well as his British and Italian colleagues, in order to begin to lay the groundwork for action required next month at the DPC and NAC.

DEAR BUD.

THANK YOU VERY MUCH FOR YOUR LETTER OF 24 NOVEMBER 1984. I AM PLEASED TO STATE THAT WE HAVE THE SAME IDEAS ABOUT THE FUTURE ACTION FOR OUR PROJECT.

HOWEVER. ALLOW ME FIRST OF ALL TO THANK YOU CORDIALLY ONCE MORE FOR THE SUCCESSFUL TALKS WE HAD IN WASHINGTON AND FOR THE HOSPITA-LITY EXTENDED TO US THERE. THANKS TO THESE GOOD TALKS, THE MAIN FOUNDATION HAS BEEN LAID FOR A PROMISING VISIT BY THE CHANCELLOR THIS WEEK.

THE FEDERAL CHANCELLOR CONTINUES TO FAVOUR THE IDEA THAT HE AND THE PRESIDENT SHOULD ISSUE A JOINT DECLARATION WHICH HE SUGGESTS

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MIGHT BE LABELLED COMMITMENT TO PEACE. HE BELIEVES THAT THE TEXT ELABORATED BY US WILL AFFORD A GOOD BASIS FOR THE TALKS WITH PRESIDENT REAGAN ON 30 NOVEMBER 1984 AND - SUBJECT TO SOME MINOR CHANGES - HAS A GOOD CHANCE OF BEING ACCEPTED BY THE TWO HEADS OF GOVERNMENTS. THESE CHANGES TO WHICH THE FEDERAL CHANCELLOR ATTACHES IMPORTANCE ARE MADE CONSPICUOUS IN THE ANNEX TO THIS LETTER BY SPACING THE WORDS OF THE DECLARATION.

I PERSONALLY START FROM THE ASSUMPTION TOO, THAT THESE CHANGES DO NOT REALLY TOUCH THE SUBSTANCE OF OUR PRELIMINARY AGREEMENT AND SHOULD BE ACCEPTABLE TO YOUR SIDE.

AS REGARDS THE SUBSEQUENT PROCEDURE, WE ARE PREPARED TO ACCEPT YOUR PROPOSAL TO PROCEED IN TWO STAGES. THE FIRST STEP SHOULD BE TO REFER TO A LONG-TERM APPROACH BY THE ALLIANCE TO STRENGTHEN THE CONVENTIONAL DEFENCE CAPABILITY WITH A VIEW TO RAISING THE NUCLEAR THRESHOLD, TO BE ISSUED AT THE MEETING OF DEFENCE MINISTERS AS PART OF THE DPC COMMUNIQUE ON 4/5 DECEMBER 1984. THE FOREIGN MINISTERS SHOULD THEN FOLLOW THIS UP AND INCLUDE IN THE NAC COMMUNIQUE A BROAD STATEMENT ON THE ALLIANCES APPROACH TO EAST-WEST-RELATIONS AND ARMS CONTROL ALONG WITH A RENEWED PLEDGE TO CLOSE AND INTENSIFIED ALLIANCE CONSULTATIONS ON ALL THESE ISSUES.

THE FEDERAL CHANCELLOR HAS ALREADY INFORMED PRESIDENT MITTERRAND AND PRIME MINISTER CRAXI ON THE BROAD LINES OF OUR JOINT ACTION. HE WILL HAVE A TELEPHONE CONVERSATION WITH MRS. THATCHER TO THIS END TO-MORROW.

IS HAS BECOME APPARENT TIME AND AGAIN THAT THE EUROPEANS ARE WAT-CHING THE DEVELOPMENT OF AMERICAN-SOVIET RELATIONS WITH GREAT EX-PECTATIONS AND THAT THEY ARE HIGHLY INTERESTED IN HAVING A PART IN THIS PROCESS.

I AM CONVINCED THAT THE CHANCELLORS VISIT TO WASHINGTON ON THIS BASIS WILL BE A SUCCESS FOR BOTH OF OUR COUNTRIES AND THE ALLIANCE AND THAT THE PRESIDENT CAN THEN BE CERTAIN OF EVEN WIDER SUPPORT

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BY THE EUROPEANS.

-- DRAFT JOINT STATEMENT --

THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES AND THE CHANCELLOR OF THE FEDERAL REPUBLIC OF GERMANY MET, AT THE PRESIDENTS INVITATION, ON NOVEMBER 30, 1984, TO CONTINUE THEIR REGULAR EXCHANGES ON MATTERS OF COMMON INTEREST. SECRETARY SHULTZ, SECRETARY WEINBERGER, AND FOREIGN MINISTER GENSCHER TOOK PART IN THE TALKS.

THE PRESIDENT AND THE CHANCELLOR STRESSED THE EXTRAORDINARY IMPORTANCE OF ESTABLISHING A MORE LASTING BASIS FOR PEACE IN EUROPE AND THROUGHOUT THE WORLD. NOTING THE ROLE OF NATO IN PROVIDING PEACE AND SECURITY FOR EUROPE AND NORTH AMERICA IN THE MORE THAN THIRTYFIVE YEARS SINCE ITS FOUNDING, THE PRESIDENT AND THE CHANCELLOR ARE REASSURED BY THE CLEAR DETERMINATION WHICH NATO HAS SHOWN TO SAFEGUARD ITS SECURITY AND ASSERT ITS UNITY.

PRESIDENT REAGAN AND CHANCELLOR KOHL EMPHASIZED THAT THE CLOSE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN THE UNITED STATES AND THE FEDERAL REPUBLIC OF GERMANY IS FUNDAMENTAL TO THE MAINTENANCE OF PEACE, AND THAT CONTINUING COOPERATION IS ESSENTIAL TO MAINTAINING THE COMMON DEFENSE.

AS DEMOCRACIES AFTIVE IN THE CSCE PROCESS, OUR COOPERATION CAN BE ESPECIALLY SUCCESSFUL IN DEMONSTRATING THE HUMAN AS WELL AS POLITICAL ASPECTS OF THE SEARCH FOR PEACE. COMMITTED TO THE HELSINKI FINAL ACT, AND TO THE OTHER PERTINENT MULTIL ATERAL AND BILATERAL DOCUMENTS, WE DO NOT ACCEPT THE DIVISION OF EUROPE AS PERMANENT AND SHALL WORK TO LOWER THE HUMAN COSTS OF THE TRAGIC BARRIER WHICH DIVIDES THE

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CONTINENT, AND IN PARTICULAR, THE GERMAN PEOPLE.

THE PRESIDENT AND THE CHANCELLOR REAFFIRM THE IMPORTANCE OF CONTIN-UING A BALANCED APPROACH TO EAST-WEST RELATIONS, AS SET OUT IN THE HARMEL REPORT, ENSURING THE MAINTENANCE OF NECESSARY MILITARY STRENGTH AND TRANSATLANTIC POLITICAL SOLIDARTIY WHILE PURSUING A PRODUCTIVE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN THE COUNTRIES OF EAST AND WEST THROUGH DIALOGUE, COOPERATION, AND NEGOTIATION.

SUCH DIALOGUE MUST BE BUILT ON THE RECOGNITION OF MUTUAL, LEGITI-MATE SECURITY INTERESTS AND BE CONDUCTED ON THE BASIS OF EQUAL RIGHTS FOR ALL PARTIES INVOLVED. STABLE RELATIONS MUST BE CHARACTERIZED BY THE RENUNCIATION OF MILITARY FORCE LEVELS BEYOND LEGITIMATE DEFENSE NEEDS AND MUST BE FOUNDED ON STRICT OBSERVANCE OF THE BAN ON THE THREAT OR USE OF FORCE, AS ENSHRINED IN THE UNITED NATIONS CHARTER.

THE CHANCELLOR ENDORSES THE PRESIDENTS CONTINUED READINESS TO MEET WITH THE SOVIET GENERAL SECRETARY AT A CAREFULLY PREPARED MEETING. THE CHANCELLOR ALSO SUPPORTS THE US PROPOSAL TO HOLD REGULAR, HIGH-LEVEL TALKS AND MEETINGS WHICH WOULD DEMONSTRATE THE WILL OF BOTH SIDES TO COOPERATE ON QUESTIONS OF PEACE, SECURITY AND INTERNATIONAL STABILITY. FOR ITS PART THE FEDERAL REPUBLIC OF GERMANY WILL CONTINUE ITS DIALOGUE AND COOPERATION WITH THE SOVIET UNION AND WITH ALL THE COUNTRIES OF CENTRAL AND EASTERN EUROPE. THEY URGE THE SOVIET UNION TO JOIN IN A HEIGHTENED EFFORT TO IMPROVE EAST-WEST RELATIONS, GIVE FRESH IMPETUS TO ARMS CONTROL, AND FASHION A CONSTRUCTIVE AND STABLE RELATIONSHIP AT THE LOWEST POSSIBLE LEVEL OF ARMAMENT.

THE PRESIDENT AND THE CHANCELLOR STRESSED THAT THE ALLIANCES EXISTING STRATEGY OF FORWARD DEFENSE AND FLEXIBLE RESPONSE HAS FOR MANY YEARS PLAYED AN INDISPENSABLE ROLE IN PRESERVING PEACE IN EUROPE, AND WILL CONTINUE TO DOSO. THE GOAL OF THIS DEFENSIVE STRATEGY IS AND WILL REMAIN TO PREVENT ANY WAR. THE PRESIDENT AND THE CHANCELLOR REAFFIRMED THE PRINCIPLE SUBSCRI-



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BED TO BY ALL NATO MEMBERS THAT NONE OF THEIR WEAPONS WILL EVER BE USED, EXCEPT IN RESPONSE TO ATTACK.

THEY ARE AGREED THAT ALL REQUISITE STEPS MUST BE TAKEN TO MAINTAIN THE EFFECTIVENESS OF THE ALLIANCES MILITARY STRATEGY AND ENSURE

CONTINUED DETERRENCE. THE EXPANSION AND MODERNIZATION OF SOVIET AND WARSAW PACT NUCLEAR AND CONVENTIONAL FORCES HAS INTENSIFIED THE NEED TO STRENGTHEN THE ALLIANCES FORCE POSTURE.

THE UNITED STATES AND THE FEDERAL REPUBLIC OF GERMANY REGRET THAT IN CONSTRAST TO NATOS AGREED REDUCTIONS, STARTING IN 1980, OF 2400 NUCLEAR WARHEADS THE SOVIETS HAVE CONTINUED TO BUILD UP THEIR NUCLEAR FORCES, WHILE ABANDONING THE BILATERAL GENEVA ARMS CONTROL NEGOTIATIONS. THE UNITED STATES AND THE FEDERAL REPUBLIC OF GERMANY SEE ITS AS IMPERATIVE, BOTH FOR EVENTUAL SUCCESS IN ARMS CONTROL NEGOTIATIONS AND FOR THE ALLIANCES SECURITY, THAT, IN THE ABSENCE OF CONCRETE RESULTS IN THE NEGOTIATIONS, NATO DEPLOYMENTS PROCEED AS ENVISAGED UNDER THE 1979 DECISION. NATO HAS STATED THAT IT REMAINS READY TO HALT, MODIFY, OR REVERSE DEPLOYMENTS - INCLUDING THE REMOVAL AND DISMANTLING OF MISSILES ALREADY DEPLOYED IN EUROPE - IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE TERMS OF A BALANCED AND VERIFIABLE AGREEMENT.

THE PRESIDENT AND THE CHANCELLOR CONSIDER IT ESSENTIAL TO HALT AND REPORT AND THE WARSAW PACT. THEREFORE, AN IMPROVED CONVENTIONAL DEFENSE POSTURE WOULD HELP ENSURE THAT THE ALLIANCES CAPACITY TO ACT IS FULLY PRE
