Secretary Weinberger has forwarded a memo (Tab A) in response to your memo (Tab B) asking that Defense examine the cost and feasibility of relocating U.S. activities from Hellenikon Air Base (near Athens). The activities could be moved, but the cost would be at least \$180 million. The Defense memo suggests we not offer relocation from Hellenikon at this time. However, Secretary Weinberger has hand-written a note that says he is willing to offer relocation if it is desirable.

Given the status of negotiations, it does not seem appropriate to offer relocation from Hellenikon. Our negotiator, Reggie Bartholomew, will be briefing the JCS on Friday, June 24. Hellenikon has been a lightening rod for our presence in Greece, but relocation has not been a major factor in the negotiations.

We are currently reviewing our position in response to an unacceptable Greek view on "duration." The Greeks insist on positive action to continue the bases after five years; the U.S. insists on positive action to terminate the agreement. When the negotiations broke down last week over duration, the Greeks tabled an entire new draft agreement which reopened many other issues.

State is considering options for next steps on the agreement as well as working through Ambassador Stearns with Karamanlis. No one is recommending giving in to Greek demands on duration. State has been considering a memo to the President apprising him of the serious obstacles and the possibility of not reaching an agreement. This has serious military ramifications as well as possible domestic political impact on the Greek-American community. The Greek media has blamed Papandreou for the lack of agreement. There has not been major media focus on the issue in the U.S. to date.

- This is in reply to your May 16 memorandum requesting that we examine the cost and feasibility of relocating our activities from Hellenikon.
- (S) The Joint Chiefs have examined the issue and have concluded that it would be technically feasible to relocate our activities to other sites in Greece, but the cost would be at least \$180 million.
- (S) In view of the high costs involved and the Greek propensity to pocket our offers and concessions without satisfactory reciprocation, I suggest we not offer relocation from Hellenikon as a negotiating card at this time.

Follow Up on Derwinski Meeting

Sorry if my talking points on the Derwinski meeting were too strident. I guess my juices are still flowing after the encounter with Karekin II.

On substance, I think a case can be made on behalf of a more active approach to the Aegean. The question is when and how. We need to avoid creating a benchmark that is impossible to satisfy. Moreover, as I tried to imply in the talkers, if we don't soon prove to the Turks that we can perform on FMS this year--after many promises--we will lack the bargaining power to encourage them to make diplomatic concessions once the time is right.

I will be talking later this week to Admiral Crowe (formerly CINCSOUTH). Crowe has imaginative thoughts on repairing ties between Greece and Turkey. I plan to sound him out on the approach I discussed earlier with you and Bud. I've also talked to State about having the Secretary lay down some markers of U.S. seriousness when he meets privately with the Greeks, Turks and Cypriots at the U.N. in the fall. This isn't the visible diplomacy Ed seeks, but it is the first step to understanding whether a more visible approach would work. My own sense is we have only one chance, and we need to get our act together.

The key to keeping Ed from pushing a direct role for himself is to let him know we take the problem seriously. endeavor to keep him current on some of my soundings and try to assure him he has input. If you concur, I will also encourage Ed to take a more active role in reminding our friends on the Hill that the new FMS level for Greece is part of a package deal in which Turkish money must also be protected. I remain as convinced as ever, however, that we need to be very careful in selecting an intermediary who will have credibility on both sides.

BIOGRAPHY - George Papoulias

Greece

George Papoulias, currently Greece's Ambassador to Turkey, has had a long career in diplomacy. He has served in a variety of posts in the Greek Foreign Ministry, Europe, and the United States.

Papoulias was born in 1927 in Psari, Arcadia (Peloponnesus). He graduated from the Athens Higher School of Economic and Political Science and the Law School of Athens University. 1955, he joined the Greek foreign service, and held positions in New Delhi, Bonn and Geneva. He returned to Athens in 1969 to serve as political advisor to the Minister of Northern Greece. From 1971-75, he was assigned to the Greek Embassy in Paris, serving concurrently as ad interim Permanent Representative to UNESCO. During this period, it is reported that Papoulias maintained contact with Constantine Karamanlis, now President of Greece, who at the time was living in Paris in self-imposed exile. When Karamanlis returned to Greece and became Prime Minister in 1974, he was responsible for having Papoulias sent to New York as Permanent Representative to the United Nations. He served there until 1979, when he became Ambassador to Turkey.

Papoulias has the reputation of being an excellent and respected professional diplomat. A senior U.S. diplomat rates him as adroit, dispassionate, and a man of his word. A high-level Greek Foreign Ministry official closely identified with Prime Minister Papandreou's Pan-Hellenic Socialist Movement (PASOK) said he considers Papoulias to be an accomplished and reliable diplomat even though he is from the "opposite camp". Papoulias professes to be a conservative in politics.

Papoulias is married, and according to diplomats who have come in contact with him, is an excellent conversationalist, has a good sense of humor, and makes friends easily. He speaks fluent English, French, and German, and has some knowledge of Italian.

A thorough search of U.S. Government sources reveals no grounds for objection.




Background: There are currently 273 U.S. Army personnel ashore on Grenada. An additional 97 U.S. Coast Guard personnel are patrolling offshore. These forces are scheduled to remain until the situation stabilizes and the Grenadian constabulary can be re-established. Law and order is currently being maintained by the U.S. along with the members of the Caribbean Peace Force, which comprise an additional 448 man force. The Jamaican contingent of 257 provides the principle manpower. Although there is some local opposition to the Jamaican involvement, the CPF would effectively cease to exist if the Jamaicans withdrew.

Progress has been slow in reconstituting the government. The Governor General (Scoon) has taken a detached perspective and does not share our sense of urgency. Problems also exist in the establishment of a proper constabulary and we are working with the Governor General to have him solicit additional support from the Commonwealth Nations. Prison discipline has, however, improved since the British provided a prison director. The remaining 34 detainees are now subjected to more rigorous control and have less opportunity to formant political activities.

We have experienced some difficulty in ensuring that medical support on the island remains at or above the level provided by the Cubans. AID has been reluctant to raise medical standards above the "Caribbean norm." We are concerned that Grenada, under a U.S. sponsored democracy, should provide at least comparable medical support to that which existed under the Cubans.
