SUBJECT: D-Day and other celebrations

Secretary Marsh arrived late at his meeting described on the attachment. General Grange said the only problem for Washington is to determine various guest lists. He said the White House has laid down parameters on who could go to the Normandy celebration but he did not elaborate. He said the Congressional delegation for Normandy is estimated at 30 members plus wives, and will be limited to one military plane load since the White House requires such extensive airlift. He said the French are assigning 3,000 gendarmes to assist in protection of the seven chiefs of state who are expected.

Captain Coupe said there is a problem at Paris where the Embassy has indicated to the DAO that it does not have resources to assist in the handling of VIPs sponsored by the Pentagon. As a consequence the Army may pull into active duty certain reservists now living in France, and may utilize the services of some volunteer National Guard members to help handle the VIPs and to beef up the Paris DAO staff during the June period.

Guests lists for events in both Italy and France, it was reported, have been passed to the respective national authorities.

Secretary Marsh said that he was concerned about getting a determination on high-level participation from here, such as the Secretary of State and Secretary of Defense. He said that there is a UK invitation in to Secretary Weinberger and steps should be taken to assure the French also invite him.

When called upon, I said that we must bear in mind that the embassy at Paris is under heavy pressure from the White House staff in connection with the Presidential visit to Normandy.

My impression is that the Pentagon may be encouraging too many persons to go to Normandy in June, not only those who will be officially supported, but all the various reservist groups. Secretary Marsh is taking a very upbeat approach and looks upon the celebration as the forerunner of a whole series of events emphasizing our European alliance, leading up to the anniversary of the Washington treaty in 1989.
