

Greetings to all of you gathered today commemorating the 43rd anniversary of D-Day. President Roosevelt said December 7th will live as a day of infamy. And so it is remembered, yet June 6th, in contrast, lives on as a day of triumph. I think we can be grateful to those members of the Chapel of Four Chaplains and other veterans groups for the tremendous effort behind today's services. You are taking care that the significance of this day is not lost.

I know that for many of you this day has special meaning. You participated in the historic battle that took place on the Normandy coast four decades ago. Your fellow citizens, even now, stand in awe of you. The service you rendered to the cause of freedom at that pivotal moment is not forgotten -- it is etched deeply into the hearts of all your fellow countrymen and applauded by those in Europe who you helped liberate from the oppressor's boot.
