'How Are Things in America, Buddy?'

Past National Commander Frank J. Randazzo served as the official DAV representative at the June 6th ceremonies commemorating the 40th anniversary of D-Day on Omaha Beach. Randazzo participated in the Normandy Invasion as a member of the 5th Infantry Division of General Patton's Third Army. Following are some of his thoughts about the ceremony, as well as some of his recollections of that memorable date 40 years ago.

It was one of the proudest moments of my life, an experience of a lifetime. It ranks second in importance only to the day I was elected national commander of the Disabled American Veterans.

One of my first thoughts went back to the day we were pulling out of New York harbor on a transport ship headed for Europe. We were all on topside, going by the Statue of Liberty. My buddy, Paul Rheinhardt, who had gone through basic with me, said: "Frank, I'll never see that again."

I told him I didn't want to hear any of that kind of talk. But, he said it with so much conviction, I knew he must have had some sort of premonition of what was going to happen.

On our very first assault, his foxhole got a direct hit. The poor guy. He never had a chance to fire his weapon.

On this trip to commemorate the 40th anniversary of D-Day, we traveled by train from Paris to Lison, a 3-hour trip, then by bus to the Omaha Beach area. While on this 45-minute bus ride, I noticed that the countryside was about the same as when we

were there before. I could still see the foxholes we'd dug, and the many hedgerows, which represented danger to us at that time. The retreating German soldiers used these for cover to launch counterattacks against us.

When we arrived at Normandy, the people went all out to welcome us. They had decorated their homes with American flags and with red, white, and blue signs, "Welcome Home, Americans."

A 3-year-old child waving an American flag brought back memories of a wartime incident I'll never forget. It was a day in which we were to make an assault. We assembled about six o'clock in the morning, and were issued one K ration each. We were told to make it last all day, as we probably wouldn't be eating again until night. The ration contained one can of meat and a packet of bullion powder.

I dumped the meat and bullion powder together in my mess cup and began heating it. I noticed a small girl watching me. I knew she was hungry, but so was 1. I turned my back to her so I wouldn't have to see her face, but each way I turned she seemed to be in my line of vision.

My buddies said, "Frank, you better not give that food to that girl. You'll need it for strength for the attack."

I told them not to worry. I wasn't going to give away my food. Just then I saw a tear roll down the girl's cheek. I put the little girl on my lap, and talked to her. I ended up giving it all to her.

But, the good Lord was feeding me all the time. When it was all over, I wasn't a bit hungry. I just thank God that we in America have never been attacked by war as people in other parts of the world, such as in the Normandy area.

There are nearly 10,000 graves at the Normandy American Cemetery near Omaha Beach. Like most veterans, I always get a somber feeling when I visit a national cemetery in this country. But, when you see the one at Omaha Beach, it gives you a different perspective entirely. These are fellows who had a one-way ticket.

Depending on whose ox is gored

Washington — The proverbs teach us that "beauty lies in the eye of the beholder," and in another phrase, that "it makes a difference whose ox is gored." In the reaction of the liberal media to last week's Republican convention, we have seen those adages affirmed. Some of my friends think the Republicans were just too, too beastly to Walter Mondale and the Democratic Party.

This was the reaction, for example, of CBS Morning News, which felt that the GOP had been intolerably "harsh" on the opposition. CBS thus invited three Democrats to cry over their wounds on he morning after the convention ended. his was also the reaction of David oder of the Washington Post, who voted a column to a long recital of the an things the Republicans had said

about Walter Mondale. The Republicans, said Broder, used a good deal of their prime time "for a public trashing of the Democratic nominee." He thought it overkill.

Mercy me! Where was my brother Broder when the lights came on at San Francisco? Let us recollect, if you please, a few of the things the Democrats so recently said about Ronald Reagan.

WHO IS Mr. Reagan? He is a man whose policies "divide the nation into the lucky and the left-out, into the royalty and the rabble." He intended to pay for his economic recovery with bankruptcies, unemployment, more homeless, more hungry, and the largest debt known to humankind. He won his election "under false pretenses, with smoke and mirrors and illusions."

What did the Democrats say of Mr. Reagan's foreign policies? His policies are "a moral disgrace." He sent our sons to die without cause in Lebanon. He proposes "to turn the heavens into a battleground." He is responsible for accelerating the arms race. Under his administration, "we give money to Latin American governments that murder nuns, and then we lie about it."

Who are Mr. Reagan's friends? His friends are "the rich." "He gave each of his rich friends enough tax relief to buy a Rolls-Royce — and then he asked your family to pay for the hubcaps." In a second term, Mr. Reagan would raise taxes, but he wouldn't raise them fairly. "He will sock it to the average income families again, and leave his rich friends alone."

WHAT HAS Mr. Reagan done to the

environment? "He and his gang of greedy polluters can no longer piously sing America the Beautiful while they scar her face, poison her air and corrupt her waters." Should Mr. Reagan have four more years "to sell off our environment to the highest bidder?"

What has Mr. Reagan done to the old folks? He has "scared our senior citizens." He has "savaged" Social Security. His frontier mentality favors leaving some of the old, the young and the weak to die beside the wagon trail. He is indifferent to elderly people "who tremble in the basements of their homes."

"President Reagan says the nation is in recovery ... The big corporations and rich individuals are recovering ... The administration has made life miserable for the poor. Its attitude has been contemptuous ... He cuts energy assistance to the poor, cuts breakfast programs from children, cuts lunch programs from children, cuts job training from children and then says, when at the table, 'Let us pray.'"

Mr. Reagan, individually, should be held accountable for increasing infant mortality among the poor. His policies are responsible for two years of massive unemployment, for forcing 200,000 farmers and ranchers off their land, for undermining the rights of organized labor, for sending 3 million of our best jobs overseas. "He has savaged student loans and mortgaged our future." By cutting social programs he has contributed to "teen-age prostitution, alcohol and drug abuse, depression and suicide."

IN BRIEF: "Given the first-term record, even our most pessimistic foredasts for four more Republican years may well fall short of the mark. No one knows the full extent of the damage Reagan could wreak on this country in another term."

Mind you, to paraphrase my brother Broder, these were not cheap party hacks carving up Mr. Reagan's carcass. The quotes come from the speeches of Mario Cuomo, Jesse Jackson, Gary Hart, Walter Mondale, Geraldine Ferraro, and from the Democratic platform. Who was harsh on whom? And who started the billingsgate?

OPEN LETTER TO THE PRESIDENT

they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the Pursuit of Happiness.

e the people of the United States, in order to form a more perfect Union, establish justice, insure domestic tranquility, provide for the common defense, promote general welfare, and secure the blessing of liberty to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain, and establish this Constitution for the United States of America.

Dear Mr. President,

With all due respect to you, your outstanding staff, and the Congress, I pen these words in the belief that the introduction will place you, and whomever will peruse this letter, in a frame of mind that will give everyone a better understanding of this communication.

My name is Macario C. Montenegro, President of the Salmon River Miners Council, Siskiyou County, a chapter of Western Mining Council Incorporated (1945), in the state of California. Our organization advocates and promotes for the existence of the small miners and prospectors of America. The majority of our membership is in the gold mining business. We, Mr. President, are becoming an endangered species on the face of this nation, but we vow that our heritage shall not be destroyed by over-regulation and usurpation of powers by bureaucratic agencies.

I am being candid with you when I say we, the people, are being overgoverned by the abundance of quasi-official agiencies that our Legislators and our system have imposed upon us, and over which we, the people, have no way to control, since we do not elect the officials who run them. To be more specific, the United States Forest Service, under the Department of Agriculture, and the Bureau of Land Management, under the Department of Interior, two agencies that are always at odds with each other because one wants to exceed the other, and we suffer from this. Your Office and the Congress have allowed these agencies to run rampant in the promulgation of rules and regulations to fit whatever pruposes they feel they must accomplish. Through the unconstitutional aid and use of the Federal Register, quasi-official agencies have become the powers of right in our nation. Certain administrative courts of law have become like the courts of yesteryear (Kangaroo), seeming to hear only one side of the story. High Grade Discovered At Marysville Project

Helena, Montana – Goldsil Mining and Consolidated Paymaster Resources Ltd. have jointly announced that initial drilling results at the Marysville Project, located near Helena, Montana, indicate the discovery of a new high grade vein averaging 0.44 ounce of gold and 1.0 ounce of silver per ton.

The companies reported the completion of three drill holes on the 400-foot level of the Drumlummon Mine near Marysville. One of the drill holes cut 14 feet of vein material with a high grade core containing 8 feet of ore showing 0.44 ounce gold and 1.0 ounce silver. The jointly-owned property has historically been highly productive.

"This represents a new vein discovery, and indicates the quality of undeveloped ore left in the Drumlummon Mine," said Goldsil President Donald W. Busby. "This hole was drilled in the portion of the mine that was most heavily exploited in the past, and it suggests that development efforts by past operators were not thorough."

The Drumlummon Mine has been flooded to the 400-foot level for most of this century. The mine was dewayered to the 700-foot level during the 1940s, and it was mined for five years between 1945 and 1950—when mining activities ceased as a result of the mill being destroyed by fire.

During the five years of operation, the Drumlummon produced more than 140,000 tons of ore at the historical mine average of 0.5 ounce of gold and 5 ounces of silver per ton. Records show the operator was working a vein on the 700-foot level that averaged .51 ounce of gold per ton when the mill burned down. Unmined ore is believed to have extended in several directions from the working level at the time.

The companies are currently dewatering the mine, and they have completed over 1,200 feet of rehabilitation on the 400-foot level. With the new discovery, and past performance below the 400-foot level, Goldsil and Paymaster are confident that the Drumlummon will provide significant tonnage of ore averaging about 0.4 ounce of gold and 4 ounces of silver per ton for many years to come.

Here is the bottom line, Mr. President. For eleven years I have pursued the plight of the small miner and prospector. I have followed chains of command of various agencies involved with our way of life, trying to reach a medium whereby everyone will benefit, but my pursuits have been in vain. Our avenues of relief are exhausted, so now I turn to the only avenue left to us. It would behoove this Administration to weigh and give immediate attention to the following request. Since our Country is spend-

ing millions of our tax dollars trying to promote freedom and Human rights all over the rest of the world, my request is that just a few thousand of those dollars be spent here to clean up our own backyard of violations to the rights of our citizenry. A small task force investigation would relieve many of our problems and violations. One more point is that when these agencies prosecute us, they are using our money to violate us; therefore, what I request is more in line with, and would be fruitful in, returning the respect of our public servants towards those they work for.

If more facts are warranted to fulfill what I have requested, be aware that I am airing this letter to various newspapers, to all chapters of Western Mining Council Incorporated, and to a number of Legislators. In keeping the public informed of this correspondence, you can rest assured facts will be forthcoming. I must also request that this communication not be passed to a quasi-official agency for answering. You, Mr. President, have a duty to all Americans, and we hold you bound to that duty.

I thank you beforehand for your time and attention given to this matter, and remain your loyal constituent, awaiting your sincere reply.

/ U.S. Agents Use Illegal Methods Against Miner's Claim Improvements

(Mr. Lancefield is an attorney, member of the Oregon State Bar, the Washington State Bar, admitted to practice in the U.S. District Court for Oregon and the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit.)

Not satisfied to stay within the limits of their legal authority, some over-eager government agents of the BLM and the Forest Service are pretending to wield power they do not have in order to frighten small miners into "voluntarily" giving up cabins and other improvements on their mining claims.

One device currently being utilized for this purpose is to nail to the cabin a paper purporting to be a "Legal Notice" which declares that the United States has instituted trespass proceedings against the structure(s). The notice orders removal of the improvements and threatens that unless they are removed by a certain date, the United States "will without further or any additional notice of any kind whatsoever and without liability destroy or remove said improvements." The claim owner has had no notice served on him of any "trespass proceedings", and there is actually no legal basis for any such proceeding, although the notice cites a statute and corresponding regulation which have no application to improvements on a mining claim in good standing.

The notice refers to Title 43 United States Code §1061, the Unlawful Inclosures of Public Lands Act, enacted in 1885 to prevent cattle grazers from fencing off water holes on public lands to which they had no color of title. The U.S. Supreme Court has held repeatedly that this act was intended only to prevent mere trespassers from inclosing public lands, and in a proceeding thereunder it is a sufficient defense to show that the defendant had color of title acquired in good faith. See Cameron v. U.S., 13 S.Ct. 595, 143 U.S. 533 and other cases annotated in 43 U.S.C.A. under Sec. 1061. The statute has nothing to do with structures on an unpatented mining claim, which the locator or his grantee holds by a possessory title that the United States Supreme Court

has recognized to be "property in the highest sense of the term." Wilbur v. United States ex rel. Krushnic, 280 U.S. 306, 316 (1930).

This property right of a citizen is protected by the Fifth Amendment to the federal constitution. A locator may not be deprived of any part of his property rights in a valid mining claim without due process of law. His improvements may not be taken from him without payment of just compensation. U.S v. North American Transportation and Trading Company, 253 U.S. 330 (1920).

When Congress enacted the Surface Resources Act in 1955, 30 USC §612, giving to the Secretary of the Interior limited authority to manage the surface resources on unpatented mining claims, Congress recognized specifically the right of the

The legislative history of that act [House Report No. 730, U.S. Code, Cong. and Admin. News, 1955, pp. 2482-3] emphasizes the intention of Congress that "Dominant and primary use of the locations hereafter made as in the past would be vested first in the locator."

Since Congress was concerned about the danger that over-zealous agents might interfere in the future with legitimate miners' activities by abuse of administrative authority, such as we are seeing here, the Act restricts

the management authority of the United States agents to "such as not to endanger or materially interfere with prospecting, mining or processing operations or uses reasonably incident thereto." 30 USC §612(b).

The only two legal ways by which any part of a miner's property rights in an unpatented mining claim can be taken away from him by the government are: 1) an adminstrative contest to challenge the validity of his location, tried in the Interior Department's adminstrative tribunals; or 2) an occu-

pancy trespass case brought in the federal law courts. Either proceeding requires observance of the miner's right to due process of law, service of notice and a hearing at which he can defend himself, before any order is issued. No administrative agent and no office of the Bureau of Land Management or of the Forest Service has the authority to issue the kind of order contained in the "Legal Notice" described above, which is a flagrant attempt to deceive miners into giving up shelter for themselves and their crews and their equipment, to which they are lawfully entitled.

Judge Batchelder

The selection of Alice Batchelder of Medina to be a federal judge for northern Ohio is good news for conservatives within the Republican Party and for people eager to promote the fortunes of talented women. The choice also reflects the White House's belated drive to offset the Democrats' gender-gap campaign issue.

As witness the hard-right platform adopted in Dallas, moderates and liberals have become an endangered species in the Grand Old Party. It wasn't always so. After President Reagan took office, he had to solidify and reward the various Republican interests that had supported his winning campaign. Conservatives, the Reagan bedrock since the 1960s, were offended that the truebelievers seemed to be slighted in favor of less-staunch allies. In that sense, the Batchelder

appointment answers a conservative cry that "it's our turn."

Batchelder, a lawyer since 1971, became a federal bankruptcy judge in Cleveland last year after losing a 1982 bid for a district judgeship because of geographical factors. She is a member of a prominent Medina County family and a long-time Reagan supporter. Her husband, William, a respected legislator, was co-chairman of Reagan's 1980 campaign in Ohio.

The open seat on the federal bench here is among 40 created nationwide. Only one of the current judges for northern Ohio is a woman. Batchelder appears a cinch to clear the usual background check and Senate confirmation in time for swearing-in late this year.

The Republican Convention in Dallas is over. For the second time Ronald Reagan is his party's nominee. Then was no opposing candidate; nobody would have had the ghost of a chance.

Ronald Reagan is a man whom many Americans love. He is a politician who represents them or their hopes. His opponents try to trip him by attacking his alleged or real mistakes, his true or assumed weaknesses. But Reagan's popularity escalates. The Americans have rediscovered patriotism since he took over the reigns of government. The "ugly American" has disappeared. The traumatic experiences of Vietnam and Watergate are forgotten. The still vivid memories of the foreign-policy set-backs under Jimmy Carter tend to brighten the newly-won selfconfidence.

Of course Reagan, too, had his set-backs, for instance the night-make of the marines in Lebanon. But in accepting this defeat, Reagan proved that the knew the mood of his people. He had the guts to order the withdrawal instead of leaving the soldiers in an untenable position for reason of prestige. Thus his popularity was hardly scratched. Today the Lebanon adventure is no longer a political issue.

Since generations Reagan is the first President who openly calls himself a conservative. But all of America has become more conservative. This became especially clear during the Conventions of the Democrats a few weeks ago, when many liberal positions were abandoned.

Of course only the voter will decide on November 6th who will reside in the White House after January 20th, 1985.

But as things appear today, the chances of the Democratic challenger, Walter Mondale, are minute. Too much speaks in favor of returning Ronald Reagan to the presidency:

The inflation is under control; the economy grows faster than in decades. Again and again the President asks his people: "Are you better off today than you were four years ago?" And the majority of the people answer with a resounding "yes". The average voter is not bothered by high interests or public debts.

So it is to be assumed that the next President will again be Ronald Reagan. This is good news for America.

Dear Mr. Weber:

Thank you for writing in support of the President and his efforts against pornography. I am glad to be able to respond on his behalf.

As you know, President Reagan has recognized the extremes to which pornography has gone in our day, and the need to do something about it. Last year the President personally told the United States Attorneys at their annual convention in Washington that he considers pornography degrading to human dignity and believes that the federal laws should be more tightly enforced. The Justice Department has responded by holding the first-ever federal training session in how to do pornography cases for 200 federal prosecutors and investigators. The Customs Service has produced a more than 200 percent increase in its seizures of obscene materials coming in across our borders.

In addition, the President recently signed an Administrationsupported bill to tighten the laws against child pornography, an especially serious plague that has received heightened public attention in recent months. The Attorney General, in addition, is in the process of setting up a new national commission to study the effects of pornography on our society and what we can do about it.

An effective strategy in this area will require efforts at the state and local level, as well as the federal level. We especially need public awareness and support on this issue. Thank you for your concern and your support.






Republicans Must Beware!
