Since the President is scheduled to be making two addresses to veterans groups in the next several weeks (VFW and American Legion), I thought that you might be interested in an item for consideration and/or action by the President.

Marine Corporal Wladyslaw (Scotty) Staniszewski, a citizen of Scotland, died July 7, 1967, from wounds received in Vietnam. He had just turned twenty years old and was reportedly the only non-U.S. citizen in the U.S. military killed in Vietnam.

Corporal Staniszewski's parents, U.S. citizens living in Brockton, Massachusetts, have been seeking posthumous citizenship for their son. A bill has been filed in Congress and the Justice Department, after a lengthy delay, has indicated no objections.

The appeal for citizenship has generated considerable media attention and editorial support especially in Massachusetts. Veterans groups have also taken special interest in this case. Last week, the Massachusetts House unanimously passed a resolution calling for Congress and the President to grant citizenship to Staniszewski.

Either a reference to Corporal Staniszewski's heroism in Vietnam as the only non-U.S. citizen serving in the military and killed in that conflict, and/or the granting of that posthumous citizenship, might be appropriate for inclusion in one of the forthcoming addresses to veterans groups by the President..

## Family furious son killed in 'Nam denied citizenship

A BROCKTON man has vowed to chisel his dead son's name off the Vietnam War Memorial in Washington, D.C., unless the government grants the boy the American citizenship he wanted so badly before he fell in combat.

But despite three years of writing letters, including several to President Reagan, Frank Staniszewski says the government won't budge.

And Staniszewski and his wife, Rosina, are angry and hurt.

"My son gave his life

for this country, and now the country he fought and died for won't recognize him," said Staniszewski. "He's still a foreigner here. I don't understand it.

"I think he earned it," he said. "I'm not asking any longer. I'm demanding it. It's disgusting. If they don't grant it, I'm going to take his name off that memorial."

Corporal Wladyslaw "Scotty" Staniszewski, a citizen of Scotland when he enlisted in the U.S. Marines, died in Vietnam on July 7, 1967.

His father, a native of Poland, and his mother, a Scot, had emigrated to the U.S. from Scotland in 1963.

Staniszewski, a retired leather worker, knows a thing or two about freedom — he spent three years in a Siberian prison camp at the hands of the Russians during World War II.

And he instilled that love of freedom in his son. After his death from shrapnel wounds in Quang Nam Province, the Marines wrote in a letter to his parents that Wladyslaw's "attitude and personality were an inspiration to those who served with him."

"Scotty," as the Staniszewskis called their son, could have returned to Scotland to avoid the Vietnam war, but instead decided to join the Marines when his draft notice came.

His mother said: "He said, 'It's a good country, Mum. I want to make my roots here. If a country is worth living in, it's worth fighting for.'"

Scotty had lived in America for just under three years when he was killed. Five years of residency are required for foreigners who want to become citizens.

The Staniszewskis are both American citizens now, as are their two other children, including one now serving in the U.S. Navy.

"There were five of us," said Mrs. Staniszewski. "Four have

their citizenship. What about the fifth?"

Charles Fiske of Bridgewater, father of little Jamie Fiske, the girl who made news when she received a history-making liver transplant nearly two years ago, is trying to help the Staniszewskis in their quest.

He said he called the White House on behalf of the Staniszewskis, but was told, "If we did it for him, we'd have to do it for everybody."

Staniszewski has written to President Reagan as well as Senators Kennedy and Tsongas and

U.S. Rep. Thomas P. "Tip" O'Neill for help, but has received no replies.

A bill to grant the posthumous citizenship was filed in Congress by U.S. Rep. Brian Donnelly, but was sent to the Justice Department for review and never came back. Fiske says Wladyslaw Staniszewski is the only non-citizen whose name is inscribed on the Vietnam Memorial.

"You can't give anything more than your life," said Mrs. Staniszewski. "I think he's entitled. He took an oath to the flag. His goal was to become a U.S. citizen."

## Pols must make time for 'Scotty'

IT IS not the fault of "Scotty" Staniszewski's family that Congress has only a little time left to bestow citizenship posthumously on the young Marine who sacrificed his life in Vietnam 17 years ago.

It is strictly the fault of the snail-like "working" of the federal bureaucracy, which for 14 months has done nothing to advance U.S. Rep. Brian Donnelly's bill to make him officially what he was in fact — an American. In all that time the proposal went no farther than to the Justice Department, which took that long to decide it could see no legal bar to granting his parents' wish that he be made a citizen.

Now we are told that, gosh, there might not be time enough for Congress to pass the bill this year. It is in recess now, until after Labor Day, and when it returns it will work for only about a

month before cutting again for the rest of 1984. And so, folks, the whole thing might have to be put off until next year.

That, we don't mind saying, is absurd. Making "Scotty" Staniszewski an American might be a minor priority for the federal legislature, but it is a major and urgent concern for his parents and brothers — and indeed for all who revere the selfless heroism this young man showed for the country he wanted to make his own.

There is no time to waste — but there is time to act. All the House and Senate have to do is get moving on it — and that is not too much to ask. Far more was asked of "Scotty" Staniszewski — and he answered. If he could give his life for America, there is no excuse for Congress not giving a little time — now — to grant him what he earned with his sacrifice.

## 'Scotty' Staniszewski

LIKE millions of other Americans, I was proud watching our young athletes compete for high honors at the 1984 Olympic Games in Los Angeles last week. Hearing our National Anthem played and watching our flag wave made me feel so good to be an American.

But I don't feel so proud after reading in the Herald about the Brockton family who had come to America from Scotland. They had adopted this nation, and in so doing, ended up losing their son in the tragic war in Vietnam.

Because their son "Scotty" was killed in action before he had a chance to live in the U.S. long enough to become eligible for citizenship, our government officials have decided that Corporal "Scotty" Staniszewski, USMC was not good enough to become a citizen. This young hero who made the supreme sacrifice for his adopted country went to fight a war in Vietnam when other young Americans fled the country and beat the draft by getting college deferments.

This young man was a Marine, a member of one of the best fighting forces in the world, a young man who did not have to go to war but answered this nation's call to duty.

## Citizenship drive for dead Marine advances past the US Justice Dept.

WASHINGTON — The Justice Department said yesterday it has no objections to Congress granting the wish for US citizenship of a Marine corporal from Brockton who died in Vietnam. The parents of Cpl. Wladyslaw Staniszewski have been fighting for two years to win citizenship for their son, who was a British subject when he died.

John Stobierski, a spokesman for Rep. Brian Donnelly (D-Mass.), said the Justice Department ruling clears the

way for congressional action on Donnelly's bill to grant citizenship to Staniszewski, who was killed in Quang Nam Province on July 7, 1967.

Staniszewski's parents, Frank and Rosina, have said that becoming a citizen was their son's great wish. Staniszewski's father, Frank, is a native of Poland who spent three years in a Siberian prison camp during World War II. The Marine's mother, Rosina, is from Scotland. The Staniszewskis came to the United States in 1963.

## Speaker McGee helps fallen Marine's cause

SPEAKER Thomas McGee and three colleagues are filing resolutions in the House today to urge Congress and President Reagan to extend citizenship to a Brockton marine killed in Vietnam.

The marine, Corporal Wladyslaw Staniszewski, was a citizen of Scotland when he enlisted in the U.S. Marines. He was killed in Vietnam on July 7, 1967.

"Corporal Staniszewski made the supreme sacrifice for the country he loved," McGee said yesterday. "He could receive no further honor than being granted a citizenship by the nation he fought for."

Federal officials have opposed efforts by Staniszewski's parents to have their son declared a citizen posthumously.

## Deserved honor

THE grievance the parents of Cpl. Wadislaw Staniszewski of Brockton have against the government is such a justified one that it deserves to be satisfied without any further dawdling or debate.

Frank and Rosina Staniszewski want their boy to be granted American citizenship — and that's an honor he earned more than any of us who are able to read these words.

He and his family, who came here from Scotland in 1963, needed five years' residence before they could qualify to become citizens. They made it; he didn't. He enlisted in the Marines and was killed in action in Vietnam in 1967.

His parents are, officially, Americans; so are his two brothers, who now are serving in the Navy. But "Scotty"

Staniszewski is not, because he was two years short on the residency requirement.

The Staniszewskis believe he should be granted citizenship posthumously. They wrote to Sens. Edward Kennedy and Paul Tsongas, to Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill, and to the White House asking their help — and haven't heard Word One from any of them yet. A bill Rep. Brian Donnelly filed in their behalf is missing somewhere in the bureaucratic maze.

The parents are angry, and they have a right to be. "You can't give anything more than your life," Mrs. Staniszewski said. "I think he's entitled."

So do we; and so, we assume, do our elected leaders in Washington. If that's true, they've got a great chance to show it. All they have to do is act.

# McGee: Make late Marine a citizen

## House Speaker urges an end to the red tape

Massachusetts House Speaker Thomas McGee yesterday called for an end to the red tape he said is denying US citizenship to a young Marine corporal who died in Vietnam.

Marine Cpl. Wladyslaw Staniszewski died July 7, 1967, from shrapnel wounds received in Quang Nam province — two weeks after his 20th birthday.

Staniszewski migrated to the United States from his native Scotland 2½ years before he volunteered for the Marines. He would have been eligible for citizenship if he had survived his tour of duty in Vietnam.

At State House ceremonies, McGee, an ex-Marine, presented the late corporal's father with a House resolution calling on Congress and President Ronald Reagan to grant citizenship to Staniszewski.

"There is no question in my mind there shouldn't have been any red tape," McGee told Frank Staniszewski and his daughter, Lorraine. "He was a Marine. They allowed him to enlist. They allowed him to go out and fight. They allowed him to die for the United States."

The elder Staniszewski, a Brockton resident, called the resolution "at least one step in the right direction."

His three-year effort to get US citizenship for his son cleared what could have been a major roadblock last week when the Justice Department said it had no objection to a bill making Staniszewski a citizen.

But that only cleared the way for congressional action on the bill, and time is running out this session.

Staniszewski's parents have said becoming a US citizen was their son's great wish, but the elder Staniszewski was cautious about whether the dream will come true.

"I hope it comes soon," the father said after ceremonies, but "I know Congress. I know

Reagan. I know candidates.

"I don't believe until I [get it] in signed and delivered," Staniszewski said. "Then I will believe."

A retired leather worker, Staniszewski said, "I have supporters all over America. They're really disgusted. They don't believe how could it happen like this. They're really disgusted."

"It should have been done in the [when] he was killed, when they give him his military honors," he said.

McGee was adamant that Congress act soon.

"I'm a Marine," said McGee, who served in the corps during World War II. "This man gave his life for the United States. He was the only serviceman not a citizen that was killed in the War. There seems to be no earthly reason why this young man should not be posthumously granted citizenship. It should be done now, this year."

## Pols must make time for 'Scotty'

IT IS not the fault of "Scotty" Staniszewski's family that Congress has only a little time left to bestow citizenship posthumously on the young Marine who sacrificed his life in Vietnam 17 years ago.

It is strictly the fault of the snail-like "working" of the federal bureaucracy, which for 14 months has done nothing to advance U.S. Rep. Brian Donnelly's bill to make him officially what he was in fact — an American. In all that time the proposal went no farther than to the Justice Department, which took that long to decide it could see no legal bar to granting his parents' wish that he be made a citizen.

Now we are told that, gosh, there might not be time enough for Congress to pass the bill this year. It is in recess now, until after Labor Day, and when it returns it will work for only about a

month before cutting again for the rest of 1984. And so, folks, the whole thing might have to be put off until next year.

That, we don't mind saying, is absurd. Making "Scotty" Staniszewski an American might be a minor priority for the federal legislature, but it is a major and urgent concern for his parents and brothers — and indeed for all who revere the selfless heroism this young man showed for the country he wanted to make his own.

## Deserved honor

THE grievance the parents of Cpl. Wladislaw Staniszewski of Brockton have against the government is such a justified one that it deserves to be satisfied without any further dawdling or debate.

Frank and Rosina Staniszewski want their boy to be granted American citizenship — and that's an honor he earned more than any of us who are able to read these words.

## House Speaker urges an end to the red tape

Massachusetts House Speaker Thomas McGee yesterday called for an end to the red tape he said is denying US citizenship to a young Marine corporal who died in Vietnam.

Marine Cpl. Wladyslaw Staniszewski died July 7, 1967, from shrapnel wounds received in Quang Nam province — two weeks after his 20th birthday.

Staniszewski migrated to the United States from his native Scotland 2½ years before he volunteered for the Marines. He would have been eligible for citizenship if he had survived his tour of duty in Vietnam.

At State House ceremonies, McGee, an ex-Marine, presented the late corporal's father with a House resolution calling on Congress and President Ronald Reagan to grant citizenship to Staniszewski.

"There is no question in my mind there shouldn't have been any red tape," McGee told Frank Staniszewski and his daughter, Lorraine. "He was a Marine. They allowed him to enlist. They allowed him to go out and fight. They allowed him to die for the United States."

The elder Staniszewski, a Brockton resident, called the resolution "at least one step in the right direction."

His three-year effort to get US citizenship for his son cleared what could have been a major roadblock last week when the Justice Department said it had no objection to a bill making Staniszewski a citizen.

But that only cleared the way for congressional action on the bill, and time is running out this session.

Staniszewski's parents have said becoming a US citizen was their son's great wish, but the elder Staniszewski was cautious about whether the dream will come true.

"I hope it comes soon," the father said after ceremonies, but "I know Congress. I know

Reagan. I know candidates.

"I don't believe until I [get it] in signed and delivered," Staniszewski said. "Then I will believe."

A retired leather worker, Staniszewski said, "I have supporters all over America. They don't believe how could it happen here. They're really disgusted."

"It should have been done in the beginning [when] he was killed, when they give medals and military honors," he said.

McGee was adamant that Congress act soon.

"I'm a Marine," said McGee, who served in the corps during World War II. "The man gave his life for the United States. He was the only serviceman not a citizen that was killed in the War. There seems to be no earthly reason why this young man should not be posthumously citizen. It should be done, this year."

Since the President is scheduled to be making two addresses to veterans groups in the next several weeks (VFW and American Legion), I thought that you might be interested in an item for consideration and/or action by the President.

Marine Corporal Wladyslaw (Scotty) Staniszewski, a citizen of Scotland, died July 7, 1967, from wounds received in Vietnam. He had just turned twenty years old and was reportedly the only non-U.S. citizen in the U.S. military killed in Vietnam.

Corporal Staniszewski's parents, U.S. citizens living in Brockton, Massachusetts, have been seeking posthumous citizenship for their son. A bill has been filed in Congress and the Justice Department, after a lengthy delay, has indicated no objections.

The appeal for citizenship has generated considerable media attention and editorial support especially in Massachusetts. Veterans groups have also taken special interest in this case. Last week, the Massachusetts House unanimously passed a resolution calling for Congress and the President to grant citizenship to Staniszewski.

## Family furious son killed in 'Nam denied citizenship

A BROCKTON man has vowed to chisel his dead son's name off the Vietnam War Memorial in Washington, D.C., unless the government grants the boy the American citizenship he wanted so badly before he fell in combat.



1.) When President Regan makes his address the nation, press conferences and some other important speeches (I consider them all important) they are aired on Wednesdays. Most Christian supporters and Christian grassroots leaders are usually at church. Because usually they are church leaders too.

My suggestion would be to move his speeches to another day other than Sunday, Saturday and Wednesday. You see, I would like to hear what our President says first hand. Not the media's interpretation.

2) I know this next suggestion may be considered further down-the-line in our policy making, but here it is. For some time now I have felt that 4 yrs is not long enough for a presidential term. Too much of this term is used for long, extensive & expensive campaigning. It takes a good amount of time for one to learn ones job and be effective. Now, this sounds good when we have a moral leader like Pres. Regan and it might be difficult during a weak leader's term. Maybe lengthening the presidents term is not the answer. Maybe the answer lies in <sup>limiting</sup> the length of campaigning and the enormous amount
