Dear Mr. President:

I guess I should be amused by the current leaks from "White House insiders" that I am ready to return to private life whatever the election outcome.

It looks like a repeat of the leaks about my departure in "Washington Whispers" and "Periscope" during the closing months of 1982. This culminated in the 17 December 1982 story by the White House correspondent for the New York Post, "CIA Boss Casey Faces Strike Three," which came out a week before a run was made for my job, as you will remember, at the end of 1982.

It seems to be starting early this time with stories in the <u>Washington</u> Times last week and the <u>New York Post</u> yesterday reporting falsely that Casey "has informed White House officials that he plans to step down at the end of the year."

The three stories are attached.

The truth is that I'm thoroughly committed and deeply immersed in what we've undertaken to do here. A copy of this note is going to senior White House officials to ask them to squash a false rumor being attributed to their people, which has set the phones ringing over here, hurts morale, and doesn't help in anything we are trying to do.

Reagan Response Was Mealy-Mouthed Mush

President Reagan's message to the nation concerning the Soviet murder of 269 innocents — including more than 60 Americans — has been called by some a "firm but measured response."

To this newspaper, it sounded more mealy-mouthed than firm, more meaningless than measured. Ronald Reagan talked tough, referring to the incident as "an act of barbaric, uncivilized, cold-blooded murder." But he then added NOTHING but empty words in response.

There was no suggestion of halting grain shipments or tractors or anything else of value to Russia. There was no breaking off of diplomatic relations, no economic sanctions. No mention was made of ceasing disarmament discussions or of cutting off cultural or scientific exchanges.






