WE ARE HERE TO MARK THAT DAY IN HISTORY
WHEN THE ALLIED ARMIES JOINED IN BATTLE TO
RECLAIM THIS CONTINENT TO LIBERTY. FOR
4 LONG YEARS, MUCH OF EUROPE HAD BEEN UNDER
A TERRIBLE SHADOW. FREE NATIONS HAD FALLEN,
JEWS CRIED OUT IN THE CAMPS, MILLIONS CRIED
OUT FOR LIBERATION. EUROPE WAS ENSLAVED,
AND THE WORLD PRAYED FOR ITS RESCUE. HERE,
IN NORMANDY, THE RESCUE BEGAN. HERE THE
ALLIES STOOD, AND FOUGHT AGAINST TYRANNY IN
A GIANT UNDERTAKING UNPARALLELED IN HUMAN
HISTORY.

WE STAND ON A LONELY, WINDSWEPT POINT ON THE NORTHERN SHORE OF FRANCE. THE AIR IS SOFT, BUT, 40 YEARS AGO AT THIS MOMENT, THE AIR WAS DENSE WITH SMOKE AND THE CRIES OF MEN; THE AIR WAS FILLED WITH THE CRACK OF RIFLE FIRE AND THE ROAR OF CANNON.

AT DAWN ON THE MORNING OF THE 6TH OF JUNE,

1944, 225 AMERICAN RANGERS JUMPED OFF THE

BRITISH LANDING CRAFT AND RAN TO THE BOTTOM

OF THESE CLIFFS. THEIR MISSION WAS ONE OF

THE MOST DIFFICULT AND DARING OF THE

INVASION: TO CLIMB THESE SHEER AND DESOLATE

CLIFFS AND TAKE OUT THE ENEMY GUNS.

THE ALLIES HAD BEEN TOLD THAT SOME OF THE

MIGHTIEST OF THOSE GUNS WERE HERE, AND THEY

WOULD BE TRAINED ON THE BEACHES TO STOP THE

THE RANGERS LOOKED UP AND SAW THE ENEMY SOLDIERS AT THE EDGE OF THE CLIFFS SHOOTING DOWN AT THEM WITH MACHINE GUNS AND THROWING GRENADES. AND THE AMERICAN RANGERS BEGAN TO CLIMB. THEY SHOT ROPE LADDERS OVER THE FACE OF THESE CLIFFS AND BEGAN TO PULL THEMSELVES UP. WHEN ONE RANGER FELL, ANOTHER WOULD TAKE HIS PLACE; WHEN ONE ROPE WAS CUT, A RANGER WOULD GRAB ANOTHER AND BEGIN HIS CLIMB AGAIN.

ALLIED ADVANCE.

THEY CLIMBED, SHOT BACK, AND HELD THEIR FOOTING, SOON, ONE BY ONE, THE RANGERS PULLED THEMSELVES OVER THE TOP — AND IN SEIZING THE FIRM LAND AT THE TOP OF THESE CLIFFS THEY BEGAN TO SEIZE BACK THE CONTINENT OF EUROPE.

225 CAME HERE. AFTER TWO DAYS OF FIGHTING, ONLY 90 COULD STILL BEAR ARMS.

BEHIND ME IS A MEMORIAL THAT SYMBOLIZES
THE RANGER DAGGERS THAT WERE THRUST INTO THE
TOP OF THESE CLIFFS. AND BEFORE ME ARE THE
MEN WHO PUT THEM THERE.

THESE ARE THE BOYS OF POINTE DU HOC.

THESE ARE THE MEN WHO TOOK THE CLIFFS.

THESE ARE THE CHAMPIONS WHO HELPED FREE A

CONTINENT; THESE ARE THE HEROES WHO HELPED

END A WAR.

GENTLEMEN, I LOOK AT YOU AND I THINK OF THE WORDS OF STEPHEN SPENDER'S POEM. YOU ARE MEN WHO IN YOUR LIVES FOUGHT FOR LIFE...AND LEFT THE VIVID AIR SIGNED WITH YOUR HONOR.

I THINK I KNOW WHAT YOU MAY BE THINKING RIGHT NOW: "WE WERE JUST PART OF A BIGGER EFFORT; EVERYONE WAS BRAVE THAT DAY."

EVERYONE WAS. DO YOU REMEMBER THE
STORY OF BILL MILLIN OF THE 51st
HIGHLANDERS? FORTY YEARS AGO TODAY, BRITISH
TROOPS WERE PINNED DOWN NEAR A BRIDGE,
WAITING DESPERATELY FOR HELP. SUDDENLY,
THEY HEARD THE SOUND OF BAGPIPES, AND SOME
THOUGHT IT WAS A DREAM. IT WASN'T. THEY
LOOKED UP AND SAW BILL MILLIN WITH HIS
BAGPIPES, LEADING THE REINFORCEMENTS, AND
IGNORING THE SMACK OF THE BULLETS INTO THE
GROUND AROUND HIM.

LORD LOVAT WAS WITH HIM — LORD LOVAT OF SCOTLAND, WHO CALMLY ANNOUNCED WHEN HE GOT TO THE BRIDGE. SORRY I'M A FEW MINUTES LATE, AS IF HE'D BEEN DELAYED BY A TRAFFIC JAM — WHEN IN TRUTH HE'D JUST COME FROM THE BLOODY FIGHTING ON SWORD BEACH, WHICH HE AND HIS MEN HAD JUST TAKEN.

THERE WAS THE IMPOSSIBLE VALOR OF THE POLES, WHO THREW THEMSELVES BETWEEN THE ENEMY AND THE REST OF EUROPE AS THE INVASION TOOK HOLD. AND THE UNSURPASSED COURAGE OF THE CANADIANS, WHO HAD ALREADY SEEN THE HORRORS OF WAR ON THIS COAST. THEY KNEW WHAT AWAITED THEM HERE, BUT THEY WOULD NOT BE DETERRED; ONCE THEY HIT JUNO BEACH, THEY NEVER LOOKED BACK.

ALL OF THESE MEN WERE PART OF A
ROLLCALL OF HONOR, WITH NAMES THAT SPOKE OF
A PRIDE AS BRIGHT AS THE COLORS THEY BORE:
THE ROYAL WINNIPEG RIFLES POLAND'S 24TH
LANCERS THE ROYAL SCOTS FUSILIERS
THE SCREAMING EAGLES THE YEOMEN OF
ENGLAND'S ARMOURED DIVISIONS THE FORCES OF
FREE FRANCE THE COAST GUARD'S "MATCHBOX
FLEET" ... AND YOU, THE AMERICAN RANGERS.

FORTY SUMMERS HAVE PASSED SINCE THE

BATTLE YOU FOUGHT HERE. YOU WERE YOUNG THE

DAY YOU TOOK THESE CLIFFS — SOME OF YOU

WERE HARDLY MORE THAN BOYS, WITH THE DEEPEST

JOYS OF LIFE BEFORE YOU. YET YOU RISKED

EVERYTHING HERE. WHY? WHY DID YOU DO IT?

WHAT IMPELLED YOU TO PUT ASIDE THE INSTINCT

FOR SELF-PRESERVATION AND RISK YOUR LIVES TO

TAKE THESE CLIFFS? WHAT INSPIRED ALL THE

MEN OF THE ARMIES THAT MET HERE?

WE LOOK AT YOU, AND SOMEHOW WE KNOW THE ANSWER.

IT WAS FAITH AND BELIEF; IT WAS LOYALTY AND LOVE.

THE MEN OF NORMANDY HAD FAITH THAT WHAT
THEY WERE DOING WAS RIGHT, FAITH THAT THEY
FOUGHT FOR ALL HUMANITY FAITH THAT A JUST
GOD WOULD GRANT THEM MERCY ON THIS
BEACHHEAD — OR ON THE NEXT. IT WAS THE
DEEP KNOWLEDGE — AND PRAY GOD WE HAVE NOT
LOST IT) — THAT THERE IS A PROFOUND, MORAL
DIFFERENCE BETWEEN THE USE OF FORCE FOR
LIBERATION AND THE USE OF FORCE FOR
CONQUEST. THEY WERE HERE TO LIBERATE,
NOT TO CONQUER, AND SO THEY DID NOT DOUBT
THEIR CAUSE. AND THEY WERE RIGHT NOT TO
DOUBT.

THEY KNEW SOME THINGS ARE WORTH DYING
FOR: ONE'S COUNTRY IS WORTH DYING FOR AND
DEMOCRACY IS WORTH DYING FOR, BECAUSE IT IS
THE MOST DEEPLY HONORABLE FORM OF GOVERNMENT
EVER DEVISED BY MAN. THEY LOVED LIBERTY,
THEY WERE WILLING TO FIGHT TYRANNY,
THEY KNEW THE PEOPLE OF THEIR COUNTRIES WERE
BEHIND THEM.

THE AMERICANS WHO FOUGHT HERE THAT
MORNING KNEW WORD OF THE INVASION WAS
SPREADING THROUGH THE DARKNESS BACK HOME.
THEY FELT IN THEIR HEARTS, THOUGH THEY COULD
NOT KNOW IN FACT, THAT IN GEORGIA THEY WERE
FILLING THE CHURCHES AT 4 A.M. / IN KANSAS
THEY WERE KNEELING ON THEIR PORCHES AND
PRAYING / AND IN PHILADELPHIA THEY WERE
RINGING THE LIBERTY BELL.

THEIR ROCKHARD BELIEF THAT PROVIDENCE WOULD HAVE A GREAT HAND IN THE EVENTS THAT WOULD UNFOLD HERE; THAT GOD WAS AN ALLY IN THIS GREAT CAUSE. AND, SO, THE NIGHT BEFORE THE INVASION, WHEN COLONEL WOLVERTON ASKED HIS PARACHUTE TROOPS TO KNEEL WITH HIM IN PRAYER HE TOLD THEM; DO NOT BOW YOUR HEADS BUT LOOK UP SO YOU CAN SEE GOD AND ASK HIS BLESSING IN WHAT WE ARE ABOUT TO DO.

ALSO THAT NIGHT, GENERAL MATTHEW RIDGWAY LAY ON HIS COT, LISTENING IN THE DARKNESS FOR THE PROMISE GOD MADE TO JOSHUA: \*\*I WILL NOT FAIL THEE NOR FORSAKE THEE.\*\*

THESE ARE THE THINGS THAT IMPELLED
THEM, THESE ARE THE THINGS THAT SHAPED THE
UNITY OF THE ALLIES.

WHEN THE WAR WAS OVER, THERE WERE LIVES
TO BE REBUILT AND GOVERNMENTS TO BE RETURNED
TO THE PEOPLE. THERE WERE NATIONS TO BE
REBORN.

ABOVE ALL, THERE WAS A NEW PEACE TO BE
ASSURED. THESE WERE HUGE AND DAUNTING
TASKS. BUT THE ALLIES SUMMONED STRENGTH
FROM THE FAITH, BELIEF, LOYALTY AND LOVE OF
THOSE WHO FELL HERE. THEY REBUILT A NEW
EUROPE TOGETHER.

THERE WAS FIRST A GREAT RECONCILIATION AMONG THOSE WHO HAD BEEN ENEMIES, ALL OF WHOM HAD SUFFERED SO GREATLY. THE UNITED STATES DID ITS PART, CREATING THE MARSHALL PLAN TO HELP REBUILD OUR ALLIES AND OUR FORMER ENEMIES. THE MARSHALL PLAN LED TO THE ATLANTIC ALLIANCE — A GREAT ALLIANCE THAT SERVES TO THIS DAY AS OUR SHIELD FOR FREEDOM, FOR PROSPERITY, AND FOR PEACE.

IN SPITE OF OUR GREAT EFFORTS AND SUCCESSES, NOT ALL THAT FOLLOWED THE END OF THE WAR WAS HAPPY, OR PLANNED. SOME LIBERATED COUNTRIES WERE LOST.

THE GREAT SADNESS OF THIS LOSS ECHOES DOWN
TO OUR OWN TIME IN THE STREETS OF WARSAW,
PRAGUE, AND EAST BERLIN. THE SOVIET TROOPS
THAT CAME TO THE CENTER OF THIS CONTINENT
DID NOT LEAVE WHEN PEACE CAME. THEY ARE
STILL THERE, UNINVITED, UNWANTED,
UNYIELDING, ALMOST 40 YEARS AFTER THE WAR.

BECAUSE OF THIS, ALLIED FORCES STILL
STAND ON THIS CONTINENT. TODAY, AS 40 YEARS
AGO, OUR ARMIES ARE HERE FOR ONLY ONE
PURPOSE — TO PROTECT AND DEFEND DEMOCRACY.
THE ONLY TERRITORIES WE HOLD ARE MEMORIALS
LIKE THIS ONE AND THE GRAVEYARDS WHERE OUR
HEROES REST.

WE IN AMERICA HAVE LEARNED BITTER
LESSONS FROM TWO WORLD WARS: IT IS BETTER
TO BE HERE, READY TO PROTECT THE PEACE, THAN
TO TAKE BLIND SHELTER ACROSS THE SEA,
RUSHING TO RESPOND ONLY AFTER FREEDOM IS
LOST.

WE HAVE LEARNED THAT ISOLATIONISM NEVER WAS AND NEVER WILL BE AN ACCEPTABLE RESPONSE TO TYRANNICAL GOVERNMENTS WITH EXPANSIONIST INTENT.

BUT WE TRY ALWAYS TO BE PREPARED FOR
PEACE, PREPARED TO DETER AGGRESSION;
PREPARED TO NEGOTIATE THE REDUCTION OF ARMS;
AND, YES, PREPARED TO REACH OUT AGAIN IN THE
SPIRIT OF RECONCILIATION.

IN TRUTH, THERE IS NO RECONCILIATION WE WOULD WELCOME MORE THAN A RECONCILIATION WITH THE SOVIET UNION, SO, TOGETHER, WE CAN LESSEN THE RISKS OF WAR, NOW AND FOREVER.

IT IS FITTING TO REMEMBER HERE THE GREAT LOSSES ALSO SUFFERED BY THE RUSSIAN PEOPLE DURING WORLD WAR II: 20 MILLION PERISHED, A TERRIBLE PRICE THAT TESTIFIES TO ALL THE WORLD THE NECESSITY OF AVOIDING WAR.

I TELL YOU FROM MY HEART THAT WE IN THE UNITED STATES DO NOT WANT WAR. WE WANT TO WIPE FROM THE FACE OF THE EARTH THE TERRIBLE WEAPONS MAN NOW HAS IN HIS HANDS. I TELL YOU WE ARE READY TO SEIZE THAT BEACHHEAD BUT THERE MUST BE SOME SIGN FROM THE SOVIET UNION THAT THEY ARE WILLING TO MOVE FORWARD, THAT THEY SHARE OUR DESIRE AND LOVE FOR PEACE, THAT THEY WILL GIVE UP THE WAYS OF CONQUEST. THERE MUST BE A CHANGING THERE THAT WILL ALLOW US TO TURN OUR HOPE INTO ACTION.

WE WILL PRAY FOREVER THAT SOME DAY THAT CHANGING WILL COME. BUT FOR NOW,

PARTICULARLY TODAY, IT IS GOOD AND FITTING

TO RENEW OUR COMMITMENT TO EACH OTHER,

TO OUR FREEDOM, AND TO THE ALLIANCE THAT

PROTECTS IT.

WE ARE BOUND TODAY BY WHAT BOUND US
40 YEARS AGO, THE SAME LOYALTIES,
TRADITIONS, AND BELIEFS.

AND WE ARE BOUND BY REALITY: THE STRENGTH OF AMERICA'S ALLIES IS VITAL TO THE UNITED STATES, AND THE AMERICAN SECURITY GUARANTEE IS ESSENTIAL TO THE CONTINUED FREEDOM OF EUROPE'S DEMOCRACIES. WE WERE WITH YOU THEN; WE ARE WITH YOU NOW. YOUR HOPES ARE OUR HOPES, AND YOUR DESTINY IS OUR DESTINY.

HERE, IN THIS PLACE WHERE THE WEST HELD
TOGETHER, LET US MAKE A VOW TO OUR DEAD.

LET US SHOW THEM BY OUR ACTIONS THAT WE
UNDERSTAND WHAT THEY DIED FOR; LET OUR
ACTIONS SAY TO THEM THE WORDS FOR WHICH
MATTHEW RIDGWAY LISTENED. I WILL NOT FAIL
THEE NOR FORSAKE THEE.

STRENGTHENED BY THEIR COURAGE,
HEARTENED BY THEIR VALOR, AND BORNE BY THEIR
MEMORY, LET US CONTINUE TO STAND FOR THE
IDEALS FOR WHICH THEY LIVED AND DIED.

PRESIDENTIAL REMARKS: DROPBY BRIEFING FOR NATIONAL COUNCIL OF FARMER COOPERATIVES TUESDAY, JUNE 12, 1984

Good afternoon, welcome to the White House, and special greetings to your chairman and a fellow Californian -Roger Baccigaluppi (Boch-a-gu-loop-ee). I'm delighted to have this opportunity to speak to the people who represent more than 30 State councils of farmer cooperatives, over 35 cooperative credit system banks, more than 100 regional marketing and farm supply cooperatives, and over 2 million individuals. The National Council of Farmer Cooperatives speaks for American agriculture with skill and energy, and in so doing you benefit our entire country. On behalf of all Americans, I thank you.

All of us know that God has blessed America with a vast and fertile land. But it's your ingenuity, muscle, and sweat that have made our farms the envy of the world.

Since 1950, farm output in America has jumped more than 89 percent. Today, with less than three-tenths of one percent of the world's farmers, America produces 65 percent of the world's soybeans, 48 percent of the corn, 32 percent of the sorghum, 25 percent of the oranges, 31 percent of the poultry, and 26 percent of the beef. You provide the American people with a diet that gives them health, creativity, and energy.

And just as you provide food for people here at home, you make food available to millions around the world. American wheat is used to make pasta in Italy. Our soybeans go into soy sauce in the Orient. Our cottonseed is pressed into oil that gets

shipped to Venezuela. Our grain goes into bread in Russia. And African children are fed by the tillers of Great Plains soil.

As a vast and growing industry, agriculture represents a driving force in our Nation's economy. America's agricultural assets exceed one trillion dollars, and the agriculture industry employs some 23 million people — more than a fifth of America's workforce. You contribute mightily to our level of exports. This year, our agricultural export revenue will be more than five times what it was in 1970, helping to offset the increased cost of energy imports over this period. Today, one of every three agricultural acres are devoted to export, and about one-fourth of all farm income arises from sales overseas. Secretary Block just returned from Japan, and I understand that the number of acres American farmers plant each year for export to Japan is greater than the number of acres planted in Japan itself.

Yet, proud as we are of all that American agriculture has accomplished, we must remember the terrible weight borne by our farmers in recent years. By 1980, a decade of overspending and overtaxing had pushed interest rates sky-high and unleashed raging inflation. Nowhere did the economic chaos strike harder than down on the farm. There's a story about a farmer who won a million-dollar sweepstake. When a reporter asked him how he intended to use the money, the farmer answered, "Oh, I expect I'll keep on farming until it's all gone."

Well, our Administration took office determined to bring prosperity back to the farm.

One of my first actions as President was to lift the Soviet grain embargo. As long as I'm President, our farmers will never again be asked to bear the brunt of foreign policy.

Since then, we've taken vigorous action to boost farm exports still further. Trade teams have gone around the world to seek new markets. Your chairman, Roger Baccigaluppi (Boch-a-gu-loop-ee), is helping in this important effort by serving on our Advisory Committee of Trade Negotiations.

Secretary Block has been tireless in his travels to Europe, Africa, Latin America, the Middle East, and, most recently, the Far East. And to help finance exports, our Administration implemented the blended credit program and increased the level of agricultural export credit guarantees to the highest level in history.

I think these efforts are paying off. We expect to increase grain sales to Morocco. And we've had a recent breakthrough with Japan. The Japanese have agreed to nearly double their quotas for American citrus and beef, markedly increasing the market for those products.

Another plus for farmers is our Payment-in-Kind program -an effort that gets surplus commodities out of the warehouses and
puts them to work. The self-help nature of PIK has made farmers
themselves, not government, the solution. It has given farmers
increased personal freedom, and it has helped to whittle down
surpluses that for years have been a serious drag on the entire
industry.

Today our Adminstration is hard at work on the 1985 Farm
Bill. The Department of Agriculture is actively soliciting
farmers' views on this bill, and so far they've accepted hundreds
of pages of written recommendations and held listening sessions
in California, Chicago, and Atlanta. Next week another session
will be held in Syracuse, New York. And while past farm bills
have been content just to revise old 4-year farm programs, we
plan to start from scratch with this bill and make a new
beginning.

Yet despite the importance of each of these efforts, our Administration has set one program in place that has helped farmers more than all the others put together. It's called economic expansion.

The month we took office, inflation was well into double digits. Today, inflation has fallen by more than half. And farmers are seeing the difference.

The prime interest rate, the month we took office, soared to more than 21 percent -- the highest level since the Civil War.

Today, the prime interest rate is at just about half that level.

And since for every one percent drop in the average interest rate on outstanding farm debt, net farm income goes up \$2 billion, this year net farm income will be some \$20 billion more than it would have been if interest rates had remained at their 1980 record highs. Don't get me wrong: Interest rates are still higher than you or I would like them. But we have restored our country's basic economic health, and if we go on pursuing a sound

monetary policy and working to put the Federal budget process in order, interest rates will drop more.

Throughout history, farming has been recognized as one of the pillars of a vital society. In ancient Rome, Cicero proclaimed, "Of all occupations from which gain is secured, there is none better than agriculture, nothing more productive, nothing sweeter, nothing more worthy of a free man." You have my pledge to see to it that farming in America remains not only noble, but prosperous — and that the dream of a successful family farm remains a living part of the American dream.
