The recent events in Lebanon and the threat posed to U.S. nationals, before our rescue operation on Grenada, demonstrate the need for U.S. assistance in training foreign counter-terrorist forces. We need to move now to ensure that the anti-terrorism training program proposed by State is acted upon by the Congress as soon as possible. (8)

Would you, therefore in coordination with DOD and OMB, work to develop support in the Congress for this authority and the requisite funding to implement the program.

We should also move to develop the improved program for the protection of foreign officials in the U.S. along the lines of the State proposal. We are prepared to support a concerted legislative effort in this regard to ensure passage of these two key pieces of legislation. (8)

Judge Clark's memorandum at Tab A tasks State, Defense, Justice, and the DCI, to review our counter-terrorism program and provide recommendations on how to implement the President's July 28 statement on the subject (Tab B). The State response at Tab C indicates actions underway. It cites three specific legislative actions for:

-- anti-terrorism training,

-- protection of foreign officials, and

-- implementing legislation for our conventions on aircraft sabotage and the taking of hostages.

On November 1, the Chairman of the Interagency Group on Terrorism (IG/T) informed us that funding for anti-terrorism training (\$5M) has been included in the HFAC and SFRC FY-84 Foreign Operations Subcommittee mark-up. It is not, however, in the House Appropriations Committee mark. The HAC has objected to any "new programs." On the protection of foreign officials legislation, the Senate has included \$6M in funding in their mark-up and it goes to conference with the House this week. The implementing legislation for the Montreal (aircraft highjacking) and Hostage Conventions is being handled by a State/OMB/Justice task force and stands a good chance for approval in the near term.

The most pressing item at this time is to obtain funding for anti-terrorism training. It is this kind of program which will be most helpful in training foreign police and security forces which ultimately are responsible for protecting American citizens overseas. Given the events in Lebanon and the threat to U.S. nationals that existed on Grenada, this legislation should receive a sympathetic hearing on the Hill at this time.

Your memorandum at Tab I to Secretary Shultz asks that he energize his legislative apparatus in support of the anti-terrorism training program. Though the State memo at Tab C suggests that the White House contact certain senators and congressmen, we should not proceed in that direction until after State has acted. (FYI: The cables attached to the State memo at Tab C have already been transmitted. Responses from the Swiss, the FRG, Turkey, and the U.K. have are been received.)


On July 28, 1983, the President issued a public statement condemning the terrorist attack in Lisbon. In his statement (Tab A), the President calls for more effective measures to eliminate the threat of terrorism.

In order to implement the President's commitment, we should have a coherent strategy for diplomatic approaches on the issue--and simultaneously demonstrate the resolve of the USG to address the problem of terrorism. To this end, and in accord with the provisions of NSDD-30, we should urgently undertake the following actions:

- The Secretary of State, in concert with the Secretary of Defense, the Attorney General, and the Director of OMB, will develop a legislative strategy aimed at early enactment of the following legal instruments: (C)
 - -- Implementation of the provisions of the Montreal Convention on acts against civil aviation.
 - -- Implementation of the provisions of the International Convention on the Taking of Hostages.
 - -- Authorization and appropriations requisite to training foreign law enforcement counter-terrorism units as provided for in amendments to the Foreign Assistance Act.
 - -- Legal authority and resources to assist state and local jurisdictions in providing protection for foreign officials in the United States.
 - -- Authority for the payment of rewards for information on international terrorists.

STATEMENT BY THE PRESIDENT

Yesterday's attack in Lisbon on the residence of the Turkish ambassador to Portugal was only the latest in a series of brutal and increasingly indiscriminate terrorist attacks against Turkish diplomats and other innocent civilians. In yesterday's attack, for which the Revolutionary Armenian Army claims responsibility, the wife of a senior Turkish diplomat was killed and a young child was seriously wounded. Only two weeks earlier, a Turkish diplomat was murdered outside his home in Brussels, and one day later seven other individuals were killed as they waited to board a Turkish airliner in Paris. No real or imagined grievance could possibly justify these modern day horrors.

On behalf of the people and government of the United States, I extend the deepest sympathy to the Turkish government and to the families of the victims of this attack. But more than sympathy is required. This senseless violence must cease. To that end, I will be speaking to other heads of state in the days ahead regarding urgent and more effective cooperative measures to eliminate from the civilized community such barbaric and inhuman acts.

WATE HOUSE SUBSECTION ROUNCOUNTER-Terrorism

(U) In your memorandum of August 9 you requested that the Secretary of State and others review certain issues on counter-terrorism and provide you with recommendations to carry out the President's statement regarding "urgent and more effective measures" to deal with international terrorism. This memorandum responds to the first three points in your memorandum and has been discussed among the agencies concerned in a meeting of the Interdepartmental Group on Terrorism on August 25. The fourth point will be dealt with by the Director of Central Intelligence in a separate memorandum.

I. Legislation

A. Legislation Pending in the Congress

1.(U) Anti-terrorism training. In 1982 the Congress did not act on an amendment for the Foreign Assistance Program which would permit this training program. Without an authorization, the Appropriation Committees did not include funds in the FY 1983 Continuing Resolution. The training program is again this year hostage to the lack of authorization but it has been favorably reported by both authorizing Committees. While we will have an uphill battle, we should continue to push for an authorization bill this year. If it becomes clear that there will be no FAA authorization bill this year, we will seek to have the program (and the necessary amendment to the FAA which presently precludes training assistance to foreign police) included in the Continuing Resolution. What is required, however, is a clear indication that approval of this program is a priority of the President. The Department of State will continue actively to pursue Congressional approval and is soliciting appropriate supporting approaches from other IG/T agencies concerned. It is recommended that the White House:


(a) Contact Senators Percy and Pell and Congressmen Zablocki and Broomfield to urge passage of an authorization bill.





- (b) Depending on our success in the above endeavor, make approaches at the then-governing stage in the appropriations process, i.e. subcommittee (McHugh, D. N.Y.), full committee (Conte) or Conference (Kasten). We will send a follow-up memorandum along these lines as the process unfolds.
- 2. (y) Protection of Foreign Officials. Department has already talked with the Senate Foreign Relations Committee and is confident that the kind of tight restrictions on the use of funds as desired by the House and Senate Appropriations Committees can be written into the authorizing legislation. The House has already passed the Department's authorization. We will discuss with the House Foreign Affairs Committee and seek its acceptance of these restrictions. Congressman Smith of the House Appropriations Subcommittee has indicated that with tight restrictions he would consider an appropriation. Although we believe that his objection (and to a lesser extent that of Senator Laxalt in the Senate) is more fundamental than that, we would then recommend that we seek to include language on this item in a possible FY 1984 Continuing Resolution on the understanding that it would be a net addition of \$6 million to the Department's budget. Failing this it should be included in a supplemental budget request for fiscal year 1984.
- 3. (y) Legislation Pending Approval in the Executive There is no substantive objection within the Executive Branch to the three pieces of legislation: implementing provisions for the conventions on aircraft sabotage and the taking of hostages, and authority for the payment of rewards for information on terrorism outside the United States. The sole question is one of tactics: whether these three items should be included in an omnibus bill or each submitted separately. Given past experience on the Montreal Convention on aircraft sabotage which has languished for ten years in omnibus legislation and the Hostage Convention similarly for two years, the Department of State urges that we proceed on separate legislation for each item. The Acting Secretary of State recommended this course of action to the Attorney General in a letter of August 26. Although we could not expect Congessional action this year, we would be in a much better posture in discussing with other governments cooperation on terrorism.

II. (S) Approaches to Other Governments



(U) The Department is also considering including in the Secretary's speech to the United Nations in September a call for strengthened international cooperation on terrorism.

Dear Mr. President:

I have been distressed by the press coverage in France and elsewhere growing out of a meeting I had on September 28 with some American journalists.

I am told that my comments were totally distorted in the French press, thus causing you understandable concern.

First, I am very sorry if these comments were troubling. Secondly, and most importantly, I was not sending out new signals or telegraphing new policy initiatives. Without going into too great detail, what I said was as follows:

- First, we would never presume to negotiate for France or the U.K.
- Second, French and U.K. missiles should not be counted in INF, and the fact that their missiles shouldn't be counted should not give the Soviets an excuse not to negotiate in good faith in Geneva.
- Third, and this is the point that triggered the storm, in order to achieve our goal of major reductions that might lead to total elimination of all nuclear weapons, some day, some way, all missiles by all parties will have to be accounted for.

I made clear that this was not for INF and left the whole question of timing vague -- it now turns out too vague.

I value our personal relationship and as an American I treasure our historical friendship. Thus, when I heard that my comments had caused a stir, I felt deeply concerned.

I have had a chance to talk personally to Margaret Thatcher and have gained her full understanding on the matter. I hope that this short note will be sufficient to allay any concerns that you may have had.
