IMPORTANT -- NOTE: Please note that although Al Kingon gave Commerce a copy of the NSC rewrite of the machine tools report, Commerce still has not forwarded the NSC-redrafted report, under Mac's signature and in final form, to the NSC. We cannot hold an NSC meeting on Monday unless we circulate a final Commerce report to the agencies by COB Thursday, March 6. To do so, would be to open ourselves to the charge that we held an NSC meeting on an important, long-studied topic without members of the Cabinet first being able to study the investigation in question. To further complicate matters, it is crucially important that Commerce send to us the NSC redrafted report or a report at least as balanced as our rewrite, lest the President be painted into a corner as to his options regarding this case. I have already

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called Commerce and demanded that I be able to see their report before it is signed out by Mac to the President. I have also stated that we must have their report by March 6.

Assistant Secretary of Commerce Paul Freedenberg informs me that Commerce staff will show me a copy of their final report before it is signed out tomorrow morning (March 6). Depending on its contents, we may or may not want to go ahead with the NSC meeting on Monday. I personally hope the Commerce study will be satisfactory, so that we can put this issue behind us.

My color briefing charts for the NSC staff/State/CEA/OMB counterbrief to Mac's presentation will be ready on Friday. The briefing charts will be simple, and since Commerce does not intend to circulate its briefing charts before the NSC meeting, it should be sufficient for us to place the briefing charts in front of each Principle's chair prior to the meeting.





The attached information is in response to your note:

### U.S. Machine Tool Companies: Outlook for Modernization

- The U.S. machine tool industry as it exists today will probably undergo a significant transformation in the years ahead. Instead of supplying tools directly to end users, it will supply them to manufacturers of Flexible Manufacturing Systems (FMS).
- Companies other than those making machine tools, such as GE, Westinghouse, and IBM, may enter the market for flexible systems, due in particular to their expertise in computer hardware and software that link machine tools to form a FMS.
- The production of individual tools may shift abroad; this development is quite natural, since manufacturing individual tools is a relatively low-tech activity, compared with supplying the hardware and software that link them.
- The number of U.S. manufacturers of individual machine tools is thus expected to continue to decline; there are now about 400 machine tool companies in the U.S., down from around 800 in the late seventies.
- The DOD-Commerce Action Plan as articulated in our Draft NSDD will help the U.S. machine tool industry through this period of change and sorting out.

# <u>Current Status of U.S. Factory Modernization Efforts and Trends</u>

- There are 47 FMS in the U.S. as of mid-1985; only 5 of the U.S. FMS were built by foreign companies.



- All users are big companies; about one-third of all FMS are used for defense weapons, such as the B-lb bomber and the Bradley fighting vehicle.
- All current U.S. suppliers (6 companies) are large machine tool manufacturers, since a FMS integrates a number of skills and technologies.
- Large-scale U.S. manufacturers (GM, Westinghouse, etc.) will use more FMS in future; this use of "automated factories" will help U.S. manufacturers rid themselves of the problems caused by labor rate disparities vis-a-vis foreign manufacturers.
- Small-scale U.S. manufacturers, however, will still consume large quanities of relatively unsophisticated, stand-alone machine tools. This is a market in which foreign producers predominate.

### Outlook for Factory Automation

- Demand for automated systems is expected to rise significantly in about a year or two, as manufacturers face capacity constraints due to continued U.S. economic growth.
- Foreign suppliers are expected to increase sales efforts in the U.S.; however, the U.S. should remain competitive due to its computer hardware and software.
- Although the Japanese do dominate the U.S. market for certain machine tools that are part of a FMS, such as machining centers and numerically controlled (NC) lathes, their sales actually focus primarily on smaller, less advanced tools.
- The U.S. will continue to lead in manufacturing some very sophisticated tools, and thus a significant proportion of the FMS needed for the most sophisticated defense applications will probably be made in the U.S.

#### Labor Skill Levels to Operate New Machines

The U.S. Department of Labor in its August 1983 report to the Department of Commerce covering the pending Sec 232 case stated the following:

No

Two important technological developments have occurred in machine tool production over the last several decades, namely: (1) the evolution of numerical controls - an electronic control system for programming repetitive and consecutive machine tool operations on intermediate and end products, and (2) the creation of machining centers where several previously separate and manually arranged operations are combined into one or more pieces of automatically programmed metalworking equipment. Advances in numerical and other types of computerized controls tend to lower costs and permit a smaller number of less skilled workers to operate banks of machines.
