Dear Ms. Bennett:

The White House has asked me to reply to your mailgrams of June 2 and June 16 regarding the U.S. government's policy on providing food aid to Vietnam.

As you may know, Public Law 480 generally authorizes the provision of U.S. food assistance worldwide, and the terms of that statute prohibit the United States from providing assistance to Vietnam. Specifically, Section 411 of P.L. 480 disallows the sale of any agricultural commodities under Title I or II or their donation under Title II to Vietnam.

Additionally, the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961, as amended, may serve as a basis for providing food aid abroad. This legislation, however, prohibits the provision of United States Government assistance to Communist countries, expressly including Vietnam. Although the law contains waivers or exceptions to this statutory prohibition (and such exceptions cover disaster assistance), it is unclear whether such waivers or exceptions would permit assistance to Vietnam, since Section 12 of the Department of State Appropriations Act of 1973 disallows assistance of any kind, directly or indirectly, to or on behalf of Vietnam.

In addition to these legal constraints, we believe that as a general rule it would be inappropriate to provide assistance to Vietnam at a time when it is squandering its own resources to maintain its forcible occupation of Kampuchea, in violation of the United Nations Charter and two resolutions of the UN General Assembly.

The U.S. government is prepared, however, to issue export licenses to private organizations which wish to send to Vietnam small quantities of humanitarian assistance, under conditions that the donors take all possible measures to ensure that the aid reaches the intended recipients. In line with this policy, the State Department reconsidered the Mennonites' application to send wheat flour to Vietnam, which as you pointed out was

initially denied. On the basis of information the Mennonites gave to the State Department on June 12 concerning the specific institutions in Vietnam that would receive and monitor the distribution of the wheat, the Department of State recommended to the Commerce Department that the license be approved.

I hope this letter responds to the concerns you raised. Should you wish to discuss this matter further, Mr. Desaix Anderson of my office would be pleased to hear from you. Mr. Anderson can be reached by telephone at (202) 632-3132.

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DEAR MR. PRESIDENT:

THE SUFFERING OF INNOCENT CHILDREN FROM MALNUTRITION AND DISEASE ALWAYS TOUCHES THE CONCERN AND SYMPATHY OF THE AMERICAN PEOPLE. TRADITIONALLY THE UNITED STATES PROVIDES AID TO CHILDREN WHOSE LIVES AND WELL-BEING ARE ENDANGERED WITHOUT REGARD TO POLITICAL DIFFERENCES WITH THEIR GOVERNMENT.

MANY YOUNG CAMBODIANS ARE ALIVE TODAY THANKS TO THE GENEROSITY OF THE U.S. AND OTHER COUNTRIES. HUNGRY CHILDREN ON THE HORN OF AFRICA AND IN CHINA ARE RECEIVING EMERGENCY HELP. BUT SO FAR CHILDREN IN VIETNAM FACING SEVERE MALNUTRITION HAVE BEEN IGNORED.

REPRESENTATIVES OF AMERICAN RELIGIOUS ORGANIZATIONS RECENTLY SAW GAUNT FACES AND MATCHSTICK LIMBS OF TODDLERS BEING TREATED FOR EXTREME MALNUTRITION AT PEDIATRICS HOSPITAL NUMBER TWO IN HO CHI MINH CITY (SAIGON). DOCTORS' EFFORTS TO RESTORE HEALTH ARE HANDICAPPED BY SHORTAGES OF MEDICINE AND MILK. VIETNAMESE HOSPITALS AND DAYCARE CENTERS RECEIVED SURPLUS MILK FROM THE EUROPEAN ECONOMIC COMMUNITY UNTIL 1979 WHEN SHIPMENTS WERE ENDED TO PROTEST VIETNAM'S INVASION OF CAMBODIA.

VIETNAM BECAME A FOOD DEFICIT COUNTRY DURING FIFTEEN YEARS OF WAR. SINCE 1975 IT HAS FACED CHRONIC SHORTAGES DUE TO WAR DAMAGE, THE WITHDRAWAL OF U.S. AND CHINESE FOOD AID, GOVERNMENT MISMANAGEMENT, DIVERSION OF RESOURCES TO MILITARY USES, AND DISASTROUS WEATHER.

ACCORDING TO THE FOOD AND AGRICULTURE ORGANIZATION, IN THE LAST YEAR VIETNAM LOST THE EQUIVALENT OF 1.3 MILLION TONS OF RICE FROM ONE OF THE MOST SEVERE DROUGHTS IN THREE DECADES FOLLOWED BY FLOODS IN LARGE AREAS OF THE CENTRAL AND NORTHERN PROVINCES. VIETNAM HAS REQUESTED 384,000 TONS OF CEREALS FOR TEN MILLION PERSONS. THE FAO'S MISSION TO VIETNAM REPORTED THE REQUEST IS, "FULLY JUSTIFIED AND URGENTLY NEEDED" AND "WILL BE USED EFFECTIVELY AND WILL REACH THE INTENDED BENEFICIARIES,"

U.S. GOVERNMENT POLICY UNDER THE CARTER ADMINISTRATION WAS TO

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DISCOURAGE BILATERAL AND MULTILATERAL HUMANITARIAN AND DEVELOP-MENTAL AID TO VIETNAM. EVEN HELP FROM AMERICAN PRIVATE AND RELIGIOUS AGENCIES HAD TO CONTEND WITH CUMBERSOME AND POLITICIZED LICENSING PROCEDURES.

REGRETTABLY YOUR ADMINISTRATION APPEARS TO BE ADOPTING A SIMILAR OR EVEN HARSHER POLICY BY ITS RECENT DECISION TO FORBID A SHIPMENT TO VIETNAM BY THE MENNONITE CENTRAL COMMITTEE OF 250 TONS OF WHEAT FLOUR DONATED BY KANSAS FARMERS.

THE PREMISE OF BOTH ADMINISTRATIONS SEEMS TO BE THAT HARDSHIP AND ISOLATION WILL FORCE VIETNAM TO WITHDRAW FROM KAMPUCHEA. WE TOO DESIRE THE WITHDRAWAL OF VIETNAMESE TROOPS. HOWEVER, DEPRIVING VIETNAM OF EMERGENCY HUMANITARIAN AID IS UNLIKELY TO ACHIEVE THAT GOAL. THE MILITARY IS NOT DEPRIVED OF FOOD, NOR IS THE RESOLVE OF THE GOVERNMENT SHAKEN FROM POLICIES IT CONSIDERS ESSENTIAL FOR SURVIVAL AS AN INDEPENDENT NATION.

THOSE HURT MOST BY U.S. POLICY ARE THE MOST VULNERABLE, ESPECIALLY CHILDREN. EVEN IF IT SUCCEEDED IN INFLUENCING VIETNAM'S ACTIONS, THE USE OF FOOD AS A POLITICAL TOOL WHEN THE CONSEQUENCES ARE SO EXTREME--DEATH OR LASTING MENTAL RETARDATION--IS UNCONSCIONABLE.

SEVERAL RELIGIOUS AND OTHER NON-GOVERNMENTAL GROUPS ARE ALREADY TRYING TO HELP AS MUCH AS THEIR RESOURCES AND VOLUNTARY CONTRIBUTIONS OF THE AMERICAN PEOPLE PERMIT. WE URGE THAT THE LICENSING PROCEDURES OF THE COMMERCE, TREASURY, AND STATE DEPARTMENTS NO LONGER INTERFERE WITH THIS NON-POLITICAL HUMANITARIAN EFFORT. SPECIFICALLY WE CALL ON YOU TO DIRECT THAT THE MENNONITES! WHEAT FLOUR SHIPMENT BE APPROVED.

BUT EVEN IF ALLOWED, NON-GOVERNMENTAL AID WILL BE FAR FROM SUFFICIENT. WE APPEAL TO YOU TO MAKE USE OF YOUR DISASTER RELIEF AUTHORITY TO PROVIDE VIETNAMESE CHILDREN WITH SURPLUS MILK OR CSM FOOD SUPPLEMENT. BY CHANNELING FOOD THROUGH AN INTERNATIONAL AGENCY LIKE UNICEF OR THROUGH PRIVATE AMERICAN GROUPS, YOU CAN DIRECT IT TO THOSE MOST IN NEED IN HOSPITALS, ORPHANAGES, DAY CARE CENTERS AND SCHOOLS.

PROVIDING FUOD FOR HUNGRY VIETNAMESE CHILDREN IS CONSISTENT WITH THE MOPAL VALUES AND GENEROUS TRADITIONS OF AMERICA. IT COULD ALSO IMPROVE UNDERSTANDING AND COOPERATION BETWEEN VIETNAM AND THE U.S. ON DUTSTANDING DIFFERENCES.

WE WOULD WELCOME THE OPPORTUNITY TO MEET WITH YOU OR YOUR DESIGNATE REPRESENTATIVE TO DISCUSS THESE PROBLEMS.

Dear Dr. Hoan:

The White House has asked me to reply to your telegram of December 16 concerning alleged deportation of former South Vietnamese military and civilian personnel to Siberia

We are aware that the Vietnamese government has sent to the Soviet Union and Eastern Europe thousands of "guest workers." Some estimates range up to 50,000 workers. We have recently received several allegations that former Government of Vietnam employees imprisoned in "reeducation camps" have been sent to Eastern Europe as laborers, but we do not have any conclusive information to prove those claims.

As you are aware, the United States does not have diplomatic relations with Vietnam and therefore our ability to influence the actions of the Vietnamese Government is extremely limited. In international fora, we have frequently condemned the Vietnamese authorities' serious violations of their citizens' human rights, and you may be assured that we will continue to publicize and denounce future violations.

Nonetheless, we would be very interested in receiving any information which you have on this subject. Please feel free to write directly to me. You can be assured that we will respect any need for confidentiality which you may deem necessary.

JOINT STATEMENT

O.F TRUONG NHU TANG & DOAN VAN TOAI ON U.S POLICY TOWARD VIETNAM

Committee on Foreign Affairs

As we see it, there are three policies that the United States can pursue with regard to Soviet and Vietnamese expansionism in Indo China:

- 1) Capitulation. The U.S. can accept the Vietnamese invasion of Kampuchea as a reality, recognize the Heng Sarim regime in Cambodia, normalize relations with Vietnam, resume trade with the Communists and give them aid. But there would be no end to capitulation. Logically, the U.S. would be forced to recognize the Balrak regime in Afghanistan as well as any other governments set up by the Soviets or one of their clients when they invade a foreign country. This is the conseption of living in peace with the Soviets which Mr. Elliott, who testified along with us at the hearing, seems to endorse. It is also the wish of the Communists, who have urged the world to accept their fait-accomplis and to consider that the gains of Gommunism are irreversible.
- 2) Carrot and Stick. This is the policy of the present U.S. administration. For the stick, the U.S. supports the Asean nations and gives them economic and military aid to keep them strong enough to contain Hanoi on the border of Kampuchea-Thailand. For the carrot, the U.S. offers the prospect of normalizing relations with Hanoi and providing aid if the Communists withdraw their troups from Kampuchea, lessen their dependence on the Soviet Union and accept the U.N. proposal for free elections in Cambodia under international supervision.

3) Rollback. The U.S. can attempt to overthrow the Communist regimes in Indo China by helping the resistence movements. So far, the Reagan administration has made a decision to support only the resistence movement in Afghanistan. It hesitates to take similar action in Cambodia, and it seems to be completely reluctant to help the opposition in Vietnam. Not many people in the West believe that a genuine resistence exists in Vietnam, much less that it could succeed in overthrowing the Communist regime.

of the three possible policies, the first one means the total surrender of the U.S. and the non-Communist bloc. The second seems reasonable because it would cost very little in material terms and the U.S. would be seen in a positive light. The third policy would be considered very hawkish and costly. The people of the United States and Westerners in general are still reacting against the Vietnam War; they do not want to get involved in a similar conflict again. But in order to choose the right policy, one must know the nature of the Vietnamese Communists and the objectives of the Soviets. These are quite apparent, though we are reluctant to face up to them or to risk a confrontation.

The Soviet Communists, like their Vietnamese proxies, have constantly instructed their people and their cadres that "our revolution is to fulfill our internationalist duty". Their invasions, they declare, will determine whether Communists triumph over non-Communists in the present era. While they consider the rest of the world as an enemy to be subdued or destroyed, we in the West always express our willingness to live in peace with them. In a football game, the team that is always on the defensive is sure to be defeated. At the hearing, Douglas Pike warned that the bears -

the Vietnamese Communists - will bite if they are fed. But these bears will bite whether they are fed or not. The objective of Moscow and Hanoi is to impose Marxism-Leninism throughout the world under the leadership of the Soviets. We assure you that a policy of concession will fail to withdraw Hanoi's troups from Kampuchea. We would like to remind you that during the Vietnam War, an argument very similar to Mr. Elliott's was made. If only the U.S. would get out of Vietnam and recognize the hegemony of the Communists, peace and prosperity would be restored. But as soon as the U.S. gave up the fight and withdrew from Vietnam, the Communists reacted more brutally than ever. They took over the whole country and imposed a totalitarian regime. Then they occupied Laos and invaded Cambodia.

But some people, like Mr. Elliott, never seem to learn. argued at the hearing that "The more you turn the screws on the Vietnamese Communists, the stronger position the Soviets are in...the more isolated the Vietnamese are, the more the Soviets enjoy a correspondingly greater level of influence with the Vietnamese." How greater can it be? We have confirmed that Communist Vietnam has become an integral and organic part of the Soviet Union and is fulfilling its role as part of Soviet global strategy. Only a show of strength and determination on the part of the West will cause the Communists to modify or give up their ambitions of hegemony. will continue to advance as long as the West wants to try to turn them into good friends and fears confronting them in any way. While the Communists know they cannot defeat the West by a direct war, they are willing to be patient and devour their enemies a bite at a time. Moreover, they invariably portray their aggression as heroic acts of revolution, liberation, national independence, peace, etc.

We cannot expect any change in this aggressive policy even if there is a shift in leadership in Hanoi. As long as the Communist Party remains in control with its present structure, it will continue its policy of conquest.

We favor the third policy outlined above with the following conditions:

- a) The U.S. should not pursue a go-it-alone policy but act in concert with its allies in Southeast Asia to form an overall strategy to combat the Communist advance.
- b) The U.S. should strengthen its ties with its most important ally in the area; namely, China. Everything should be done to continue to separate China from the Soviet bloc and to turn it into a reliable friend.
- c) The U.S., in combination with China, Japan and Asean, should help the resistence movements in Indo China since they have shown a firm determination to fight and count on support from the outside. The U.S. should send weapons and economic aid but not of course, troops or advisors. One of its first objectives should be to set up a radio broadcasting station to provide the Vietnamese people with accurate news and encouragement. This time, the U.S. will be supporting a genuine peoples' movement. Unlike the earlier war when the people were divided and some thought Communism was the proper solution, today they are all united against an oppressive regime.

There is an additional advantage to confronting the Communists in Indo China. They might then be sufficiently tied down to be unable to support revolution in other parts of the world such as Africa or South America. They would run into increasing resistence in Afghanistan and perhaps in other countries they now control.

The growing costs of these resistence movements might force the Soviets to divert funds from nuclear weapons and thus relieve the U.S. and its allies of some of the defense burden. In this way, the policy of containment can be converted into one of rollback. Until this happens, the balance of power, especially in southeast Asia, will continue to favor the Soviets - the most brutal, dangerous imperialists in the world.

Additional Statement of Doan Van Toai

Concerning the U.S.-Sino relationship, I would like to add this analysis:

China has split with the Soviet Union because it believes that its national interest are endangered and because it has modified its ideology. While the Soviets still embrace Marxism-Leninism, it seems to me that the present Chinese leadership is moving away from Communist theory and inclining toward Western value systems, though there is still a long way to go. that U.S. aid and friendship can encourage this trend. As I stated earlier, aid and friendship do no good if the Communist regime is not determined to change. But in the case of China, we have seen signs of such determination. Eventually, it could become a powerful ally of the U.S. and, together with the Asean nations, provide peace and stability in the area, in which the Indo China peninsula would be come a neutral zone. On the other hand, if the U.S. fails to increase its ties with China, there is always the possibility that another leadership might seize control and revert to its alliance with the Soviets - a dangerous prospect for Asia. By moving closer to China, the U.S. will accomplish two objectives: stopping Soviet expansion and hastening the end of Communism in China./

Dear Mr. Young:

I have received your inquiry of April 28 enclosing a letter from Mr. James R. Carder to the President concerning travel to Vietnam.

There are no restrictions on travel of U.S. citizens to Vietnam. However, we discourage travel there because we do not have an Embassy in Vietnam and cannot provide the usual consular services. Persons who wish to travel to Vietnam must make their own arrangements for visas from the Vietnamese Government. There are commercial flights to Vietnam; information on them should be available from any travel agent who has the official airline guide. The enclosed travel advisory notice on Vietnam provides further information which Mr. Carder may find helpful.

Mr. Carder's letter indicates that he wishes to travel to Vietnam to be reunited with his wife. He may be unaware of the Orderly Departure Program for legal emigration from Vietnam to the United States. If Mr. Carder wishes to explore the possibility of bringing his wife to the United States, he should contact one of the voluntary agencies participating in the resettlement of Indochinese refugees. A list of the national offices of these voluntary agencies is enclosed.

Dear President Reagan,

I am intending to call the White House today to speak with someone who is close to you - or to yourself, if possible. I know you are a very busy man but I have a problem that has continued on and on for ten years and it demands immediate attention by the highest levels of our government. To make it quick, I have outlined five questions and one final statement. I ask you or one of your assistants to sit down and answer these questions sincerely. I am not happy with the decision that I may be forced to make. I am hoping that you might have something encouraging to tell me.

- Why is the U.S. Government delaying "Normalization of Relations" with Vietnam if it has been officially determined by the U.S. Defense Department that there are no longer any MIA's left alive in Vietnam?
- Question #2. Are you aware of my case?
- Question #3. If yes Why haven't you given it more attention?
- Question #4. If no I suggest the President have his intelligence advisors inform him. I am a member of the Republican National Committee in Washington, D.C. and a member of the United States Defense Committee located in Fairfax, Virginia. Lt. General Daniel O. Graham was the chief U.S. Military Intelligence Officer in Saigon when I was there and he should be aware of my case. Has he contacted you? I have written him.
- If something is not done immediately to normalize relations with Vietnam so persons like myself who are finding themselves in similar circumstances can go conveniently to Vietnam to be with wives and families then I will be compelled to seek political asylum in Canada or to some other country which has diplomatic relations with Vietnam and "humanitarian" assistance to get back with my wife. Is this what the U.S. Government wants?
- Final Statement: I have definate serious medical problems and otherwise will be given no other alternative but to take whatever action necessary to reunite myself with my wife.

I feel that because of the technical resources this country has available to it, specifically in the area of communications, that there is no further excuse for the government of this country to inhibit my passage to Vietnam by refusing to normalize relations with that country.

I want the President to know that it hurts me deeply to have to make such a radical decision that could potentially alienate myself from my country. I had put extreme confidence in your bid for the Presidency in lieu of our relations with Vietnam during the Carter Administration. I believe that in 1980 the Vietnamese felt the same way. I am feeling more and more disappointed everyday.

Please do something to give me more faith in the American system and our leaders sense-of-justice.

My wife and I would like to try to have another child and I can't bring myself to go thru with an operation I need before my wife and I are given a decent opportunity to be together again.

I am beginning to wonder whether there is any decency left in the world.

My emotional problems concerning this matter is that I have a strong sense of loyalty both to my country and my wife in Vietnam. I am stricken by a sense of moral obligation to both.

If I could be somehow sent back to Vietnam in the service of my country, I would feel indebted to my country for your graciousness. If I am forced to face those communists again on my own, it is going to be one of the saddest experiences of my life. I have always been a fighter and would not compromise my sensibilities without a struggle. However, I would be forced to do whatever necessary to survive as my wife has been forced to do since 1975.

Please respond to my letter as soon as possible. I have already written to the Canadian Immigration Centre in Whitehorse, Y.T. about immigration and humanitarian assistance. I am not happy about it.

I do not understand the reason I am sending this letter to you since the information on the conditions in VietNam seem to be unresolvable. Perhaps the reason I am writing you, Mr. President, is your speeches regarding heroism and the love of freedom; also, Huynh Thanh Van made a comment regarding your policies towards communism.

I pray to the Lord God Almighty that you will personally be able to read this letter and the letters

enclosed. I know that the President of the United States can not read everything written to him by ordinary citizens, but I hope this extraordinary letter, A Letter from VietNam, reaches your desk. I know that almost nothing can be done, but I wanted to share this letter with you.

Dear Alumni Association:

I am sorry to write this letter in the Vietnamese language, my English vocabulary is limited, so I can't write what I want to say in your language.

I received a letter from Alumni Association for Mr. Tuan, I am his younger brother. My family and I regret and we are disturbed that my brother, Mr. Tuan, was not at home when the letter arrived. I want to thank the Alumni Association for that letter. If Tuan were home, he also would be sad and regret more than anybody in the house that he would be unable to respond. Tuan is now in jail. He tried to escape from Vietnam, and was captured in the attempt. This was his eighth attempt. Before he tried to leave Vietnam he had to work very hard to earn more money and he sold most of his household belongings. His hope to escape Vietnam did not come to fruition. A man in jail under communist regime suffers greatly; no food to eat, no water to take a shower, no place to sleep. The Communists do not even allow the relatives to bring food in to feed him. In one prison there are only four square meter for 46 people who all eat, defecate, and sleep together. These prisoners cannot even move; maybe you won't believe what I write, but it is true.

A person in prison is put to hard work in the day time, every day of the week. Prisoners are given 10 minutes to shower with three liters of water.

My wife and I were caught the same time Mr. Tuan was captured. After we were in jail a few weeks my wife and I were so sick that they had to release us.

Families in which one or more of its members worked for the Republic of Vietnam Government before the Communist came, or were working for U.S. government before are treated badly by the Vietnamese Communists (V.C.). Former army officers are put in reeducation prison forever, and the sons or daughters of those families cannot go to high school, or get a government job. The good jobs are from the high school up are only for the people who were V.C. That's why most Vietnamese people wants to leave the country and are willing to do so even in the face of danger. Ninety percent of the people who try to escape die or are captured; only ten percent can get through safely.

Kathy Fitch said to Tuan one time that: "You have got to stay in the USA, and don't go back Vietnam." But Tuan did not heed her warning. A long time ago, I wrote to Kathy Fitch, to exchange postage stamps. Her address is Box A24, Grants, NM 87020. But I didn't receive a reply from her.

Tuan is now a forced laborer on an island 10 kilometers from the main land in the delta area. Each month the VC allow Tuan's family to bring food, clothes, and medicines to meet only one-quarter of his needs. If we

want to see him on a visit, we have to register in advance. Once Mr. Tuan's wife took supplies to her husband by small boat which had no engine, and had to be paddled by hand. The boat was over loaded with people, and the boat sank in the river. She was very lucky to survive; half of the people on boat drowned.

I don't know why so many people like the communist party. For me, a communist never had a heart in his body; a communist never had a sense of humanity. They have brought us a strange peace. I stand with U.S. President Reagan. He is always careful when he talks to the communist countries, especially Vietnam.

I write this letter to you so that you will understand my brother,

Tuan's situation. I hope he will be released soon and he will write

you about his life in prison under communist regime. My wish for you
is to be happy.
