Dear Mr. President:

This is being dictated after just having seen you in Phoenix, however, I wanted to say something to you and I hope you will read this letter.

The last thing in the world that is ever going to happen between the two of us is a falling out about anything that we may disagree on. I might disagree with you and you might disagree with me but, our friendship means a lot more to me than the passing fancy of politics. I know how deeply you feel about Taiwan and, as I told you this afternoon, I'm not worried about Taiwan as long as you're around. But, let us face it, you and I aren't going to be here forever and it's the people that follow you that bother me.

Whether we like it or not, the State Department types are the ones who have been bungling up our foreign policy ever since the days of John Foster Dulles. I told Kissinger, I told Haig and I've told Schulz, when you get into your office on the 7th floor, fire everybody below that floor because they are dedicated against everything you or your President wants to do. I remember when Haig went in he was as passionately devoted to Taiwan as you and I but, before many months went by, his mind became poisoned and he took a 180 degree position on Taiwan.

The communique that you sent Peking has been milling around in that State Department for several years. I know that it doesn't sound too bad to you and it doesn't sound too bad when you explain that all decisions will be made between Taiwan and you and the Congress. But, again, when you're not here there will be no Taiwan unless it is a separate country, and, by the way, I've been advocating that for a long time and I hope it comes to pass because I think it would end all our problems.

August 23, 1982

Page Two

I'd like to sit down with you sometime when you have a spare moment and go over this State Department problem because it really disturbs me. They have, on at least three occasions and maybe more, changed treaty situations between our country and others with just letters or communiques and that's contrary to the intent of the Constitution, I have introduced legislation to prevent that but, I don't know if it will ever become law. It is being introduced more to help you and to help our country than anything else because I am sick and tired of those people in the State Department trying to run this place the way they want. That's the whole story, Mr. President, and, if you want more, just blow the whistle.

I am writing to ask your assistance in insuring that, if the visit takes place, it will do so without unfavorable Administration comment. I believe that you share the hope of many Senators and Representatives that a continuing friendly relationship with Taiwan is both possible and important in light of the recent communique with the Peoples Republic of China. A visit by the Premier of the Republic of China will contribute materially to the maintenance and expansion of friendship between Taiwan and the United States, and I am hopeful that such a visit could occur in the best possible political context.
