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

SUBJECT: "... The Last Remaining Supply-siders"

I guess you caught me a bit off guard the other day in the Cabinet meeting when you spoke to me of Jude Wanniski. I think it is appropriate to respond to the assertion that I am "one of the last remaining supply-siders in the White House". Hence, this memo.

Since there are at least 100 definitions for supply-sider floating around, at least 99 of which are incorrect, it would be extremely risky for me to confirm this rumor. Since I am not an economist, my understanding of economics is necessarily in simple terms. My own statement of the basic supply-side axiom is:

Whenever someone who would produce corn believes that he or she will be able to enjoy a reasonable portion of such corn, then he or she is more likely to produce the corn. Conversely, if it is believed that an unreasonable portion of the corn will be confiscated by the Government -- or anyone else , for that matter -- he or she is less likely to produce the corn. (It is more likely that the corn will be produced in the shadows, i.e., out of the tax collector's sight or, if possible, in a more charitable jurisdiction.)

My understanding of supply-side economics ends here. I should add though that this axiom does have applications, not only to tax policy (which is obvious), but also to monetary policy, trade policy, defense policy, you name it.

Having said that, I hasten to add that the only thing in this world that is pure is theory. Certainly Government policy is not. The process of forging a consensus must begin with sound theory -- the supply-side axiom gives us a good place to start -and proceed through the difficult process of blending interests which, more often than not, conflict.

While I always begin my analysis with the supply-side axiom, my interest is in seeing the policy development process all the way through.

I confess that I have side-stepped your question. If you wish, I can do penance by giving you, upon request, a supply-side perspective on questions you may be considering from time to time.
