

SUBJECT: Ron Frankum's Note to You Bringing
to Your Attention a Wall Street Journal
Article Concerning Martin Marietta's
Application to Build and Launch
a Satellite Pending Before the FCC

You asked whether Ron Frankum's note to you bringing to your attention a Wall Street Journal article discussing Martin Marietta Corporation's pending application to the Federal Communications Commission for permission to build and launch a satellite presents "revolving-door" problems.

As you know, 18 U.S.C. § 207(c) provides that for a period of one year following the termination of Government employment, a Senior Employee may not represent anyone, nor communicate with, his or her former department or agency in regard to any particular matter pending before that department or agency. The aforementioned bar applies regardless of whether the employee participated in or had responsibility for the matter, and regardless of whether the matter was pending when he or she was employed at the agency. That the matter does not involve the rights of specific parties is irrelevant to the bar. It is the clear mandate of the statute that the Senior Employee have no professional representative contact with his or her former agency.

It is my understanding that Mr. Frankum left the Office of Science and Technology Policy where he served as the Deputy Science Advisor to the President and Deputy Director, on October 1, 1983. Jerry Jennings of OSTP advises that Mr. Frankum served for approximately one year prior to his departure. As the Deputy Science Advisor to the President, Mr. Frankum would be considered a former "Senior Employee." Accordingly, he would be covered by the prohibitions contained in 18 U.S.C. § 207(c). The bar, as it relates to Mr. Frankum, however, would apply only to those representations made before the Office of Science and Technology Policy. That is because our office sought and obtained in March 1983, the designation of the Office of Science and Technology Policy as a "separate statutory agency under the

provisions of 18 U.S.C. § 207(e). Accordingly, even if Mr. Frankum's communication to you was made with the intent to represent Martin Marietta Corporation, to have done so would not violate the prohibitions found in § 207(c).

I would also note that the provisions of 5 C.F.R. § 737.11, which deal with the one year restriction on former Senior Employee's transactions with such employee's former agency on a particular matter, provide that communications or appearances concerning matters of a personal and individual nature are exempted from the prohibition. While the communication in this case does not necessarily relate to a purely personal matter, I would categorize it as a mere casual communication, i.e., the transmission of a publicly available article published in a widely-read publication, and not as an attempt to represent the matters depicted in the article. Accordingly, even if this communication had been transmitted to OSTP, I would not construe it as a violation of 18 U.S.C. § 207(c). I have ascertained, however, that no such communication was transmitted to OSTP.

Accordingly, the question implicit in your note on the attached article is answered in the negative.

You may have missed this article in the WALL STREET JOURNAL yesterday. It has been an exciting six weeks since leaving the White House. This recent move by Martin Marietta Corporation will definitely make a splash in the telecommunications industry.

Marietta Seeks FCC Nod for Satellites As RCA, Equatorial File for Expansion

Martin Marietta Corp. applied to the Federal Communications Commission for permission to build and launch its first satellite, allowing it to provide telecommunications services.

Separately, RCA Corp. asked the FCC to allow it to more than double the capacity of its domestic satellite system. And Equatorial Communications Co. is seeking FCC permission to build and launch two satellites in an expansion of its data network services.

Martin Marietta also wants FCC certification as a telecommunications common carrier.

The company's bid for a satellite system is another sign that the conglomerate is diversifying from some basic industries into high-technology businesses. Marietta is shrewd in its timing. Industry studies predict a shortage of satellite capacity beginning in late 1987 or 1988, about the time Martin Marietta's satellites come on line.

The satellite system would be run by a newly formed subsidiary, Martin Marietta Communications Systems Inc. Martin Marietta also has interests in aerospace, aluminum, cement, aggregates, chemicals and information services.

The company said it seeks slots in geosynchronous orbit for two satellites, which it said would have at least four times the capacity of any existing commercial domestic satellite. Objects in geosynchronous orbit stay above the same spot on Earth, a requirement for communications satellites.

Martin Marietta said it expects the satellites to be operational in late 1988 and to be used to provide telecommunications services to other common carriers, communications-service companies and individual telecommunications users. The company wouldn't disclose how much it plans to spend on the satellite system.

Martin Marietta isn't the first aerospace concern to enter the satellite business. Both Hughes Aircraft Co. and Ford Motor Co.'s Ford Aerospace & Communications Co. have satellite operations that let them use their hardware to provide telecommunications services.

Although a latecomer to the satellite business, Martin Marietta's proposed system has several advantages. Its technology would pack more transmission capacity onto each satellite. Since much of the cost of satellite service comes from the high fixed cost of putting a satellite in orbit, having more channels on a satellite could let Martin Marietta spread that fixed cost over more customers, giving each a lower price than offered by competing carriers.

"What they're saying is that they have a better mousetrap," said an industry executive. "Despite the fact that they're late-entering, they should be able to compete effectively because of better design."

The total number of geosynchronous slots is limited and to get one a company must file a proposal with the FCC.

"Just filing an application at this point is a useful thing to keep your options open and stake a claim to two of the orbital slots."

said the industry executive.

Earlier this year, Martin Marietta acquired Mathematica Inc., a computer-software company that became part of the company's fast-growing Martin Marietta Data Services unit. In addition, as part of a program to reduce debt incurred in fending off an unsuccessful takeover bid by Bendix Corp., Martin Marietta sold some of its cement, chemical, mining and aggregates interests.

RCA's RCA American Communications Inc. unit in Princeton, N.J., said it seeks FCC permission to construct, launch and operate as many as six additional satellites.

The company would add either three satellites that include both C-band and Ku-band technologies, or six satellites that provide the technologies separately. The two types operate on different frequencies; C-band is subject to interference from microwaves.

The new Satcom satellites would be built by another RCA division, RCA Astro-Electronics of Princeton, for launching by the space shuttle in June 1989, June 1990 and September 1992.

The company said it expects big growth in the market for commercial communications services, in part because of the surge in office automation. It also said that new television markets may use satellites. The new capacity, the unit said, could also provide expanded services to federal agencies.

RCA also has interests in electronics, broadcasting and entertainment.

If Equatorial's request is approved by the FCC, its two satellites would be launched on space-shuttle missions in late 1987 and early 1988. Together with a spare satellite on the ground, they would constitute the EquaStar satellite system, costing about \$200 million, Equatorial said. The system would permit increased availability of low-cost satellite communications to users in the 50 states, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands, the company added.

Equatorial provides satellite data-communications networks, relaying data via satellite to two-foot-diameter receiving dishes at local Earth stations.
