Richard Darman has asked for any comments on the attached list of recipients of "E" and "E Star" exporting awards by 5:00 p.m. today. Executive Order 10978 (Dec. 5, 1961) (copy attached) established a program whereby firms or organizations expanding export markets for American products receive Presidential recognition. The program, administered by the Department of Commerce, has been in place since 1961, and every President except President Carter has issued awards under it. President Reagan has issued several "E" and "E Star" awards, usually in connection with visits to company plants. An award ceremony is contemplated for next week, at which the President will bestow awards on the ten specified companies or organizations.

I called the Department of Commerce to determine what types of background checks had been undertaken to ensure that the President would not be embarrassed by subsequent disclosures concerning the honored companies. A very thorough process is in place, including checks with the Department of Justice Criminal and Antitrust Divisions, the IRS, SEC, NLRB, FTC, Department of Labor, Office of Export Administration and, where appropriate, the Department of Agriculture. The candidate firms sign necessary waivers and also an affirmation that they are not complying with any prohibited foreign boycotts.

I was also concerned about the President appearing to endorse particular commercial enterprises, but that is apparently the entire purpose of the program. Indeed, the Executive Order specifically authorizes award recipients to display their "E" awards in advertising. Our usual concerns would thus seem inapplicable in this circumstance.

I have drafted a memorandum to Darman noting that we have no objection based on assurances received from Commerce concerning clearances.

Executive Order 10978—Establishing Presidential awards for significant contributions to the export expansion program

WHEREAS the level of employment throughout the United States, the strength of our national economy, and our capacity to carry out our international responsibilities can be substantially increased by the establishment of many new and increased foreign markets for a variety of American industrial and farm products; and

WHEREAS it is in the national interest to promote and expand the

export trade of the United States; and

WHEREAS there has been established an Export Expansion Program designed to assist American private enterprise, both large and small, to expand greatly the nature and volume of exports; and

WHEREAS it is appropriate to award suitable public recognition to persons, firms, and organizations making significant contributions to the

increase of American exports:

NOW, THEREFORE, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and statutes of the United States, and as President of the United States, it is hereby ordered as follows:

SECTION 1. An award program for significant contributions to the

Export Expansion Program is hereby established.

- SEC. 2. The Secretary of Commerce, in cooperation with the Secretary of the Interior, the Secretary of Agriculture, the Administrator of the Small Business Administration, and the heads of other Government departments and agencies, shall establish procedures for the nomination of persons, firms, and organizations for awards and the granting of awards, and for such other matters as may be incidental thereto.
 - SEC. 3. There shall be two types of awards, as follows:

(a) The President's "E" Award; and

(b) The President's "E" Certificate of Service.

SEC. 4. The President's "E" Award may be made to persons, firms, and organizations engaged in the marketing of products who make significant contributions to the expansion of the export trade of the United States. It shall consist of a flag having a field of white upon which will appear a blue "E". It shall be further evidenced by an "E" Award Certificate, which shall cite the recipient's contribution, and shall be appropriately executed in the name and by the authority of the President.

SEC. 5. A special "E" Certificate of Service may be awarded to persons, firms, and organizations who make contributions to export expansion, but who are engaged in activities other than the marketing of products. The special "E" Certificate of Service shall cite the recipient's contribution, and shall be appropriately executed in the name and

by the authority of the President.

SEC. 6. A recipient of either type of award may be authorized to issue to his employees a suitably designed pin inscribed with the President's "E", to display a designated style of award emblem in his advertising, and to make other appropriate use of the emblem.

BACKGROUND:

The "E" Award Program was established by Executive Order 10978 on December 5, 1961, to afford suitable recognition to persons, firms, or organizations which contribute significantly in the effort to increase United States exports. A second award, the "E Star" Award, was authorized by the Secretary of Commerce in 1969, to recognize "E" Award recipients for continuing export expansion efforts. To date, 1,437 American firms or organizations have received the "E" Award, and 202 of those recipients have continued to expand their export efforts and have received the "E Star" Award.

As called for in the Executive Order, winners receive a certificate signed in the name of the President by the Secretary of Commerce, a lapel pins, and an "E" flag. In those instances where a nominee has contributed significantly to agricultural exports and/or services, the award is signed jointly by the Secretaries of Commerce and Agriculture.

"E" Award ceremonies are arranged to give both the recipient and the Department of Commerce's export promotion efforts maximum publicity. Presentations have been made by each President since the beginning of the program, with the exception of President Carter, at White House World Trade Week ceremonies and out of Washington at local affairs. Cabinet Officers, Presidential appointees, Members of Congress, Governors, and other suitable representatives of the President present the awards at annual association meetings, trade luncheons, trade seminars, and other appropriate forums. Ceremonies are usually well publicized, especially in small- and medium-sized cities, providing the presentor an effective and efficient forum to publicize the ent entire range of our government's efforts to strengthen this nation's export position in world trade.

PROCESSING:

Organizations interested in being considered for an "E" Award must take application through the nearest District Office of the Department of Commerce. After the application has been forwarded to Washington, it is reviewed by the Department, and if found to be complete, is submitted to various Federal regulatory agencies for clearance. The purpose of the interagency clearance is to prevent embarrassment to the United States Government as a result of such an award. The regulatory agencies are: Department of Justice (both the Antitrust and Criminal Division); Department of Labor; Internal Revenue Service; Federal Trade Commission; National Labor Relations Board; Securities and Exchange Commission; and in the Commerce Department, the Compliance Division in the Office of Export Administration and the Office of Antiboycott Compliance.

After all regulatory responses are received, the President's "E" Award Committee, chaired by the Deputy Assistant Secretary for Export Development or his designee, with representatives from Labor, Interior, Agriculture, the Small Business Administration and other Commerce units, considers the application. If the Committee members vote favorably and no adverse reports are received, a favorable recommendation is forwarded to you for final approval. Those applications sent forward are usually approved as a matter of course.

If there is an objection from a regulatory agency, the Committee will exercise its judgment regarding objections which involve non-criminal violations of law. A violation of criminal law, whether proven or under investigation, or a violation relating to export performance of an applicant will cause the award to be either deferred or denied. The Deputy Assistant Secretary for Export Development has been delegated the authority for denial of "E" and "E Star" Awards.



The President's "E" and "E Star" Awards are a means of granting recognition to persons, firms or organizations that contribute significantly in the effort to increase United States exports.

How The Program Began

The President's "E" Award was created by Executive Order of the President in 1961 to afford suitable recognition to persons, firms or organizations that contribute significantly in the effort to increase United States exports. The "E" Award was introduced as a revival and adaptation of the World War II "E" pennants awarded to industrial plants for superior production. Its origin goes back to 1906, when the U.S. Navy stimulated competition in the fleet by conferring "E" pennants on ships excelling in gunnery, engineering and communications.

The President's "E Star" Award was authorized by the Secretary of Commerce in 1969 to afford continuing recognition of noteworthy export promotion efforts by "E" Award recipients.

Qualifying For An "E" Award

To qualify for an "E" Award, a manufacturer must show evidence of a substantial increase in volume of exports over a four-year period. Exports should constitute a significant portion of total product sales and/or be materially in excess of the industry's average percentage. The company also should demonstrate breakthroughs in especially competitive markets, introduce a new product into U.S. export trade, or open a new market.

The President's "E Star" Award recognizes continued superior performance in increasing or promoting exports. Only recipients of the "E" Award are eligible, and the level of performance must exceed that for which the "E" Award was given.

Export Services Also Earn "E's"

The President's Executive Order also authorized the "E" Certificate of Service, which may be awarded to persons, firms and organizations that may or may not export directly, but assist or facilitate export efforts through financing, transportation, market promotion or other exportrelated services. Nonmanufacturers such as banks, utilities, export firms, chambers of commerce, trade associations and individuals that promote and assist exporting may receive this award.

Other Activities Considered

In addition to the major requirements an exporter must meet, the President's "E" Award Committee-chaired by the Commerce Department with representatives from the Departments of Agriculture, the Interior, and Labor and the Small Business Administration and Export-Import Banktakes into consideration a number of other activities in weighing the merits of the application, such as: use of distributors, trade show participation, licensing agreements, making financing available, market research, training programs, overseas travel by company executives, indigenous language advertising and brochures, conducting seminars on international trade, servicing agreements, and adapting products to meet local requirements, such as different electric current and metric measurement.

How To Apply

Applications must be submitted through the nearest District Office of the U.S. Department of Commerce (listed on the back cover). District Office trade specialists are available to advise and assist applicants.

Processing An Application

When an "E" Award application is received at the Commerce Department in Washington, it is reviewed, and, if found to be complete, is submitted to various Federal regulatory agencies for clearance. The applicant authorizes U.S. Government departments, agencies and commissions to provide the Commerce Department with information pertaining to the applicant for purposes of determining the applicant's eligibility for the award. The purpose of this regulatory clearance is to prevent possible embarrassment to the United States Government.

After all regulatory responses are received, the President's "E" Award Committee considers each application on its individual merits. Those receiving favorable consideration are forwarded to the Secretary of Commerce for final selection.

Obtaining Recognition For An Award

"E" winners receive a certificate signed in the name of the President by the Secretary of Commerce, a lapel pin with the President's "E", and a white flag with a blue E to fly over their plant or office. "E Star" winners receive a similar certificate and pin, along with a pennant emblazoned with a blue star.

Award ceremonies may be held in conjunction with trade events, such as conventions, seminars, annual association meetings and trade shows. Some firms arrange for employees to participate in the ceremony, perhaps providing them with individual "E" lapel pins or hosting a luncheon. Presentations are made in behalf of the President by Senators, Congressmen, Federal officials, Governors and other suitable officials.

Winners are encouraged to use the "E" emblem in a variety of ways to obtain further recognition. Reproducing the pin or the pennant on stationery, advertisements, postage meters, premiums or other items informs the public about the honor.

The next time you see the distinctive white pennant with the blue letter "E", and possibly a blue star, you will recognize it as an acknowledgement from the U.S. Government that the company has made a valuable contribution to American foreign
