Some time ago the President received a letter from Robert Evans, Director of the American Bar Association Governmental Affairs Group, expressing concern over reports that the Office of Federal Procurement Policy (OFPP) was going to be abolished. You received a letter on the same subject from "Sparks" at Morgan, Lewis & Bockius. On January 24, 1985, I referred the correspondence to David Gerson at OMB, asking for background information on the issue. OMB has only now responded. The attached draft replies explain that the Administration intends to integrate OFPP more closely with OMB as part of the Management Improvement Program, not abolish it.

Dear Sparks:

Thank you for your letter concerning the Office of Federal Procurement Policy (OFPP). I asked the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) for more information on the subject of your letter, and have now received a response. Please excuse the attendant delay in getting back to you.

According to OMB, there is no plan to abolish OFPP. OFPP is an entity within OMB with separate statutory identity and budget authorization. In order to strengthen OFPP's functions in particular, and procurement reform generally, OMB will seek to integrate OFPP more closely into OMB and to include procurement policy management reform as an integral part of the President's Management Improvement Program.

It is hoped that greater accountability on the part of OMB for the operations of OFPP will promote the objectives spelled out in your letter -- objectives the Administration fully shares. Procurement reform should be a component responsibility of OMB in the same manner as budget, regulatory and general management responsibilities.

The key advantages of what the Administration seeks include:

- of focusing on procurement reform as a high priority initiative;
- enhancing coordination with the President's Management Improvement Program and the budget and regulatory review process;
- eliminating the current overlap of effort and the duplication of responsibility within OMB;
- o improving internal resource allocation by simplifying the OMB-OFPP administrative structure; and
- ° keeping OFPP intact as a unit.

Realignment will strengthen the Administration's efforts to improve the management of Federal procurement policy.

Please be assured that the President regards procurement management reform as an integral part of his Government-wide Management Improvement Program.

Thank you for sharing your concerns with us. I hope the foregoing information is helpful.

Dear Mr. President:

I am writing on behalf of the Procurement Round Table (PRT) which has been formed to assist in advancing the cause of improvements in federal procurement. The PRT is a nonprofit organization composed entirely of individuals who have volunteered their extensive knowledge about federal procurement, based on their experiences in government, industry and academia, for this purpose. The Round Table stands ready to assist your Administration in your efforts to improve the economy and efficiency of the executive branch.

You, Mr. President, have been a major supporter of reforms in federal procurement, which in size is approximately \$185 billion. The Grace Commission, which you initiated, has stressed the importance of careful management of federal procurement to eliminate the waste of public funds.

Your staff, spearheaded by the Office of Federal Procurement Policy (OFPP), located within the Office of Management and Budget, has led the most comprehensive government-wide reform effort in history during your first term. Executive Order 12352 is a landmark document bearing your signature. But, the job is just begun!

Last year, the Congress reauthorized the OFPP for four years. This Office, which was recommended by the bipartisan Commission on Government Procurement (of which I was a member) is essential to continuing the progress which has been made. Accordingly, we are deeply puzzled and a troubled by news stories and other reports of plans to either abolish or reduce the OFPP. We sincerely hope this is a baseless rumor.

Rather than eliminating or downgrading OFPP, we urge the following for your consideration:

1. There is currently a need to find and appoint a new Administrator of OFPP since Mr. Donald Sowle has resigned as of December 31, 1984. The position of Administrator requires a person who has the stature and experience in the procurement arena to command the respect of both the executive agencies and the Congress.

- 2. There is a need to provide for and maintain an adequate professional staff at CFFF-both in numbers and in grade levels—to ensure its ability to carry out its responsibilities to the Congress and your efforts to create an effective and economical federal procurement process. The PRT believes the current authorized staff (25) and budget for the OFPP are adequate, provided the Administrator receives appropriate support from the departments and agencies involved in procurement. Curtailing OFPP would be a backwar step in your efforts to reduce procurement costs in both the Defense Department and the civilian agencies by reducing your capability to exercise adequate control over the process by which Federal procurement expenditures are made.
- 3. To be effective, the OFPP Administrator needs your full support, Mr. President, including appropriate instructions to the executive agencies that they must cooperate with the Administrator and accept the role which you and the Congress expect the Administrator to serve in overseeing procurement expenditures. Apart from assisting in achieving the goal of improving procurement, this commitment is essential to minimize the amount of undesirable Congressional "micro-management" legislation on procurement matters which has increased dramatically in the past two years.

We would be pleased to meet with you or your Cabinet Council on Management and Administration to discuss this matter further.

Resolution adopted upon recommendation of the Section of Public Contract Law

The following resolution was adopted upon recommendation of the Section of Public Contract Law:

BE IT RESOLVED, that the American Bar Association expresses its support in principle of S. 2510, 93rd Congress, 1st Session, and related bills designed to establish an Office of Federal Procurement Policy for the purpose of establishing direction and control of procurement policy for the Executive Branch of the Federal Government and for recipients of Federal assistance programs, subject to the qualification that consideration be given to the establishment of an independent regulatory Board or Commission as an alternative to the proposed Office, that any new such agency be non-political and independent of the White House, and that such an agency should have appropriate authority to insure public consultation on the development of procurement specifications involving competitive procurement; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the President or his designee is authorized to present the substance of the foregoing resolution to appropriate committees of Congress.
